The Chicago Bears took a perfect record into the final week of the National Football league exhibition season today and the champion Cleveland Browns, usually several wave-lengths ahead of their rivals, reported they're wired for sound.

The Bears swept their fifth exhibition game by defeating the New York Giants Saturday night at Dallas, Tex., 21-16.

Cleveland, which hasn't had a good exhibition record since 1953, took a 31-14 Saturday night whipping from the Detroit Lions at Akron, Ohio. But Coach Paul Brown, who usually calls Cleveland's plays by alternating "messenger boy" guards, employed a radio installed in quarterback George Ratterman's helmet to run his offense against Detroit in rain and mud.

**Fifth Loss**  
It was Cleveland's fifth loss in a row in exhibition.

# Yanks Near 7th Flag In 8 Years; National Race Still Feverish

It's all over but the shouting in the American league but there is just one more crisis today for the National league's weary contenders.

The New York Yankees need only the formality of one victory in their last 10 games to nail down a record-equalling seventh flag in eight years under Casey Stengel after splitting Sunday's doubleheader with the Cleveland Indians. And they'll go for the "kill" Tuesday night against the Chicago White Sox — the only team that still has a mathematical chance.

But over in the feverish NL, the Brooklyn Dodgers, Milwaukee Braves and Cincinnati Redlegs go right back "into the pit" tonight.

The Dodgers opened up a half-game lead with Sal Maglie's spine-tingling, 3-2 win over Cincinnati Sunday but face the hard hitting Redlegs again tonight while the Braves tangle with the New York Giants in a twilight doubleheader, created by Sunday's rainout.

**Braves Must Win**  
The Dodgers are in a position where a victory would assure their holding first place for another 24 hours and would just about end the Redlegs' faint hopes. The Braves, of course, must win their doubleheader or suffer another blow in the vital "lost column."

The Yankees routed 19-game winner Bob Lemon with a 13-single attack to win their opener, 10-3, but Early Wynn scattered nine hits to win the nightcap for the Indians, 4-3, despite Mickey Mantle's 49th homer.

## Brodie's Passing Could Be Stanford Rose Bowl Key

Stanford — (U.P.) — If Stanford has the key to the Rose Bowl this year it is in the possession of quarterback John Brodie whose passes will be the core of the Indians' attack.

"That's where our strength is, up in the air," Coach Chuck Taylor said today after brushing off reports that his squad will breeze into the classic. "Brodie is headed for his best season. He also has matured a lot and takes command more. But that doesn't mean we'll be the best team in the Pacific Coast conference."

Taylor's choice is Southern California, which he says has a big edge on manpower despite the crippling penalties inflicted by the PCC for code violations. "We don't have any backs like Jon Arnett or C. R. Roberts," Taylor said.

**Face Tough Schedule**  
But while stunning his usual role of optimist, Chuck did allow that "I think our chances of winning the title are better than last year."

If the Indians do go all the way, Taylor said, it will be over a rocky schedule which he describes as "just as tough as in 1955."

"The only club that may be weaker is UCLA and that's because of the penalties and Ronnie Knox's departure," Taylor said. "But Oregon State, which beat us last year, Washington State, Oregon and California can't help but improve."

Early in the going come bruisers against Michigan State, the Rose Bowl champs, on Sept. 29 followed by Ohio State at Columbus.

Taylor has a good veteran starting brigade but while the air line is strong, the depth in the line is shallow.

To snag his passes, Brodie has Paul Camera back as a flanker along with ends Carl Isaacs and Gary Van Galder. The rest of the starting backfield is rounded out with Lou Valli at fullback and Gordy Young at right half.

The backfield is well stocked with regulars in second line positions. Jack Douglas is at quarterback, Jerry Angove, Al Harrington or Jeri McMillin hurt at halfbacks and Archie Schmitt also hurt and Chuck Sea at fullback.

Trouble starts up front. On the bright side, Taylor has All-American candidate Paul Wiggin at right tackle and veteran Donn Carswell at left guard. But left tackle is being held down by converted end Steve Doctor. His position, as well as two others, are backed by sophomores.

It will be Troy Barbee when Doctor goes out while sophomore Eric Protiva replaces Paul Wiggin and second year man Bob Peterson takes over for veteran Noel Robinson at right guard. Don Manoukian, Carswell's seasoned replacement, also is on the injured list.

Another thin spot is at center, where Bob Long has come off the bench to replace namesake Joe Long who also graduated.
