Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower will present the coveted \$30,000 President's cup today to Willard E. Rhodes, owner of the big cream and orange hydroplane Miss Thriftway.

Also sharing in the cup honors will be Bill Muncey, who piloted Miss Thriftway to victory in the President's Cup Regatta Sunday. The Seattle boat nosed out Detroit's Miss Pepsi.

Miss Thriftway won the first two heats of the cup race, but placed second behind Roy Dain's Miss Pepsi in the final heat. But Miss Thriftway's 1,100 total points was enough to win the cup. Miss Pepsi racked up 925 points to take second place.

Private Airplane Crash Kills Pilot

Kent — (U.P.) — A small private airplane crashed near here yesterday, killing the pilot-owner and seriously injuring his passenger.

Killed in the crash was Lee C. Quinnes, 19, New Berlin, Wis., an airman stationed at Larson Air Force Base near Moses Lake.

Another Larson AFB airman, James L. Tegander, 20, suffered fractures of his left leg, head injuries and an injured pelvis when he was thrown from the plane after it plunged to the ground.

Authorities said Quinnes apparently had run out of fuel and was trying to glide down to a large field when his plane suddenly dipped to the ground.

Nine-year-old Kathy Wyman of Kent witnessed the crash. The girl said she saw the aircraft skimming over the tops of some trees near her home. It banked to the right and suddenly dipped downward onto a pasture about a quarter-mile from her home.

Portland Police Crack Down on Vice

Portland — (U.P.) — Portland policemen were under orders today to redouble their efforts to crack down on vice activities.

Deputy Police Chief Carl V. Shoemaker issued the order following a raid last Tuesday on what authorities called a gambling casino in north Portland.

The raid was made by Multnomah county officers and touched off a dispute between Sheriff Terry Schunk, candidate for mayor, and Police Chief Jim Purcell.

Shoemaker ordered all commanding officers and officers in his uniform division to comply explicitly with police manual regulations concerning vice. He said he was calling attention to the rule book "as a result of the recent attempt to embarrass this bureau" by the raid last week.

According to the report, Miss Flanagan noticed Meadows' car coming toward her and stopped in the center of the highway. Meadows' car struck Miss Flanagan's vehicle, veered across the highway and struck a power pole on the left side of the highway.

Miss Flanagan received a skinned knee, but did not require hospital treatment. None of her three passengers were injured and no citations were issued. The accident occurred at 1:05 a.m.

Stanford Teacher Jumps To Death

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Friends of a brilliant young Stanford University assistant professor were at a loss today to explain why he jumped to his death from the Golden Gate bridge.

The body of Michael Wyatt, 27, clad only in shorts, was recovered by the Coast Guard Sunday near mile rock light-house, 12 hours after his abandoned car was found parked on the bridge.

He left a handwritten will and a note to a young woman friend in the car. The will, written in pencil and timed off at 1:15 a.m. shortly before his leap, left all his property to Miss Dorothy Klimek, of San Mateo, Calif., and Joliet, Ill.

The note, addressed to her, "My darling Dorothy: I realize we can never be happy together, but I still love you. God bless you, Michael."

Wyatt's death came as a shock to Miss Klimek and to his friends on the Stanford faculty, who described him as "cheerful, pleasant," and a promising member of the faculty.

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
