Victim of Illness

Ends Own Life
A 49-year old multiple sclerosis victim, Wesley B. Ragsdale, 1214 West 10th st., Medford, shot and killed himself at about 2:40 a.m. today with a 30-30 caliber deer rifle, city police reported this morning.

According to the report, Ragsdale shot himself through the chest in the bedroom of his home while his wife was asleep in the same room. Mrs. Ragsdale told police she ran to the home of a neighbor, Sam Walter Hess, 1213 West 9th st., and brought him to the scene of the shooting. Hess then telephoned city police.

Officers said Ragsdale had been suffering from multiple sclerosis for the past two years. After the coroner arrived, Ragsdale's body was moved to Conger-Morris funeral home, where services are pending.
