Rams Meet Steelers On Saturday

Portland—Oregon's final pregame of the season matches the Los Angeles Rams and Pittsburgh Steelers here at Multnomah stadium next Saturday night and it could develop into one of the most explosive contests of this or any year. The kick-off will be at 8:30 p.m.

It will be the final pre-league game of the season for both clubs and the last chance to make the squad for veterans and rookies alike. They'll go all out to land jobs on the payroll when the teams cut down to the 33-man player limit after the game.

The Rams, defending champions of the Western conference of the National Football league, will be meeting one of their chief tormentors. The two teams played a 35 to 24 thriller here last year and then the Rams were lucky to eke out a 17 to 16 victory on a Les Richter field goal in the final seconds in a league game which eventually won them the title.

Coach Sid Gillman will unleash one of the mightiest offenses in the game for the Rams, a team which recently scored 68 points against the Chicago Cardinals, including four touchdowns on plays longer than 40 yards.

He has three great quarterbacks, led by Oregon's veteran Norm Van Brocklin and assisted by Billy Wade and Rudy Bukich. Superb running backs, all of whom can go all the way, are Skeet Quinlan, Brad Myers, Joe Marconi.

The Rams can choose from a collection of great ends with veterans such as Elroy Hirsch, Tom Fears, Bob Boyd, Woodley Lewis and Bob Carey and rookies such as Leon Clarke, Ron Miller and Jack Bighead.

The Steelers, with Coach Walt Kiesling utilizing a new "Slot-T" offense, use Tad Marchibroda and Jack Scarbath as quarterbacks and they can both throw the ball.

In Ray Mathews and Lowell Perry, who is considered the finest rookie in the history of the club, the Steelers have two of the fastest ends in the business, with the veteran Elbie Nickel playing a halfback slot in the "three-end" offense now used by the pros.

Lynn Chadnois and Fran Rogel are among the great runners of the game, as they demonstrated so well in Portland last year.

Although Berrios is rated sixth among the 126-pound contenders, three notches above Chestnut, betting was at "even money."

Their 10-round will be televised and broadcast nationally over NBC networks.

Coincidentally, Kenny Lane of Muskegon, Mich., sixth-ranking lightweight contender, engages Ludwig Lightburn of British Honduras, number nine, in a 10-round at Bay Front auditorium, Miami, Wednesday night. Lightburn is favored at 2-1, despite his lower ranking and although he lost two of six fights this year, whereas Lane won six straight.

The Republicans already are ahead of the Democrats in one respect. The GOP National Committee has a staff of 196 at its headquarters, which takes up a big part of a floor in a downtown building. The Democrats are operating in three fronts. The committee is in one building, the main headquarters in another, and the Stevenson-Kefauver main offices are at a separate stand. The total staff is only 150. No conclusions can be drawn from the above.

Increase Seen in Net Farm Income

Washington — (U.P.) — The Agriculture Department has estimated that net farm income will show a 9 per cent increase in the July-September quarter over the same period last year.

The department said farmers' net income for the period "could well" reach an annual rate of \$12 billion or higher, compared to the \$11 billion rate for the same quarter of 1935.

Net farm income for the first nine months of 1936 edged ahead of last year's level as a result of the July-September spurt. For the January-September period, net income this year ran at an average annual rate of \$11,370,000,000 last year.

The government farm income report said farmers sold about \$17.1 billion worth of products from January through August this year, up 2 per cent from a year ago. Prices were 2 per cent below last year's average, but farmers had more to sell, the department said.
