## Importance of Good Vision Stressed at Safety Meeting

Dr. James Wahl, dean of the college of optometry at Pacific university, Forest Grove, stressed the importance of good vision in reducing accidents at a meeting of the Medford Safety Council recently.

Dr. Wahl said "industry loses in excess of 20 million dollars annually through eye accidents alone."

Commenting on safety on the highways, Dr. Wahl praised standards of present driver examinations, but noted that some revision is needed in reexamination of drivers at regular intervals. The change is necessary, he said, because visual, mental and physical abilities are constantly changing and should be checked regularly.

**Major Industries**  
Dr. Wahl noted that most major industries in this area have instituted safety programs in their operations, but added that there is a need to expand the programs to encourage others to stress safety on the job.

Two out of three adult Americans have inefficient vision which may handicap them for their jobs, according to Dr. Wahl. He said that vision training is important for seeing efficiency and for job efficiency. Production in one company increased 19 per cent after a visual program was instituted along with better lighting, he noted.

Other factors, such as proper job placement of employees and safety features on machines, can contribute greatly to increased production and should be used to full advantage, he said.

Dr. Wahl complimented the local Safety Council, which recently was cited by the National Safety Council for its work in traffic safety.

The next meeting of the council will be Friday, Oct. 12, according to Bud Palmer, chairman.

James Boyd, secretary of the local Mazama lodge, Order of the Arrow, was selected area chief for the state of Oregon at the lodge's state convention last week end in Portland.

James, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Boyd, is the second area chief selected from Medford in the past three years. Last local area chief elected in 1954 was Craig Phillips, son of Dr. and Mrs. Stanley Phillips.

Lodge officers attending included Dick Clark, lodge chief, who planned the trip and the lodge's share of discussions and ceremonies at the conference. Other officers attending were Bob Paine, assistant lodge chief; Wayne Breeze, chapter chief, and William R. Clary, lodge lay adviser, who displayed his collection of Indian costumes.

The five-lodge convention is held each year to exchange ideas and to elect the area chief for the state of Oregon.
