Salem — (UPI) — C. L. Knight, McMinnville, was elected president of Oregon's Association of Real Estate Boards here yesterday at the closing session of the group's convention. He succeeds C. L. Grabenhorst, Salem.

The association resolved to back ballot measure number one in the November elections. It is a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the prohibition against an emergency clause on revenue measures.

The 500 delegates at the two-day convention also voted to go on record favoring an increase from \$9,990 to \$12,000 on residential property and from \$15,000 to \$18,000 on farm property as maximum limits on loans from the State Department of Veterans Affairs.

Other officers elected were: Vice presidents M. J. Cosovich, Astoria; Frank I. Kinney, Eugene; and Everett Bartholomew, Medford.

George N. Meyer, Portland, was elected treasurer and Taylor Treece, Portland, secretary.
