Don Newcombe's taken his place with the majors' greatest pitchers of the last 20 years—whether the Brooklyn Dodgers win or lose the pennant.

With the possibility of three more starts in the last 10 hectic days of the National League race, the 240-pound right-hander already has:

1. Become the NL's fourth 25-game winner since 1936.
2. Compiled a 45-11 won-and-lost record for the last two years—that gives him an .804 percentage and a chance to equal a record held by Lefty Grove.
3. Been the Dodgers' "big guy" with a 16-1 record since July 4.

Big Newk, who swings a mean home run bat in addition to his pitching talents, "took charge" Wednesday when he blasted two round-trippers and stole a base in leading the Dodgers to a 17-2 rout of the St. Louis Cardinals. The victory enabled the Dodgers to open up a .004-point, half-game lead over the Milwaukee Braves, who were rained out of a scheduled game in Pittsburgh.

Gives Up Seven Hits

Newcombe gave up seven hits, including homers by Al Dark and Stan Musial, before retiring in favor of Don Bessent with the Dodgers leading, 15-2, after seven innings. Sandy Amoros and rookie Don Demeter also homered for the Dodgers while Duke Snider had four hits and drove in three runs in the 17-hit Brooklyn assault on five pitchers.

Wednesday's victory again evened the Dodgers with the Braves in the "won column," each with 88 and left Brooklyn with 57 losses compared to 53 for Milwaukee. The Braves, therefore, are on the spot to beat the Pirates today or drop two games behind in the "lost column" with seven games to go.

New York — (U.P.) — The American league champion New York Yankees now are accepting mail orders for tickets for the third, fourth, and fifth games of the World Series to be played at Yankee Stadium.

The Cincinnati Reds, still hoping for the miracle which will vault them back into serious contention, swept a doubleheader from the Philadelphia Phils, 6-3 and 6-0, to move within four

games of the Dodgers. Wally Post hit his 32nd homer to help Johnny Klippstein win his 12th decision in the opener while Tom Acker pitched a three-hitter and George Crowe homered in the nightcap.

Giants Down Cubs

The New York Giants downed the Chicago Cubs, 7-2 and 3-2, virtually dooming the losers to a last-place finish in the other NL activity.

Al Kaline, continuing his late-season bid to win the RBI crown, knocked in four runs with a 4-for-4 day as the Detroit Tigers scored a 9-1 triumph over the Baltimore Orioles. Ray Boone also homered for the Tigers as Frank Lary turned in an eight-hitter for his 19th win. Kaline now trails Mickey Mantle by only one RBI.

Harry Simpson's grand slam homer sparked the Kansas City Athletics to an 8-1 decision over the Boston Red Sox.

1956 Deer Hunt Season Promising

Portland — (U.P.)—The weekly report on hunting conditions prepared by the State Game Commission:

SOUTHWEST: Pigeon shooting fair in Coos Bay area but appears they are starting to leave; grouse hunting in the Smith river area good to fair throughout Coos county.

In Jackson county pigeon and dove shooting poor; fair numbers of blue grouse in high Cascades; in Douglas county grouse are scarce; quail are present but scattered.

Outlook for coming deer season very good.

CENTRAL: Most doves have moved out of Wasco and Jefferson counties; hunting should improve in White river archery area this weekend; deer are starting to move a little but mostly at night; area is dry and stalking difficult; deer holed up in deep canyons during day; doves migrating from the Bend area and hunting slow except for some of low areas in Jefferson county; Century Drive archery area slow.

NORTHEAST: Archery hunting fair due to dry forest conditions which makes stalking game difficult; roads in good shape; fire hazards remain.

SOUTHEAST: Dove hunting poor; most birds migrated south.

NORTHWEST: Pigeon hunting has slackened off with many birds going south; few still coming through the Nehalem Gorge; hunting good to excellent for both ruffed and blue grouse in Cochrane, Jewell and Birkenfeld areas; gold numbers mountain quail also taken.

Ken Lane Victor Over Lightburn

Miami, Fla. — (U.P.) — Kenny Lane's manager followed up his nationally-televized victory over Ludwig Lightburn today by asking for a shot at the lightweight title, but then conceded he'd settle for a shot at contender Larry Boardman.

Lane, sixth ranking contender in the 135-pound ranks, scored a unanimous and convincing victory over Lightburn, the ninth ranking contender from British Honduras in their bout at Biscayne arena Wednesday night.

SAVITT CAN'T PLAY

New York — (U.P.) — Another ray of hope for U.S. Davis Cup chances flickered out today with the announcement that Dick Savitt will be unable to compete on the American team. Savitt, 1951 Wimbledon champion who forced Australian star Ken Rosewall to five sets in the recent U. S. championships, told U.S. cup officials that his oil business in Houston, Tex., won't permit him to play in the cup matches.

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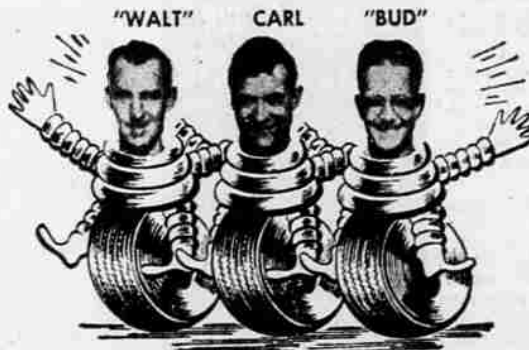
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
