

Tornado Anticipates Scrappy Indian Eleven Here on Friday

Roseburg sources appear to be minimizing the possibilities of their high school football aggregation for the 1956 season but the Medford Black Tornado still expects to be up against a spirited, scrappy and speedy, although lightweight, crew when it hears the opening whistle against the Indians at 8:15 p.m. here Friday in the third non-league engagement of the year for both schools.

Roseburg, which would have had seven lettermen, around whom to build a club for this season, got a big boost in the persons of two capable transfers, Jimmy Brown and Eddie LaRouque. The two are the most experienced men on the club mentored by Bob George and his aide, Bob Easter.

Brown is a three-year veteran from Kelso, Wash. A member of Roseburg's junior American Legion baseball team, he saw his first Indian duty at fullback last week and looked mighty good, carrying the ball 20 times for 99 yards against Ashland.

LaRouque is a quarterback who came from Billings, Mont. He reportedly "looks pretty good so far but has lots of room for improvement." He's a fair passer and okeh at handing the ball off.

The non-transfer vets are Bill Oerding, halfback, and quarterback Chuck Ridenour, center. Stan Bork and Jim Hicks, guards, Don Horton, tackle, and Fred Skeels and Russ Pinard, ends.

Oerding was the No. 2 quarterback of the Indians in 1955. He's to alternate at halfback and quarter this year and will be used some as a passer. Oerding is fair runner. Along with Brown, he was on the Legion club and got a late football start.

Pinard was used to fill in at fullback in the first game of the season but with the coming of Brown was moved to the flank to take up much needed slack. Lee Stone, halfback, has been

the workhorse, so far. The "very fast" 136-pounder is Roseburg's leading ground gainer with 217 yards in two games.

Skeels, who does the punting, averages close to 40 yards, and Dave Bradley may be the starting end, although Pinard could have the nod over Bradley. Bork and Hicks likely will open at guards. They've been terrific this year, especially on defense. Horton and Vasey are the likely starting tackles. Ridenour gets the bid for the pivot slot and is a scrappy player with much hustle.

Roseburg's roster lists seven men in the 190 or 200-pound class but the foregoing list of possible starters stacks up as a fairly light line-up. Among the backs, Brown, Oerding and LaRouque are listed as 160-pounders. In the line Skeels is heaviest at 191. Ridenour is down at 185 and Vasey at 183. Horton at 174 is the only other likely starter shown at more than the 170 mark.

In the Medford camp head coach Fred Spiegelberg still has his fingers crossed on the matter of colds. However, fullback Bobby Gee was the only player missing practice for that reason yesterday. He was expected back in school today. Gee still is a probable offense starter against

Roseburg but his service on defense will depend on how he feels at game time.

Spiegelberg said that the Tornado had a good drill yesterday despite the damp weather. The squad, he said, did not get too wet.

The tutor indicated that the opening line-ups may be about the same as for the past two games. If Medford launches out on offense the crew may be Dick Coppel and Mike Stearns, ends; Neil Plumley and Larry Cranston, tackles; Bob Apple and Tom Merton, guards; Dick Swinney or Jim Funston, center; Dick McLaughlin, quarterback; Gordon Owsley or Gary Riley, left half; Eldon Francis, right half; and Gee, fullback.

The opening defensive team may have Coppel and Stearns, ends; Plumley and Cranston, tackles; Apple or Dean Rickard, middle guard; McLaughlin, Merton and Funston, linebackers; Francis and Riley, halfbacks; and Owsley, safety.

Roseburg has lost to Hillsboro 12 to 7 and defeated Ashland 42 to 0 while Medford has a 34 to 12 win over Jefferson of Portland and 37 to 6 triumph over Milwaukie.

The west side grandstand here will be reserved for students only the rest of the season.

A glance over the roster in the Southern Oregon college football press book shows that the Red Raiders are almost entirely a southern Oregon or southwestern Oregon squad. Of the 37 playoffs listed 30 are from the southwest area of the state and only four have out-of-state prep backgrounds.

Grants Pass has the biggest representation on the SOC team which will appear in the Medford Senior High school field for the first time since Pearl Bowl days. Six ex-Cavemen are on the Raider squad which will go against the Humboldt State here on Saturday. Medford has four on the club as does Klamath Falls. Three of the players prepped at Ashland and three at North Bend. Two each come from Malin and Lakeview. Other high schools represented from within the state are Marshfield, Central Point, Eugene, Roseburg, Waldport, Baker, Cave Junction, Myrtle Point and Jacksonville.

Among gridders from out of state is Bill Seymour. His high school days were at Wynore, Neb., but Ashland is home now for his family. Others from other states are John Garrett, Yuma, Ariz., Hank Smith, Crescent City, Calif., and Willie Jones, Hornbrook, Calif.

ROMINE OUTSTANDING

Ex-Medford high men on the Raider club are tackle Chuck Romine, guard Wilson Gilinsky and guard Jack Gregory. End Gerald Darland is ex-St. Mary's of Medford.

Romine, 225 pounds and 25 years of age, a junior, is described in the book as the most outstanding lineman on the SOC team last year. He was named on the Oregon College Conference all-star second team. "Has a good head and a reliable 60-minute man," his sketch says. Gregory, 170, freshman, was All-Southern Oregon conference last year at Medford. He has a reputation in SOC drills as a good tackler. Gilinsky, 180, is experiencing his second year of football at Southern Oregon. Darland, 170, is described as promising and the book says he "should be a key man with experience

and steady improvement."

COLLEY KEY MAN

Herb Colley, 6-4, 210 and 24 years old is a two-year SOC letterman whose pre-college play was at former Central Point High school. He is regarded as "another key man in the SOC football machine. John Godlove, 180 pounds and 23 years old, football at Jacksonville high. He's an end and halfback.

POSTS RENAMED

Coach Al Akins terms his guards the "checkers" and his tackles the "trappers." The players have gone him a couple better by terming the center the "hanger" and the ends the "loafers."
