

Stevenson Pledged Support by United Steel Workers in Candidacy

Resolution Backs Executive Council In Helping Demos

Los Angeles — (UP) — Adlai E. Stevenson today had the support of the United Steel Workers of America in campaigning for the nation's highest office.

The union at its annual convention to convene in the action of the AFL-CIO Executive Council in backing the Democratic team in Stevenson and Estes Kefauver.

The resolution, which cited the union's traditional policy of political nonpartisanship, was adopted by acclamation. It stated:

"On the basis of the record, without endorsing either political party and in conformity with our traditional nonpartisan policy, we concur in the action of the Executive Council and the General Board of the AFL-CIO in endorsing Adlai E. Stevenson for President and Estes Kefauver for vice president."

Delegates Hear Candidate

The action came shortly after Stevenson spoke to the 3,000 delegates by telephone from Washington. The Democratic presidential nominee opened his message by saying "I ask your help to win."

The appeal was answered over the telephone by Union President David J. McDonald who declared:

"Gov. Stevenson, the steel workers will present and adopt a resolution endorsing you and Sen. Kefauver for the presidency and vice presidency. And we won't stop with this endorsement, but will get out and work and spend some money for you."

Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) was the main speaker of the session and he drew loud applause from delegates in attacking the administration's labor record. He told the convention he liked the Republican secretary of labor, James Mitchell, but wondered how much Republicans liked him.

Disagreement Recalled

Kennedy said he could recall when Secretary Mitchell spoke out against state right to work laws and the President disagreed with him.

The senator said the President told a press conference that Mitchell's views "did not necessarily represent administration views." Kennedy said that was an example of the administration's "pretending to be labor" on the one hand and then "saying things to the rich that make the rich know that they are with them."

The convention also adopted a policy resolution urging replacement of the Taft-Hartley act with a law based on the old Wagner act. Other resolutions passed were for a continuing drive for repeal of right to work laws in 17 states and for more liberal legislation to expand civil rights.

Nixon Talks Power, Peace, Prosperity in Northwest

En Route With Nixon — (UP) — Vice President Richard M. Nixon talked of power, peace and prosperity today to the power-conscious voters of the Pacific Northwest.

But Nixon stressed as much as anything in his whirlwind tour the "morality" of the Eisenhower administration and the need for a Republican Congress to carry out its program.

Scarcely rested from Wednesday's busy campaigning in California, Nevada and Oregon, Nixon launched into one of the toughest days of his 32-state ordeal.

Schedules Full Day

Today's schedule called for him to appear at rallies in Boise and Nampa, Idaho, and in Spokane, Wash. At midnight, he flies to Rapid City, S.D., for a campaign assault on the Midwest Friday.

In remarks prepared for appearances at Boise and Nampa, Nixon accused the Democrats of "trying to paint in blacks and whites" the "extremely complicated issue" of power development.

He said the opposition's program of "single shot" federal development of all projects, regardless of their circumstances, "will not work because it cannot tap all the immense resources" of the Northwest states.

Urges Welker's Re-election

Nixon urged the re-election of Sen. Herman Welker (R-Idaho), who is challenged by Democrat Frank Church, with almost the same enthusiasm that he entreated Oregon voters Wednesday night at Eugene to support former Interior Secretary Douglas McKay. McKay is fighting to upset Sen. Wayne L. Morse (D-Ore.).

In the first two days of his 15,000-mile swing, Nixon concentrated his speeches on several main themes — defense of the Eisenhower record, peace and prosperity, the administration's morality and digs at former President Harry S. Truman.

Some of his biggest cheers have come when he challenged the Democrats to fight out the campaign on the question of "morality."

He dared Democrats to compare the morality of the Truman administration with that of the Eisenhower administration.

"We'll be glad to do it at any hour of the day or night," he told audience after audience.

Although Nixon carefully avoided any personal criticism of Democratic Presidential Nominee Adlai E. Stevenson or of his running mate, Estes Kefauver, Nixon has repeatedly criticized

Mr. Truman for one remark or another.

However, he has gone out of his way to renounce charges by Democrats that he labeled them the "party of treason" in the 1954 campaign.

Loyalty Unquestioned

"I have never at any time questioned the loyalty of people who have been the leaders of the Democratic party," Nixon told newsmen at Eugene airport yesterday.

But he added:

"I have questioned their judgment when I thought it was bad."

Nixon harped on the Korean war and its "157,000 killed, wounded or missing" in most of his speeches. It was a key point in his emphasis on the "peace" aspect of the GOP campaign.

"The decision to go into Korea was right and Mr. Truman was correct," he told newsmen at one press conference, "but I believe the policies followed prior to going into Korea made war more possible."

Nixon made it clear last night

that the Republicans consider a McKay-over-Morse victory in Oregon their number one objective in the 1956 senatorial campaigning.

But he also was plugging hard for Rep. Clifton R. Young (R-Nev.) against Sen. Alan Bible (D-Nev.). Welker over Church and Gov. Arthur B. Langlie of Washington, the GOP keynoter at San Francisco, against Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.).

Nixon's speech to a crowd of 7,200 that failed to fill the University of Oregon's McArthur court last night wound up a day of campaigning that began in his home town of Whittier, Calif., and took him through Reno and later to Oregon.

Of McKay, the vice president said:

"His superb qualifications as an expert on problems of the west, combined with the fact that he is so well and favorably known in the executive branch of the government, will assure that he will be an effective senator from the moment he is sworn in on Jan. 7."

Kefauver, Adlai See Eye-To-Eye On Nixon's 'Sweetness' Campaigning

Morehead, Minn. — (UP) — Democratic vice presidential candidate Estes Kefauver said today that he and his running mate, Adlai E. Stevenson, see "eye to eye" on what Kefauver called the new "sweetness and lightness" campaigning of Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Close associates of Kefauver said that he would hammer away at a demand that Nixon apologize to Democrats for past campaign charges until the No. 2 GOP candidate makes a definite reply.

The Kefauver associates noted that GOP National Chairman Leonard W. Hall kept demanding a statement from Stevenson on Alger Hiss until the Democratic presidential candidate came out with a flat public statement of belief in the guilt of Hiss.

Kefauver Wednesday called upon Nixon to show the sincerity of his "sweetness and lightness" campaigning by apologizing publicly to Democratic leaders, not named, for past inferences that they were disloyal.

Before taking his whistle

stumping tour by plane and auto into Montana today, Kefauver told newsmen that he was "sure that Mr. Stevenson and I see the Nixon matter eye to eye."

In a speech prepared for delivery at a Democratic rally at the Richmond County Fairgrounds at Sidney, Mont., Kefauver continued his pitch for votes of farmers.

He charged that the Eisenhower administration's farm policy has been "to, deliberately or otherwise, deflate farm prices."

Wheat Supports Cited

He also accused Mr. Eisenhower of raising the level of price supports for wheat, a major Montana crop this year, because of a fear of "a Democratic landslide in the farm states next November."

In his all out bid for the farm vote, Kefauver said the only way that the farmers of this country can save themselves from the disaster of broken campaign promises and steadily deepening depression was by returning the Democratic party to power.

He noted that the recent Democratic National Convention pledged to restore 100 per cent of parity prices to the farmers.

"We mean what we say," he said, "and we will not stop until we have achieved a full, fair share of the nation's income for our farmers."

Stevenson To Counter Republican Project Of 'Truth Squads'

Washington — (UP) — Adlai E. Stevenson mapped a counter attack today against the Republican project of following up Democratic campaigners with "truth squads."

Stevenson's press secretary, Clayton Fritchey, said the Democratic presidential nominee would have "a few well chosen remarks" to make on the subject in a speech tonight at nearby Silver Springs, Md.

He said Stevenson remarked to his staff that "it is significant the Republicans can make page one headlines by promising to tell the truth."

To Finish Speech

Stevenson will spend the day putting the finishing touches to the speech, conferring with advisers, and working on a series of papers he will issue hitting specific campaign topics.

Fritchey Wednesday revealed Stevenson's plans to hand down formal papers from time to time in the seven weeks before the

election. Each will cover a single subject.

Two such "policy statements" now are in the works, Fritchey said. One will cover the problems of the nation's old people, and the other will be devoted to schools.

Papers Will Differ

Fritchey said these papers will differ from campaign speeches in that they will center on "positive aspects" of his program and go into problems in "much more detail and depth than is possible in a political talk."

Stevenson sent a telephone message Wednesday to the United Steelworkers convention at Los Angeles, criticizing Republicans for claiming credit for increasing the minimum wage to \$1 an hour.

Stevenson said he was "dismayed" by these claims because a Democratic Congress enacted the \$1 minimum "over the expressed objections" of President Eisenhower.

GOP 'Truth Squad' Hints Subpoena Waits Kefauver

Minneapolis — (UP) — The Republican "truth squad" has indicated it may have Democratic vice presidential candidate Estes Kefauver subpoenaed to give testimony in the Dixon-Yates contract controversy.

Ohio Rep. Gordon Scherer made the indication Wednesday night shortly after the squad arrived here on the heels of the Tennessee senator. Scherer said the subpoena of Kefauver probably would come as a result of his remarks in a speech at St. Paul, Minn., Tuesday night.

The congressman, however, said he would wait until after the November election before deciding whether to seek a subpoena of Kefauver.

Law Violation Seen

In his St. Paul speech, Kefauver said there may have been law violations by Eisenhower administration officials in handling the Dixon-Yates case. Kefauver also said President Eisenhower had "ample knowledge" to the contrary when he said last year that the action of a New York investment banker as adviser to his own firm and the bureau of the budget was "proper."

Earlier Wednesday, in news conferences at Milwaukee and Madison, Wis., Scherer read a statement in which Kefauver called the Dixon-Yates contract "the worst deal since Teapot Dome."

The Ohioan added that in the Truman administration's last year "an almost identical contract" was made with power companies in the Ohio Valley. Scherer said those contracts were "much more liberal" than the Dixon-Yates contract.

Hoover Report Would Mean Billions Saved In Taxes, Group Told

Greensboro, N.C. — (UP) — Adoption of the recommendations of the Hoover Commission would mean a \$5.5 billion annual cut in federal taxes, a Washington economist said here Wednesday.

Theron J. Rice, a special coordinator for the commission, said "taxes can be cut and cut plenty" if Americans would "trim the size and cost of this bloated government which is threatening to become our master instead of our servant."

Rice addressed some 150 industrial and business leaders at a lunch sponsored by the North Carolina Citizens Committee for the Hoover Report. He said the

commission's "carefully conceived economy blueprint" is a "sifted opportunity" for cutting taxes.

He said announcement of a balanced budget for 1957 is "far from comforting" because of higher revenues produced by the prosperity we now enjoy.

Rice said "in no sense is the 1957 budget an economy budget, because it ignores numerous expenditure reduction opportunities."

He said government spending "is on the rise again" and noted that the 1957 estimate of \$69.1 billion is \$4 billion higher than the January estimate.

Rice said the Hoover program could mean a reduction of about eight per cent in overall taxes and if the cut were applied "entirely to personal income taxes, this saving would permit a 15 per cent reduction."

Hoodlum Questioned In Attack on Riesel

New York — (UP) — The FBI questioned intensively today a burly garment district hoodlum arrested as a "dangerous" accomplice in the Victor Riesel acid blinding attack.

Theodore Rij, 43, former bodyguard to racketeer czar Johnny Dio, accused mastermind of the sneak assault, surrendered meekly to two New York City detectives Wednesday on a crowded mid-town Manhattan street corner.

Rij was caught less than 48 hours after the FBI had circulated 200,000 "fliers" and had launched a nationwide search for him.

He was accused of driving the getaway car used in the attack against the labor columnist.

The 240-pound "executive" of a dress firm vehemently denied that he was involved in the April 5 attack.

Tito May Be Target Of Khrushchev Visit

Belgrade, Yugoslavia — (UP) — Nikita Khrushchev's mysterious "vacation" in Yugoslavia may be designed to talk President Tito into breaking his last remaining ties with the West, political observers said today.

The Soviet Communist party boss arrived at the Adriatic resort island of Brioni Wednesday as the guest of Tito. Although he was officially just a Russian citizen on a holiday, there was widespread speculation as to the topic of his conversations with the Yugoslav president.

The governments of the two countries maintained an official silence on Khrushchev's visit announcing only that he arrived here for a brief "rest."

Iowa Town Waits President's Visit

Boone, Iowa — (UP) — Mamie Eisenhower's home town buzzed excitedly today awaiting the arrival of the President and his first lady but it was just a visit by "the folks" for the Joel Carlsons.

President and Mrs. Eisenhower were scheduled to arrive here late this afternoon for an overnight stay with Mrs. Eisenhower's uncle and his wife, Joel and Caroline Carlson.

They'll stay in the two-story white frame home at 420 Monona st. which was built in 1870 by Mrs. Eisenhower's maternal grandparents.

It is the house where Mrs. Eisenhower's mother, Mrs. John S. Doud, was born. Mamie herself was born just 3 1/2 blocks away.

Banners and flags marked the route the Eisenhowers will take through this Central Iowa Community of 12,500 when they arrive.

Mrs. Carlson, however, was taking the impending visit in stride. "Yes, the folks are coming," she said when the news first came.

"We're going to have dinner and sit around and visit during the evening," Mrs. Carlson said. She said she hadn't quite decided whether to have chicken or beef for dinner.
