Hitchcock Speaks At Local Meeting

Phil Hitchcock, Portland, who was defeated by Douglas McKay for the Republican nomination for U.S. senator in the primary election spoke in behalf of McKay at a meeting of the Republican Central committee at Medford High school last night.

Hitchcock said McKay has a long record of devoted service to the state, and a close relationship with President Eisenhower attained when McKay was secretary of the interior. He added that McKay has a well-earned reputation for morality and integrity in government.

Hitchcock said in his opinion more lies have been hurled at McKay than any other veterans.

He said he believed Republican groups should support McKay as candidates since those running for some of the top positions have distinguished records.

Also speaking at the meeting was Mrs. Jean Young, secretary of the state Republican state central committee, who discussed the importance of registration.

Mrs. Bereth Hopkins, Jackson county clerk, explained a recent opinion by Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton concerning temporary locations for voter registration.

Plans Completed For Highest Building

Lausanne, Switzerland — (U.P.) — A Swiss architect has completed plans for the highest building in the world, it was announced today.

According to blueprints by Prof. Alexandre Sarrazin of the Lausanne Institute of Technology, the reinforced concrete structure will be 1,800 feet tall and will cost an estimated \$4.6 million. The Empire State building in the United States is 1,472 feet tall and is topped by a 222-foot television tower.

Home Builders Given Boost in Action by Government Rulings

Washington — (U.P.) — The White House today announced four new government actions designed to strengthen the home building industry and make it easier to buy low cost homes.

The actions reduced the down-payment requirements for FHA-insured homes costing no more than \$9,000 from 7 to 5 per cent, eased mortgage sale requirements to make mortgage money more easily available, and relaxed the borrowing limits of members of the Home Loan Bank System to meet the heavier demands for mortgages.

Housing Administrator Albert M. Cole said the actions "will be of particular benefit to home buyers of modest means" and will "raise the level" of housing construction in the nation.

The action was taken by government home financing agencies in response to President Eisenhower's request for a review of housing credit needs in the United States.

The actions followed strong complaints from the housing industry that the government's hard money policies are holding down home construction across the nation. They said would-be home owners and builders in many areas are having trouble arranging mortgages because of "tight money" situations and higher interest rates.

Bargain Hunters Shop Around Stock Market

New York — (U.P.) — Bargain hunters cautiously shopped around on the stock market today after a further selloff had brought the industrial average to a new low since June 18 at midsession.

They bought in the railroad division. New York Central rose more than a point and a long list of other rails rose fractions.

Several other strong spots developed. Black & Decker gained two, Chrysler was up a point in the autos with the others steady as the new models interested the traders.

Cause of Bomber Crash Studied

Washington — (U.P.) — Investigators sought today to learn whether any basic fault caused a B52 bomber crash which took five lives Monday.

The crash near Merced, Calif., and subsequent grounding Wednesday of all B52s came at a time when the Point Chiefs of Staff were considering increasing the Air Force's planned B52 fleet by more than 50 per cent.

The Air Force has proposed equipping 16 wings with the B-52 carrying bombers instead of the presently-planned 11. To do so it would have to buy about 800 B52s. There now are 500 on order.

So far, Air Force authorities said, there is no reason to suspect that the accident Monday had the same cause as the B52 crash last Feb. 16 which also brought on a temporary grounding order.

Authorities as yet see no evidence of a dangerous pattern of trouble in the 650-mile-an-hour intercontinental jet bombers.

The crash last February was caused by disintegration of a part which relayed power to the planes' electrical system. All but a few of the B52s which had the faulty part have now been modified.

About 100 B52s have now been built. The exact number is secret.
