No Detectable Water Vapor or Oxygen
Noted by Scientists in Mars Atmosphere

Washington — The planet Mars, despite its wintry show of glistening polar icecaps, holds no detectable water vapor or oxygen in its atmosphere.

This is the conclusion of scientists who recently returned from an observation post near the summit of the volcano Mauna Loa on Hawaii. The expedition was sponsored jointly by the National Geographic Society and the National Bureau of Standards.

The project was led by Dr. C. C. Kieess, a veteran spectroscopist of the Bureau. He was assisted by C. H. Corliss, of the Bureau's spectroscopy section, and their respective wives, Mrs. Harriet Kieess and Mrs. Edith Corliss, both skilled spectroscopists.

Using the most powerful and sensitive spectroscopic equipment now available, the husband-wife teams sought an answer to one of Mars' most tantalizing mysteries: "Does it have sufficient oxygen and moisture to maintain forms of life similar to those on earth?"

Life Not Ruled Out

Spectro-analysis of the sunlight reflected from Mars showed no atmospheric features similar to those on earth, but Dr. Kieess said their findings do not preclude life on the red planet

which is now making its closest approach to earth in the mid-20th century.

Dr. Kieess said it is possible that a mere glaze of frost covers Mars' poles. A thin layer could reflect sunlight dazzlingly, yet emit insufficient water vapor to be measured at present on earth.

Some scientists, Dr. Kieess noted, believe lichens or plants of a similarly simple nature exist on Mars. Lichens, for example, can withstand extremes of drought, heat, and cold.

The Kieesses and Corlisses arrived at Hilo, Hawaii, in late June and trucked their equipment to the United States Weather Bureau's new Mauna Loa Observatory at 11,134 feet. The station stands about 5,000 feet over the inversion layer of the trade-wind belt, which means that observations could be taken in clear, crisp night air well above the greater portion of water vapor in the earth's atmosphere.

"The scene in almost every direction from our station was one of vast volcanic devastation," Dr. Kieess said. "Nothing is seen but cinders of all sizes resembling coke, and flow-lava which has taken on all kinds of grotesque shapes."

In a large spectrograph the scientists mounted two diffraction gratings—screenlike devices that spread light into a spectrum. One grating was ruled with about 90,000 parallel lines, 15,000 per inch, to record the spectra on a scale of 125 angstrom units to the inch. The other grating, with about 180,000 rulings, 30,000 to the inch, recorded the spectra on a scale of 50 angstrom units per inch.

During July the couples made long, intensive observations of Mars. Mrs. Kieess and Mrs. Corliss kept house in the isolated observatory, as well as taking their regular turns at the spectrograph.

With the two gratings, the scientists obtained two excellent sets of deep-red photographs recording the yellow, orange and red spectral regions. It is in these regions that the spectrograph shows strong absorption bands caused by oxygen and water vapor in the earth's atmosphere.

Dr. Kieess and his colleagues knew that if similar absorption was taking place in Mars' atmosphere, bands identical with those of the earth would show up on the spectrograph. However, it would be possible to detect any Martian bands easily because the speed with which the two planets approached each other in July was sufficient to cause a shift of lines in Mars' spectrum.

In addition to comparing the spectra of earth and Mars, that of the moon was photographed on the same plate.

Faint Atmospheric Belts Mars, which has been found to have faint atmospheric belts, showed no spectral features due to oxygen and water vapor that were different from those of the moon, which has no atmosphere.

"We must therefore conclude," Dr. Kieess said, "that if oxygen and water vapor exist in the atmosphere of Mars, their amounts must be too small to be detected spectroscopically."

At Bloemfontein, South Africa, the Mars Expedition of the Society and Arizona's Lowell Observatory meanwhile has been studying Mars for the last three months. Under the direction of planet expert Dr. E. C. Sipher, observers have watched the south polar cap shrink as spring advances across the planet. Dr. Sipher has long studied the seasonal advance of blue-green areas on Mars, giving credence to the belief that some type of life, however primitive, exists there.

Shrimp Marked for
Protection Study

Galveston, Tex. — (U.P.)—Biologists of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service have begun a full-scale study to protect and even expand the \$100,000,000 a year shrimp fishing industry of the Texas Gulf Coast.

A technique for marking the shrimp with dye to study their life and habits was perfected by Charles Dawson of the marine biology department of the University of Texas to make the study possible.

A large two-story building is being remodeled at Fort Crockett, an abandoned Army base, into a special laboratory for the study and biologist Tom Costello, in charge, said marked shrimp will be placed in the Gulf of Mexico water, probably next spring.

The shrimp later will be caught by commercial and sports fishermen and returned to the laboratory for study.

Costello said the purpose of the study will be to correlate the effects of natural factors with the known fluctuations in population among the Gulf shrimp. In other words, what does or does not affect the shrimp population?

"We are interested in the effect solar radiation has on shrimp as well as the effects of temperature and nutrient changes," Costello said. "Salinity (salt) factors will also be investigated."
