Hunting Season Without Deaths Red Hat Objective

Portland—No hunter need die in Oregon this year, despite the fact that a record 300,000 nimrods will seek their big game animal, nor should there be a single forest fire started by a hunter's carelessness.

That is the high goal set by sportsmen and forest protection groups as they pool their resources behind an intensive second annual campaign of hunter safety through the Governor's Red Hat Days committee. The program opened today.

"Last year 10 hunters lost their lives," said L. C. Binford, chairman of the Red Hat committee. "These lives could have been saved, if reasonable safety had been practiced. There were 85 hunters' fires in 1955, and not one of these would have started had hunters practiced reasonable care in putting out warming fires and cigarettes."

Room For Improvement

"Relations between hunters and landowners are the finest ever," Binford said. "There is room for improvement. Last year there was still too much vandalism. Every hunter should subscribe to the Red Hat pledge." State forester Dwight Phipps, in an effort to prevent inconvenience to hunters, urged that they watch newspapers and radio stations for any announcements of closures of specific areas in the event of critical fire weather. Phipps said advance notice would be given if possible, but only extreme fire weather conditions would cause closures.

Recent rains west of the Cascades have not extended to eastern Oregon, the Keep Oregon Green Association warned. Continued high temperatures and

New Arcs, Turf On Talent Field

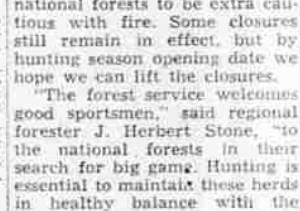
Talent—Talent high will have its first football game under the new lights on its field this evening when it plays Eagle Point.

Continuous irrigation with an overhead system and heavy fertilization produced excellent turf in a short time. School Superintendent Roy B. Parr reported.

Lights have been engineered so that baseball, as well as football can be played in the illuminated arena. There are 80 floodlights of 1500 watts each. Future plans call for a grandstand with dressing room and a track and field layout.

Tonight's game will be at 8 o'clock.

Video, Newsreel Ban for Games Draws Protests

Melbourne — (AP) — The Australian press denounced today the action of the Australian Olympic Committee in "black-out" TV and theatre newsreel coverage of the 1956 Olympic Games.

The editorial attacks backed similar charges by the world's largest news film agencies that the committee's restrictions would restrict television and motion picture news programs in the United States, Canada, Great Britain and Europe.

All three of Melbourne's morning newspapers attacked the action of the committee. "It is unthinkable that there should be an Olympic Games blackout abroad in television and newsreels," the Melbourne Sun Pictorial said.

"What the Olympic committee seeks to gain commercially must be submerged by what everyone hopes will be the best advertising opportunity Australia has ever had."
