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Kefauver Blames Tight Money Policy

Springfield — U.P. — Sen. Estes Kefauver Friday blamed what he called Republican "hard money" policies for the Northwest's slack lumber market.

The Democratic candidate for vice president ended his Oregon barnstorming tour with the claim that "the tight money policy of the administration is reflected in growing unemployment in the plywood and lumber industry, and also in the building trades."

Tennessee senator asserted that "this policy actually contributes to inflation."

He added, "The only beneficiaries are the big business interests who are running this administration, one of whom, Douglas McKay, is also running for election here in Oregon."

Kefauver also spoke at Pendleton and Klamath Falls yesterday, declaring that Democratic policies would improve the lot of the Indian on Oregon reservations.

Wing-Swept Plane 11 Years in Making

Edwards AFB, Calif. — U.P. — The Bell X2 experimental swept-wing fighter plane which Defense Secretary Charles Wilson admitted has set a new world altitude record has been 11 years in coming of age.

An Air Force spokesman said Saturday that since the X2 went to the drawing boards more than a decade ago it has undergone constant revision. The past five years have been spent in experimenting with the completed craft and its ultimate performance figures still are not known.

Reportedly the X2 has reached 126,000 feet and 1,800 miles an hour.

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Beating Charges To Be Heard Monday

Oregon City—U.P.—Three men charged with robbing and beating the proprietress of a Brightwood tavern were slated to appear before Judge Howard Blanding here Monday to enter pleas.

The three, Larry Dwayne Simmons of Roseburg and Ben Workman and Robert Elvins of Sandy, were arraigned in district court here Friday and bail for each was set at \$15,000.

The three were arrested Thursday, less than two hours after Mrs. Joyce Boisterous at the Brightwood tavern had been robbed of some \$50 and beaten on the head with a revolver.

A life prison sentence in New York automatically operates as a decree of divorce if the prisoner is married.

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
