

White-Jersied Tornadoes Win Third Straight, Outhorse Roseburg 40-14

Indians Put Up Stubborn Resistance

Marshfield, No. 1 in State, Medford's Next

Medford's bruising, battering Tornado, a potent Wind on cleats, claimed its third victim of the year by a decisive margin Friday night and turned its attention to one of its biggest games of the year and its final encounter before entering Southern Oregon conference play.

Resplendent in brand new white jerseys, the Tornado galed its way to a 40 to 14 triumph over the outhorse but doggedly stubborn Indians of Roseburg high. Victory set the stage for Oregon prepdom's biggest scramble of next week end.

Medford entertains the Marshfield high Pirates, defending state champions, Friday night in a non-counter but still a struggle for prestige. Marshfield rated No. 1 in the state, defeated Grants Pass 20 to 0. The Tornado is ranked as No. 2 by the United Press board of coaches.

Obstinate Foe

Living well up to its established reputation as southern Oregon gridiron powerhouse, a rugged forceful machine, the Tornado, nevertheless, found the Roseburg eleven an obstinate visitor. The home club had to grind and bull for most of its first half yardage.

Medford was not so sharp in its charging as in its two previous encounters of the year and the explosiveness of the week before wasn't so often shown. But the pinching defense of the Indians, which sometimes upset the Medford blocking, had a lot to do with slowing the Tornado attack.

Reserved seat tickets for the Medford-Marshfield high football game here Friday night, Sept. 28, will go on sale at 7 a.m. Monday at the senior high school office. Principal Lester Harris stated that sales will be limited to four tickets per person.

Two Medford touchdowns came in the first quarter. The Tornado promenade from the opening kick-off with Gary Riley going over. Next time Medford got the ball Medford scored again with Riley doing the last lugging. Bobby Gee crossed for a second canto TD after a pass interception by Eldon Francis.

In the third quarter Francis returned a punt for 65 yards and a six pointer and Loren Christean followed with a 68-yard touchdown ramble. Christean got another in the fourth.

Jim Brown bucked for a Roseburg TD in the fourth and the Indians got the other on the fourth on a Bill Oerding to Dave Bradley pass.

Medford required a total of 13 plays to go 75 yards against a grudging Indian contingent for its first TD. The Tornado banged and bumped its way after Gordon Owsley had run back the starting kick eight yards.

Riley, Francis, Gee, Owsley and Dick McLaughlin handled the ball packing behind the rugged line. Most of the yardage came three and four yards at a try but Francis shook loose for a gain of 12. Riley romped for 19 and Owsley for 10.

Riley boomed over the right side for the final three. Medford headed 7 to 0 when Dick Coplee toed the first of his four conversions.

Coplee's kick-off went deep into Indian territory and Tom Hamlin nailed Lee Stone on the Roseburg four yard line. On fourth down Bill Oerding punted from his end zone. Medford took over for its second goal-ward march on the Roseburg 34.

Penalties Hamper
It took the Tornado eight plays to make it in a drive hampered by two five-yard penalties. All of the moves except one, an 18-yard screen pass play, McLaughlin to Owsley, were for gains of eight and under. Riley shot off right tackle for the final six and Coplee booted another bonus for 14 to 0, still in the first quarter.

Roseburg battled to the Medford 36 after next kick-off but Oerding was forced to punt from the 41 early in the second peri-

Crater Comets, Redmond Panthers Deadlock 13-13

Central Point—A fourth down pass, completed to an allegedly ineligible receiver, kept the Redmond high offensive alive in the closing minutes of the combat and enabled the Panthers to tie the Crater Comets here Friday night 13 to 13.

The pass, from back Dave McRae to guard Dean LeRoy, came with about three minutes left in the game. It took the Panthers from the Crater 17 yard line to the one. Redmond was penalized back to 16-yard line for holding, but on the next play Rod Reid took a pitchout and went over for the touchdown. Earl Schultz booted the tying extra point.

Had officials penalized Redmond for the disputed pass Crater would have taken over possession of the ball and probably would have held on to their one touchdown edge.

Another fourth down pass in the first quarter gave the Panthers their opening score, McRae tossed to Al Schopshire.

Juveland Goes 62

George Juveland ran the third quarter kick-off 62 yards to the Redmond 14. Wayne Allen passed to Carl Koellner to the four. Don Goyette gained to the one and Allen sneaked from there.

In the same period Don Hubbard fell on a Redmond muf on the Panther 44. Goyette broke loose from there to tally with Allen Barnes laying on the key block. Juveland quick-hit the conversion.

Redmond had the margin in overall net yards 292 to 192. First downs favored the Panthers 11 to 7.

The Comets of Crater turned in a fine performance with good tackling and downfield blocking. Juveland and Goyette were of offensive guns. Don Hubbard had a great night in the line and was in almost every tackle.

Sophomore quarterback Allen of the Comets got off punts which traveled 62 and 63 yards, 52 and 53 from the line of scrimmage.

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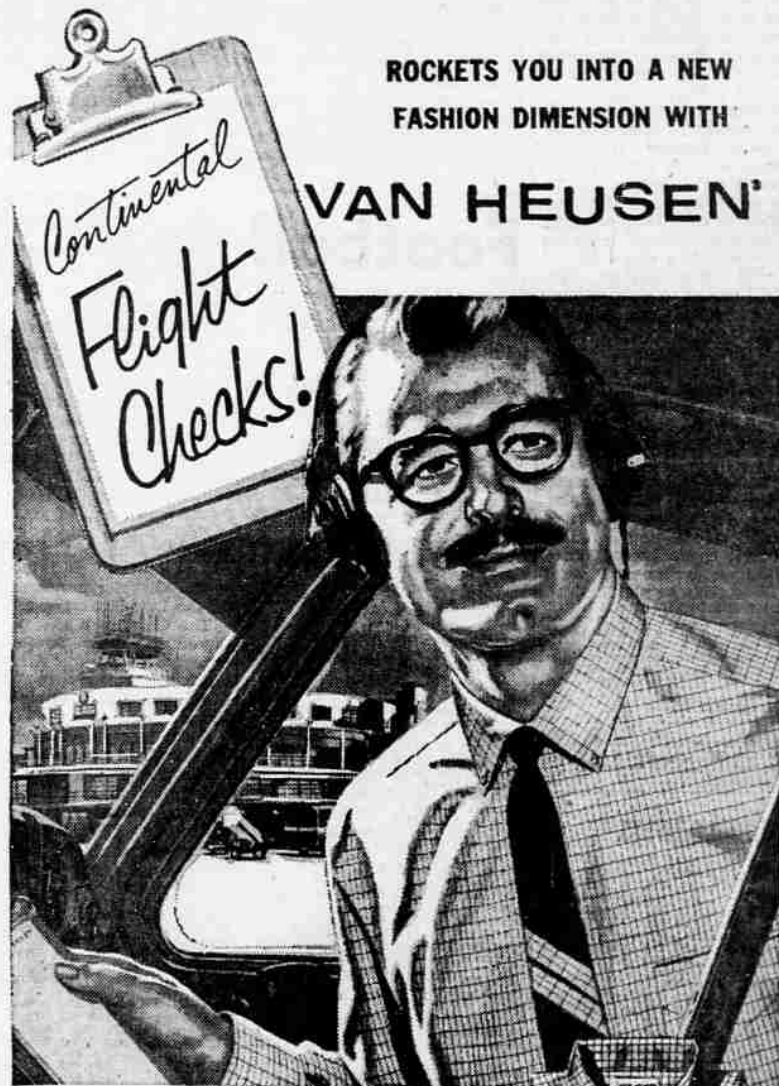
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
