Ducks Drub Colorado In 35-0 Victory

Crowd of 40,500 See Oregon 'Eye' Rose Bowl

Boulder, Colo. — (UPI) — Oregon University's strong football team, definitely eyeing the Rose Bowl, tuned up for Pacific Coast conference competition Saturday by drubbing Greenhorn Colorado University, 35-0, before 40,500 fans in warm fall weather.

The largest crowd ever to see a football game in Colorado filled newly expanded Folsom stadium to watch the season opener for both teams.

Colorado threatened to score only once, but was turned back two yards from the Oregon goal.

Oregon's underrated line smothered the Buffaloes, who gained only 64 yards on the ground. Oregon's fast, hard-hitting backs piled up 364 yards.

Crabtree Throws TD Pass

Oregon scored only once in the first half while wearing Colorado down but added two touchdowns in each of the final two periods.

Quarterback Jack Crabtree passed four yards to end Ron Stover in the opening period for Oregon's first score, after full-back Jack Morris and Fred Miklanic had carried the weight of a 47-yard march.

Colorado almost scored early in the second period. Quarterback Boyd Dowler intercepted a pass thrown by Oregon quarterback Tom Crabtree (no relation to Jack) and hot-footed it 33 yards to the Webfoot three. But Colorado netted only one yard in four line plays.

In the third period, Jack Crabtree passed to halfback Jim Shanley behind the Colorado secondary for a scoring play that carried 64 yards, and a little later halfback LeRoy Phelps returned a punt to the Colorado 21. A series of line plays moved the ball to the one, where Miklanic hammered over.

In the fourth period, Oregon moved 67 yards, with Shanley Halfback Roger Daniels dashed 43 yards to set up the final score, made by halfback Charles Tourville on a nine-yard jaunt with 15 seconds to play.

Brooklyn Holds Slim Lead Over Milwaukee

Cincinnati Redlegs Make Another Bid for 'Pennant Nobody Wants' With Win Over Cards

The Brooklyn Dodgers retained a .002-point lead over the Milwaukee Braves Saturday in a National League race the quipsters are saying is for a pennant nobody wants.

For a second time within 24 hours the world champion Dodgers bowed to the Pittsburgh Pirates—this time by 5-1—but the Braves failed to take advantage of the opportunity to seize the lead when they suffered a 10-inning, 5-4 loss to the Chicago Cubs.

As a result, the Dodgers still held a one-game lead in the "lost" column with a season's record of 88-59 compared to the Braves' 89-60 mark. The Dodgers have seven games left and the Braves only five.

Friend Hurts In Relief

Luis Arroyo, who had scored only two previous victories all season, took over for Vern Law in the third inning and, with ninth-inning relief aid from Bob Friend, shut out the Dodgers the remainder of the way.

The Braves knew when they started their game in Milwaukee that the Dodgers already had

Wesley And Francis Lead OSC Attack

Bevos Not Slowed in 19-13 Win

Degree Heat in 19-13 Win

Columbia, Mo. — (UPI) — Speedy Sam Wesley, a 165-pound scat-back from Dallas, Tex., and Joe Francis, sturdy tailback from Honolulu, Hawaii, powered Oregon State to a 19-13 win over Missouri Saturday in an inter-sectional game played in 93-degree heat before an estimated 22,000.

Wesley scrambled 62 yards on a pass from Francis in the second period for the longest touchdown scored in the game. Francis went nine yards in the third period for what proved to be the winning tally. Wesley converted.

The two were the standouts of the flashy single-wing backfield which baffled Missouri's defenses and spoiled the opener for coach Don Faurot, inventor of the split-T, who is in his final season as Missouri coach.

Sterling Hammack and Paul Lowe each ground out five yards in the first period with Hammack going for an Oregon state touchdown.

Missouri came back with 77-yard drive early in the second period. With halfback Chuck James going eight yards for the tally, Quarterback Jimmy Hunter and Dave Doane missed Missouri's second touchdown in the second period, with Doane throwing 12 yards to halfback Hank Kuhlman for the touchdown. Specialist John Stout converted and Missouri held a 13-12 halftime lead.

Missouri had its back to the goal line most of the third period but turned the tables and threatened several times in the fourth. Once Missouri failed four straight times from the nine-yard line. Another saw Hunter fumble on his own 15.

Besides his speedy off-tackle carries, Wesley was the game's top pass receiver with 72 yards for two catches, both from Francis. He also gained 63 on the ground to lead Oregon State. Tom Berry picked up 47 yards in 11 carries.

Hunter was the top player for Missouri, completing three of 11 passes for 29 yards and carrying 17 times for 75 yards. Fullback George Cramer picked up 61 yards in 10 carries.
