Varied Services Are Provided by Medford Salvation Army Unit

(Editor's note: This is another in a series of articles about agencies which receive funds contributed during the annual United Medford Crusade.)

Although known world-wide for its humanitarian services, the Salvation Army is probably more famous for its work on "Skid Row" and with armed service men and women than for assisting women and children.

Its services are not just for troubled or needy, either. Young business women employed in larger cities, for example, find a cheerful, wholesome and inexpensive "home" environment at residences and hotels operated by the Salvation Army.

Other services to women and children range from providing unmarried mothers with shelter, medical care, and counseling to operating day nurseries, youth clubs and summer camps.

Medford Corps — The Medford corps of the Salvation Army has a program of service which surpasses that of most comparable cities the size of Medford. For instance, local services offered includes summer camping for underprivileged children with no fee charged, youth club program, sunbeam troop for girls 6 to 12, leadership training for youth over 12 years of age, ladies home league who make baby clothes and blankets, thrift shop for families to purchase clothing at a small cost, league of mercy that makes regular visits to hospitals, convalescent homes, and the county jail.

In addition to these services, the local Salvation Army provides service to unmarried mothers, family and individual counseling, family welfare, and Christmas and winter relief.

There also is in operation 24 hours a day every day in the year the Salvation Army transient shelter. An average of 2,500 men are given lodging and meals per year in the shelter located on Crews rd. just on Crater Lake highway. In addition to a dormitory which sleeps 24 single men, three private rooms are set aside for families and single women. For those in need of clothing besides food and lodging the thrift store provides this at no cost to the individual or family.
