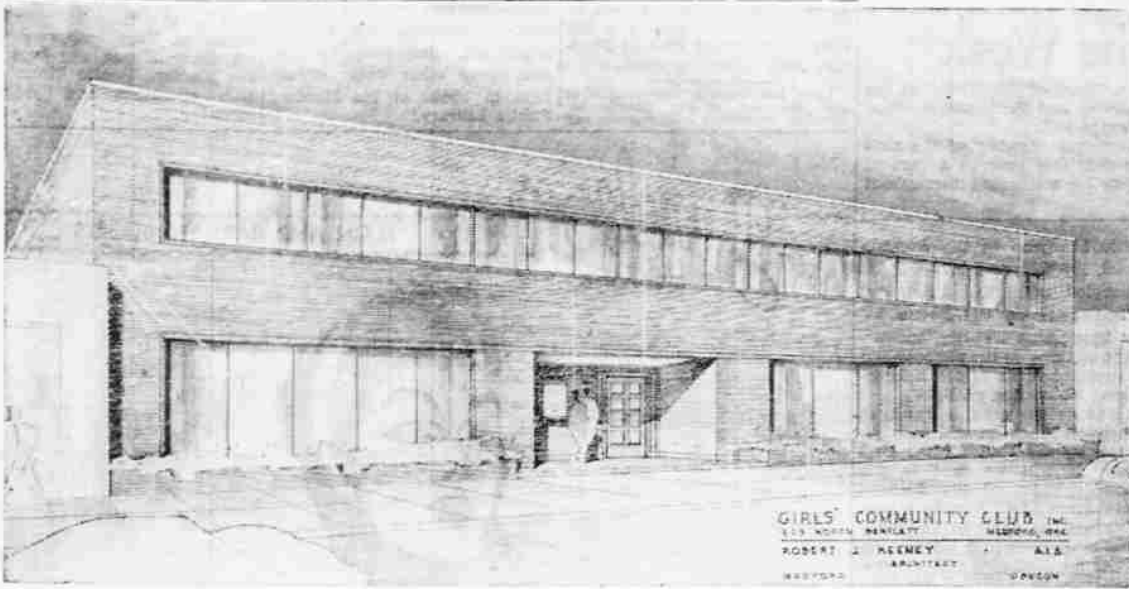




Girls' Community club directors have announced that the club will erect a two-story building at 229 North Bartlett, site of the present clubhouse, and pictured here is an architect's sketch of the proposed structure. The club, operated since 1920 as a residence for young employed girls and a meeting center for groups of the city, has sufficient funds to build the new clubhouse but must conduct a campaign to raise money for furnishings and for

a trust fund to assure maintenance. The new building will have a 70 by 40 foot recreation room on the ground floor which can be converted into various sizes by way of folding doors, a large kitchen, offices, foyer, storage closet and other facilities on the first floor. Twelve bedrooms with accommodations for two girls each, as well as matron's quarters, take up the second floor.

Girls' Community Club Plans New Building With Enlarged Dormitory and Club Rooms

Plans for a new two-story clubhouse for Girls' Community club were announced yesterday by the directors of the club. It will be erected on the site of the present clubhouse, 229 North Bartlett street, and construction will begin about December 1, it was stated.

The board, headed by Mrs. Dolph Phillips, president, reported sufficient voluntary contributions have been received to make possible construction of the new modern building. They added, "The board feels very gratified that its plan for the operation and management of a supervised home for young employed girls, and for a community center which can provide meeting quarters for organizations, has been recognized to this extent. We are profoundly thankful for this splendid spirit of generosity."

Seek Trust Gifts

In order that the club, in operation for the benefit of young girls since 1920, may continue the social welfare program for such girls and also provide the recreation and meeting center at a minimum cost to groups, the board and trustees will now seek to raise an additional sum of \$50,000 in Medford and vicinity. This sum is needed to furnish the clubhouse and establish a trust fund for maintenance, thus avoiding a yearly fund drive, it was stressed. Directors pointed out that to avoid discrimination among applicants seeking places to hold meetings, it was hoped to work out a sliding price scale according to the size and purpose of the organization.

The present clubhouse, originally a large residence, was purchased in 1920 by the Young Women's Christian association. Because of the economic situation, it was necessary in 1933 to give up the national YMCA charter and to become a local group. However the organization continued to provide a residential home of young employed girls, and a place for civic meetings.

Conducted Own Drive

From 1920 to 1952, financial assistance was received from Medford Community Chest, but that year the club's budget application was rejected in its entirety. The club has conducted its own fund drive for the past four years.

"Considering the worthiness of this organization to the community, the board feels certain that public-spirited citizens will show their confidence, in the aims of this project by generous subscriptions to our present need," the board statement said. Girls' Community club was incorporated in 1935 as a non-profit organization and all gifts and contributions to the corporation are deductible for income tax purposes, it was said.

A reorganization of the board of directors and the board of trustees has been accomplished. Directors are now Mrs. Phillips, who remains as president; Mrs. Martin Luther, vice-president; Mrs. C. O. Lovejoy, sec.; Mrs. M. M. Morris, treasurer; Mrs. Aletha Vawter, Mrs. Leonard Mayfield, Mrs. Mame E. Sleeter, Mrs. A. A. Lausmann, Mrs. G. R. Owens, Mrs. Hugh Coleman, Mrs. Marjorie Gibbons, Mrs. B. Ray Miller, Mrs. B. G. Harding and Mrs. R. J. Kenney. Mrs. Gibbons, Mrs.

Miller and Mrs. Kenney are new members; and Mrs. Harding was transferred from the trustee list which will now be made up solely of men.

Trustees Named

Mrs. A. J. Hanby, who served on the board of trustees for many years, has now retired. Serving as trustees are Eugene Thorndike, Dr. B. R. Elliott, H. H. Pringle, Ed. Branchfield, J. C. Boyle and A. D. Harvey, the last four being the newest members.

Robert J. Kenney, architect for the building, stated it will be constructed of building blocks with brick facing on Bartlett street. The first floor provides for a large club room with fireplace. It will be divided from two dining areas by use of folding doors and they, in turn, will also be divided by the doors which will enable three different groups to hold sessions at one time.

Access to these areas is through a main entrance and foyer provided with coat hanging space, toilet facilities and a public phone booth. The dining areas are served directly by a large kitchen with complete accommodations for cooking, serving, dishwashing and storage. Adjacent to the kitchen and opening into one dining room will be an enclosed porch with special facilities for garden clubs.

Large Parlor

Plans call for a large parlor with fireplace, for use of club residents. This will be located off the same entrance porch but provided with a separate entrance adjacent to the matron's office, and a main staircase to the second floor.

Second floor plans call for 11 twin-bed bedrooms with built-in wardrobes, dressing tables, and other furniture. The bedrooms are serviced by two large wash-

rooms with showers. It is pointed out that the second floor and bedrooms are patterned after the modern dormitory and sorority house construction.

The matron's suite will consist of living room, bedroom and bath and built-in storage.

All residents will have access to a lounge, dining area, snack bar, kitchen and laundry which is serviced from the driveway by a rear staircase. Stairs open off the lounge on to the light court which is also a sun deck.

Materials Planned

The interior will be of plaster and wood finishes. Mr. Kenney states; in some areas the structural block will be left unfinished except for paint. First level floors will be concrete covered with tile; the entrance will be of quarry tile. The second floor area will have wood decks covered with carpeting except in the kitchen and snack bar areas, which will have vinyl tile.

All second floor bedrooms, except those facing Bartlett street, face into an open court or sun deck which will also be the roof over the central first floor area. The building will be heated with hot water convectors, and the clubrooms, dining room and parlor on the first floor and the lounge and eating area on the second floor will be air conditioned. Mr. Kenney states that materials have been selected to reduce maintenance wherever possible.

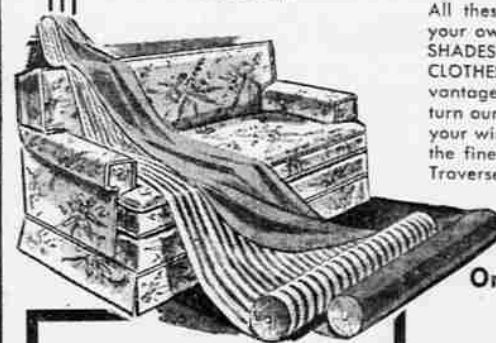
