

Administration Trying to Change Nature of Presidency, Adlai Says

En Route With Stevenson—Adlai E. Stevenson charged the Eisenhower administration Saturday with trying to "change the nature of the presidency" and using "brazen political expediency" to woo farm voters.

After an eight-day breather in Washington, the Democratic presidential nominee set out on a week's campaign swing through the Midwest and South. He attacked President Eisenhower's farm program at Newton, Ia., and the administration's "giveaway" conservation policy in an address prepared for a party rally at Denver.

Spells Out Farm Program

Stevenson spelled out the Democratic farm program at Newton at the National Plowing contest, where Mr. Eisenhower appeared Friday, to give a few informal remarks and promise his major farm speech from Peoria, Ill., next week.

The Democratic candidate outlined a program with proposals for 90 per cent price supports, a world food bank and other features which he said would "stop and reverse the decline of farm prices."

In his Denver speech he said the nation voted for a change in 1952 but that it got from the administration was "short-change" for the farmer, small businessman and labor.

"Perhaps worst of all, they have tried to change the nature of the presidency itself," Stevenson said. "Four years ago, the president promised strong leadership as the champion of the interests of all the people against

any special interest. "Now he is almost a passive figure, while the very active gentlemen around him are almost all representative of a single special interest. He seldom says a wrong thing; they seldom a right one."

Stevenson said the interests of all Americans should be equally represented in the presidency but that government power has been delegated mostly to "representatives of rich and powerful industry."

Reference To Conservation

He said Democrats seek "the wisdom that knows what to change and what to keep" and he used this theme with particular reference to conservation.

Full-Blown Hurricane Predicted in Gulf

New Orleans — (AP) — Gulf storm Flossy, churning the water 500 miles south of New Orleans, "probably" will grow up into a full-blown hurricane, the Weather Bureau warned Saturday.

The upper Texas and Louisiana coasts were put on hurricane watch. Highest winds were up to 40 to 50 miles an hour. Mount Washington (6,288 feet) is the highest point in the northeastern United States. A crew of weathermen live there the year around, making tests of atmospheric conditions. In April, 1934, they recorded the greatest gust of wind ever measured on earth — 231 miles an hour.

Stevenson said the Republicans have "tried to make reclamation a bad word" and have "turned their backs on public power." He said they have "camouflaged the resources of invaluable water turnover to private interests by talking about it as partnership."

Reorganization of FDIC To Be Asked

Washington — (AP) — Chairman J. W. Fulbright said Saturday he will ask the Senate Banking committee to consider legislative reorganization of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. In the wake of the million-dollar check scandal in Illinois.

The Arkansas Democrat presided Friday as FDIC officials told the committee about some aspects of the agency which insures deposits in more than 13,000 of the nation's banks.

Fulbright said disposed Illinois State Auditor Orville E. Hodges set up a "lucrative deal" for himself and his associates "by using the FDIC for his own purposes."

Hodge was a central figure in the scandal and is serving a 12 to 15 year sentence for cashing more than \$1 million worth of spurious state checks or warrants.

Fulbright said that "all too often we have to wait until a scandal arises" to make legislative reforms. He said he hopes Congress can "take advantage" of the Illinois case to make needed improvements in the FDIC organization.

Daughter of TV Star Killed in Wreck

Van Nuys, Calif. — (AP) — Sandra J. Hayden, 15-year-old daughter of television star Jan Clayton, was killed Saturday when she crashed her mother's car into another auto at an intersection.

Police said the star's daughter, who had only a driving learner's permit, apparently drove through a stop sign when her car collided with an auto driven by Lloyd Freer Jr., 19, who was injured.

Miss Hayden's father was former cowboy star Russell Hayden, who now is a television actor and producer. Her mother now is married to Robert W. Lerner, son of the president of a nationwide chain of dress shops.

Miss Clayton collapsed when she learned of her daughter's death and was put to bed under sedatives. Highway safety has been one of her leading civic interests. She was awarded a plaque in June for helping to promote highway safety.

Miss Clayton, after a successful career in New York musical comedy, has been equally successful as Tommy Rettig's mother in the TV series, "Lassie."

Poles Facing Trial For Part in Uprising

Warsaw, Poland — (AP) — Fifty-eight persons accused of committing various crimes during the June workers' uprising in Poznan will go on trial there next week, it was announced Saturday.

Prosecutor General Marian Rybicki, in a statement published by the official news agency Pap, said 96 others among the 323 arrested at the time of the uprising are awaiting trial.

He said the number of prisoners "has been reduced considerably in the course of investigations"—an apparent indication that the other 169 persons arrested in June have been released.

Rybicki emphasized that the persons still in prison are not charged merely with taking part in the "bread and freedom" riots in Poznan, but are accused of specific crimes.

Gene Autry Settles \$100,000 Damage Suit

Davenport, Iowa — (AP) — A \$100,000 damage suit against cowboy movie star Gene Autry was settled out of court for \$30,000 according to three Galesburg, Ill., residents making the claim.

Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Grono and Mrs. Rose Vestal had filed the suit in Davenport naming seven defendants including Autry for injuries suffered at a rodeo last year.

Practice Bomb Falls Into Family Home

Newport, R.I. — (AP) — A practice bomb fell from a military plane Saturday and caromed through the roof, bedroom and kitchen of a house before ending up in the back yard.

There was no explosion and all residents of the house were away.

"A lucky thing, too," said Robert J. Pingatore, owner of the house. "Normally we'd have been feeding the (two) kids lunch in the kitchen." His wife is a former Boston resident, daughter of Mrs. Ida Barkowski.

Police said they believed the plane involved was from Quonset Point Naval Air Station, but officers at Quonset could not confirm this immediately.

Pingatore said he and his wife were shopping when the plane zoomed over this seaport town en route to a practice bombing range. The mark 76 bomb became dislodged and fell on a trajectory into the house and through it. Damage was extensive.

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
