Opportunity knocks twice tonight for the Brooklyn Dodgers to take tactical command of a National league pennant race that's in "suspended animation" for 24 hours.

Even the official standings today don't present a clear picture of this craziest, most mixed-up of all races. They show the Milwaukee Braves leading the Dodgers by a half game but they don't show that the world champions need only three little putouts to make Sunday's suspended game with the Pittsburgh Pirates an 8-3 victory and go into first place by one point.

Then, the Dodgers would have the second opportunity—to beat the Pirates in the regularly-scheduled night game and go a half-game ahead of the Braves with the added advantage of having one more game to play than Milwaukee. That "extra game" is Brooklyn's protection tonight. The Dodgers would "re-main" in second place by losing the regularly scheduled game but still could make it up by winning the extra game on their schedule.

Clem Labine (9-6) is expected to pitch for the Dodgers in the regular game with Bob Friend (16-16) going for the Pirates. Friend has beaten the Dodgers three times this year and only last Thursday topped the Braves 2-1.

Hodges Homers Twice
When — and there's always that wee little "if" — the Dodgers officially close out the suspended "victory," Don Newcombe will be credited with his 26th win of the season. The big righthander was touched for eight hits but the Dodgers supported him with a 12-hit attack that included two homers and a single by Gil Hodges.

Bill Bruton smashed a grand slam homer and collected three other hits to lead the Braves to their 7-4 victory over the Chicago Cubs. Bob Buhl received credit for his 18th win although he needed help from Gene Conley for the last 1 1/3 innings.

The Cincinnati Reds, refusing to give up in the face of overwhelming odds, moved within a game and a half of first place when they beat the St. Louis Cardinals, 3-2 and 5-4. Ed Bailey's 10th inning pinch homer won the opener while a three-run homer by Gus Bell and Wally Post's 36th round tripper powered the Reds to victory in the nightcap. Rookies Don Gross and Tom Acker were the winning pitchers.

The Redlegs' four homers raised their season total to 220 — one short of the major league record held by the 1947 New York Yankees.

Phillie Homer Record
Stan Lopata hit his 31st and 32nd homers to set a club record for a righthanded batter and Curt Simmons pitched a four hitter to give the Philadelphia Phillies a 6-2 decision over the Giants in the other NL game.

Mickey Mantle singled as a pinch hitter and opened up a big lead over Ted Williams in the American league batting race as the New York Yankees downed the Boston Red Sox, 7-4. Mantle lifted his average to .355 while Williams, hitless in three tries, dipped to .3497.

Frank Lary became the Detroit Tigers' first 20-game winner since 1948 when he pitched a two hitter to beat the Cleveland Indians, 11-1. The Tigers backed up Lary with a 19-hit attack to which Frank Bolling and Charley Maxwell contributed homers.

The Kansas City Athletics edged out Billy Pierce, 3-2, in their opener but the Chicago White Sox bounced back with a 5-1 triumph as Gerry Staley won his eighth game and the Baltimore Orioles clinched sixth place with a 6-0 verdict over the Washington Senators in other AL activity. Connie Johnson fanned nine to register his ninth win for the Orioles.

Ford Has Series Starting Role

Boston — (U.P.) — Yankee Manager Casey Stengel said today that the "outstanding record" of southpaw Whitey Ford earned him the starting role in the World Series regardless of which National league team faces the junior league champs.

"Ford is my boy for the starting assignment. He has to be in his fine, outstanding record this year certainly earns him the spot," said Stengel.

Lumberjacks Squelch SOC Red Raiders 33-6

Humboldt State college trafficked heavily through the air with devastating success Saturday night to spoil the 1958 football debut of Southern Oregon college and its power T formation.

Relying substantially on the throwing arms of quarterbacks Warren Baker, Jack Menzies and Pete Dye, the Lumberjacks of Arcata, Calif., throttled the Red Raiders of the Rogue 33 to 6 on the Medford Senior High school turf.

Baker was the big bombardier. He threw 22 aeriels, completing 11 as he passed to one touchdown and set up two others. Menzies let fly with only three losses but he completed all of them, two for touchdowns.

Southern Oregon college started strong, charging to a TD of the opening kick-off. The Raiders made a big bid again in opening panel but after that penetrated no closer than to the Humboldt 35-yard line. They fought a good share of the remaining time with their backs to the wall. In addition to their five TDs, the 'Jacks moved deep into SOC territory on five occasions.

Matched On Ground
However, the Raiders did make a game of it for better than a half. Offensively they matched Humboldt on the ground, gaining 151 yards to the 'Jacks 142. In the air the Oregonians' completion record of 13 for 24 was better than the 16 for 33 firing of the Lumberjacks but SOC got neither long gains nor the total yardage that their California foes picked up. Humboldt passes collected 257 yards and SOC's 109.

Baker picked up 157 yards through the ozone, Menzies 54 and Dye 46.

Just how much Southern Oregon missed injured quarterback Bill Seymour couldn't be judged but Arlen Smith, who filled the slot most of the time, did a creditable job, completing 12 of 17 passes for 103 yards.

Dave Thomas and Henry Cooper were the main targets for Humboldt aeriels and the Lumberjacks got some fancy running from Cooper. Chuck McAninch, Earl Barnum, Rush Ashburn and Marian Mays. SOC passes in the bruising mix went most the direction of Ted Tenny and Larry Schweinfurt and Don Kornis and Tenny were the big runners.

48-Yard Drive
Southern Oregon college began its goalward promenade on the Humboldt 48-yard line after a short opening kick-off. From there Southern Oregon required

20 yards of penalties and 10 and 14-yard pass completions Baker to Cooper and Thomas, threatened as the period drew to a close but Thomas fumbled after his catch and Schweinfurt fell on the ball on the 10.

SOC advanced to the 23 but was thrown back to the 12. A Smith pass was snagged by Jack Menzies of the California eleven and the 'Jacks had the ball on the 19. It moved to the four and was tossed back to the nine. From there Menzies pitched to Marian Mays for a TD. Renwick's kick was ruled wide.

Humboldt took over on downs on its 38 after a SOC series of plays. A Menzies throw to Mays was good for 29 yards and McAninch went 17 more to the 16. Then Menzies tossed to Walt Price for another TD and added the bonus with a kick to wind up the scoring for the night.

The Raiders halted another Jack score on the three and Humboldt was down to the 17 again before the contest ended.
