Around Hollywood

Hollywood — (U.P.) — Not all of the actors who graduate from the Actors Studio in New York perform like Marlon Brando. Richard Boone (Medic) Boone, once a student there, thinks most of his fellow graduates are "pretentious." Boone, the quiet, almost deadpan doctor of the temporarily cancelled NBC television series, is a far cry from the Brando type. In fact, he said vehemently today, he thinks the fuss made over that "new technique" by Marilyn Monroe, Shelley Winters and the other students at the school is "a lot of nonsense."

"Karl Malden, Rod Steiger and the rest—they think they have the only way to act," snorted Boone. "The acting style to follow is the one that works best for you."

Their Own Style
"Take for example, Lee Cobb, from the group theater, and Laurence Olivier, from the British theater. You can't say that either is a bad actor just because he doesn't follow that Actors' Studio technique."

"The Brando followers are so affected," he continued. "One of them announced the other day all actors should go to a psychoanalyst. He should be hit over the head with a wooden mallet. There are no rules for acting!"

With "Medic" temporarily on the shelf (he thinks it will be resumed in January) Boone is putting his own style of acting back on the motion picture screen. Some TV critics prodded him for registering little emotion when he called for the scalpel and rubber gloves.

But he has a chance to develop a doctor character in a 90-minute film — for Boone is playing a medical man in the movies for the first time. The public is so used to thinking of him as an MD that he was paged to portray a psychoanalyst opposite Eleanor Parker in "Lizzie."

"I will have a chance to give the role more scope and to develop the doctor character as a warm, human person," the affable doctor said between scenes on the set.

Resort Menaced By Forest Fire
San Bernardino, Calif. — (U.P.) — A major forest fire menaced the famed Lake Arrowhead mountain resort area today and 1,000 persons were alerted for evacuation in case strong winds spring up again and drive the blaze into populated areas.

Some 15 to 20 resort homes possibly were destroyed by the conflagration. It was difficult for fire fighting crews to tabulate destroyed structures because the fire hopped-stepped through some areas, and crews could not get in to determine whether residences had been touched off.

The fire has swept up from the lower slopes of the San Bernardino Mountains northeast of San Bernardino since it was started last Friday by the flaming crash of a super Sabre jet. Richard Johnson, federal fire service officer, said the fire "could become a major disaster if winds such as those we had Sunday come up again."

FPC Hearings on Hells Canyon Slated

Washington — (U.P.) — Another round of Federal Power commission hearings was scheduled to open here today on Pacific Northwest Power company's application to build a \$217,400,000 hydroelectric project on the Snake river below Hells Canyon.

Following a five-week recess, the sessions may be stormier than those of mid-summer when the four-company Pacific Northwest Power company presented its direct case for the two-dam plan at Mountain Sheep and Pleasant valley in the canyon dividing Oregon and Idaho.

The PNP project, largest ever proposed by private capital in the region, would generate 1-183,000 kilowatts.

The plan is opposed by public power groups led by the National Hells Canyon association.
