Two Medford Men Named to Group

George Flanagan of Elk Lumber company and B. L. Nutting of Medford Corporation have been appointed to an Oregon forest industry committee to broaden industry-sponsored education, 4-H and Boy Scout programs in the state, it was announced today.

The Oregon committee of American Forest Products Industries was formed at a meeting in Eugene last week. The group will work on expanding distribution of conservation and educational materials to schools and civic organizations throughout the region.

Members also intend to increase state participation in AFPI's Boy Scout forestry field days and 4-H forestry contests, according to S. W. Robb of Willamette Valley Lumber company, Dallas, committee chairman.

The committee is composed of 19 members from various lumber firms in the state.

Week End Accidents in Oregon Claim Six

By UNITED PRESS Week end accidents claimed at least six lives in Oregon. Five died in automobile mishaps from Friday through Sunday while a woman was killed in a fall from a cliff on Mt. Hood.

Mrs. Lou Ellen Simko, 32, Portland, stumbled on a rock and plunged some 50 feet to her death near Timberline Lodge yesterday.

Portland Killed — A man identified as Robert E. Will, 35, Portland, was killed yesterday afternoon in a collision between his car and a truck.

Father of Nine Held On Charge of Murder — Portland — (U.P.) — Clinton LeRoy Jeremiah, 33-year old father of nine children, was held on a murder charge today after the bullet punctured body of Elmer H. Raymond, 33, Jewell logger, was found just inside the Multnomah county line near the Wildwood golf course.

British Air Liner Target Near Formosa — Tokyo — (U.P.) — A British passenger line flying from Hong Kong to Tokyo was imperilled Saturday afternoon by high-trajectory surface fire from U. S. or Chinese Nationalist ships southwest of Formosa, it was disclosed today.

The British Overseas Airways Corporation plane was not hit and there was no evidence the ships were firing at it, a BOAC official said.

A U. S. Navy spokesman said a 7th Fleet unit conducted "routine local gunnery practice" Saturday afternoon in that vicinity but he said this was at least 51 miles off the commercial air route.

The Navy statement raised the possibility the plane had turned eastward off course to avoid Typhoon Gilda which hit southern Formosa Saturday and had strayed near the gunnery practice area.
