Study Starts of Ballot Measures

The legislative and tax study committee of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce began a study of state measures which will appear on the Nov. 6 election ballot at its first meeting of the fall yesterday.

The committee plans to meet nearly every week during the fall and winter months, conducting a continuing study of legislative proposals and other matters affecting government. At yesterday's meeting it voted to ask the chamber for authority to change the group's name to committee on governmental operations, in recognition of the increased scope of work undertaken in the past year.

After its study of state measures, the committee will start work on the five measures residents of the city will find on their ballots in November, and later will concentrate largely on local government operations and proposals to be placed before the state legislature when it convenes next January.

The four candidates for the legislature from Jackson county are being invited to sit in on meetings of the committee, which are held each Monday morning.

Two Break-ins Are Reported by Police

Break and entries into a construction company yard and a service station were reported today, according to Medford police.

No information was available as to how long Mrs. Purvine will be in Jackson county. A permanent home extension agent has not as yet been selected.

Parliament Members Hurt in Plane Mishap

London — (U.P.) — Five members of Parliament were injured Monday when a Royal Air Force transport plane plunged out of control and dived 3,000 feet before the pilot regained control.

All 12 Parliament members aboard the plane were shaken up, but only five were hurt seriously enough to require medical treatment. Geoffrey De Freitas, a former undersecretary of air, was knocked unconscious when he struck his head against a luggage rack.

Damage Reported at MID Project Site
Jack Hoffhuhr, secretary-manager of the Medford Irrigation district, has notified the sheriff's office that several items have been taken and property has been damaged at the site of an irrigation district project south of Phoenix on Bear creek.

Hoffhuhr told Sheriff Howard Gault that some of the equipment was dismantled and extensively damaged. The incident occurred Saturday or Sunday. Juveniles are believed responsible, he reported.

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Around Hollywood

Hollywood — (U.P.) — Johnny Carson is sad to report he's struck out for the second time on television. This time by what he fears is a menace to viewers: Reruns of filmed serials.

The affable comedian with the college-type face and easy humor was launched on CBS-TV a year ago on a night show. Last spring that stint was cancelled and Carson moved to a different daytime program.

But after 13 weeks he finds himself without a show. The network sold reruns of "Our Miss Brooks" to a sponsor so the Carson show ends this Friday—despite its good rating and good reviews.

"It's the new cycle on TV—filmed programs and reruns," Carson mourned as he waited back stage for his daily stint. "This means somebody who is trying something fresh in a live show, something different from quiz programs, is taken off the air."

Reruns Flood Daytime TV
"The networks are flooding the daytime with reruns. Next we'll have 'Miss Brooks Returns Again, and Again and Again,'" Carson particularly is frustrated about this new twist of fate because his program had one of the top daytime ratings. His August Nielsen rating was 5.9, which he says was better than

"The mail was great," Carson went on. "Many women wrote how glad they were we didn't insult their intelligence or play down to them."

"It seems so unfair to pull the rug out from under us. This has happened to other shows, too, such as 'Four Star Theater.' With the movie studios dumping their major backlogs on television, what will happen to the live shows?"

Live Entertainment Urged
"I think TV should have a certain amount of live entertainment. Film just doesn't have the same impact."

Carson figures the cancellation of the show may have a goldplated lining for him. He's received offers to appear in movies and also do night club acts in Las Vegas, Nev.

"Of course, I'm still under contract to CBS so I'll do guest shots for them, beginning with the Ed Sullivan Show on Oct. 14. It might be a good idea to try a little bit of everything now."

Carson adjusted his tie before facing his TV cameras and added cheerfully, "Sure, this is a blow to my ego. I don't understand it. Even people at the network say they can't figure why this happened."

"But I'm not defeated—just unhappy. If you get bitter about it, you hurt nobody but yourself. Something good may come out of this. I know—the network should subsidize comedians!"

School Offers Course In Electronic Brain

Buffalo, N. Y. — (U.P.) — Canisius college will offer something new this fall, a course in the use of electronic brains, mechanical equipment revolutionizing business and science.

The program is believed to be the first formal school college offering in the state outside New York city. It will be processed by a four-man team of experts in the field of electronic computers.

The introductory course will give special attention to binary numbers, coding, flow charting and programming. In the spring, a follow-up course will specialize in the scientific, commercial and other uses of computers.

The course was designed primarily for research scientists who are able to use computer programming in their field, business executives whose firms are interested in applying computers to their problems, and persons interested in continuing their studies to enter the field of computer programming.
