

Nixon Carries on Campaign Trip Despite Influenza, Laryngitis

Salt Lake City—(UPI)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon carried his campaign to Oklahoma and Texas today, a little better in his fight with a mild case of influenza and a voice-crippling attack of laryngitis.

However, his plans for the day were altered to eliminate a formal speech planned for this afternoon at Oklahoma City, where he will merely appear at a party rally.

His physician, Dr. Malcolm C. Todd, Long Beach, Calif., said Nixon's ability to make an address scheduled for tonight at Houston, Tex., would depend on how the vice president got along during the day.

Todd told newsmen as the Nixon campaign special airplane prepared to leave here that the vice president had "rested reasonably well" during the night and was "insistent . . . on going ahead."

Temperature Drops
Nixon remained "very hoarse," but his temperature, one degree above normal during

a formal talk Monday night, was down to 99.2 degrees, six-tenths above normal.

The doctor said that on his advice, Nixon would not make the Oklahoma City address but would appear at a party rally, where he asked that arrangements be kept "as simple" as possible to avoid undue strain.

Todd said that a major factor in Nixon's illness was that he was "exhausted" from the strain of the Republican Convention in San Francisco, followed by his father's death and the start of the current tour which called for visits to 32 states in 16 days, travelling 15,000 miles.

Should Complete Trip
Todd said Nixon should be able to make all cities scheduled on the tour unless complications set in.

"If he were a private patient, I would advise him to stay in bed for one or two days," Todd said. "But Nixon is insistent on carrying out this job."

The "job" involves at least 21 more scheduled speeches in 19

states during the next nine days.

Nixon croaked through a speech in Salt Lake City Monday night but was in obvious discomfort as he directly accused Democratic presidential nominee Adlai Stevenson of carbon copying President Truman's "Fair Deal" policies.

When he finished, Todd put Nixon to bed immediately in his hotel room after administering doses of antibiotics and achromycin, a new drug.

1,242 Emigrants Head For Life in America

Bremerhaven, Germany—(UPI)—The U.S. military transport ship General W. C. Langfitt headed for New York today carrying 1,242 emigrants.

The departure of the emigrants, sponsored by the Intergovernmental Committee on European Migration, brought the number of Europeans sent to the United States under the terms of the Refugee Act to more than 200,000.
