

Steam Power Eyed By Ellsworth; Cites High Freight Rates

Coos Bay — (Special) — Congressman Harris Ellsworth this week called the local 200 million ton coal field one of the most important mineral resources in the state. He pointed out that production of low cost steam generated power from coal combined with tide water shipping would provide strong inducement to industry needing cheap transportation and large amounts of firm power not available elsewhere in Oregon.

In recent months, Ellsworth stated, three major aluminum companies have turned down cheap northwest public power in favor of firm steam generated power at coal mine sites along the Ohio river. Increased efficiency of steam plants now makes possible 4 mill power from coal, he said, adding that increased freight costs now more than offset the once favorable 2.2 mill public power cost in the northwest.

According to Ellsworth, steam power could be generated at the mine in Coos Bay as efficiently as in Ohio, with the advantages of tide water shipping compared to hundreds of miles of barge travel from New Orleans to Ohio river plant sites. Such development would provide Coos Bay with steady employment regardless of water shortage which is now halting northwest plants, he said.

Knowland Sees Lack Of Party Complacency

Tulsa, Okla. — (U.P.) — Sen. William F. Knowland (R-Calif.) said yesterday that "there is no complacency among Republicans in the states I have visited and there is no defeatism."

He predicted Mr. Eisenhower will be reelected, but said the campaign would be a hard fought contest.

107 Attorneys Take State Oath

Salem — (U.P.) — Chief Justice Harold J. Warner yesterday administered the oath to 107 brand new attorneys admitting them to what he termed "Oregon's most honored profession."

Before the new attorneys took the oath that admitted them to the Oregon bar, the chief justice admonished them that they were "something more" than attorneys.

"You are also officers of the supreme court with official responsibilities," the chief justice said.

Justice Warner read the Oregon statutes relating to the duties of attorneys with particular emphasis on the section commanding them "never to reject the cause of the defenseless or oppressed."

That is a part of the law that every outstanding member of the bar should have recourse to again and again," the justice said.

The attorneys were those who passed this year's bar examination.
