Paper Fabric for Clothing Can be Dyed, Printed, Washed

New York — (U.P.) — Don't be surprised if any day now, one of the neighbors says, "Well, I think I'll go paper myself a new dress."

For paper is the latest material to enter the fashion world.

And one designing consultant foresees the day when a woman can buy—or make—a fashionable dress for \$3 to \$5, wear it one, two or three times and toss it into the wastepaper basket.

The material, basically paper combined with rayon, nylon or other fibers, is the development of Kimberly-Clark, the manufacturer who launched the paper handkerchief in 1924. The company says the material is as flexible as a natural or synthetic fabric.

Vera de Give, the veteran design consultant who pioneered its use in clothes, said the material has the feel of fabric and drapes or takes folds well.

"I've had clothing manufacturers here who couldn't tell the difference between a paper dress and a similar style in cloth," she said.

Miss de Give first used the material four years ago for the Atomic Energy Commission, which wanted a disposable but comfortable coverall for industrial workers.

Recently, she made a sequined evening dress for an actress' appearance on a television show. The dress cost \$4. "In fine fabric, the same dress would have cost \$125," she said.

Kimberly-Clark hasn't dreamed up any fancy name for the material. It's still known by its laboratory name—"K-2000."

A spokesman said the material can be dyed or printed, and can be made up any weight from cheesecloth lightness to the bulk

of tweed. It can be washable—depending on how much wet strength the maker builds into it. It can be pinned, stitched and cut much the same as any other clothing material.

The process of making it is a patented and complicated one, but a spokesman for Kimberly-Clark said it consisted basically of "scaling" or "laminating" two sheets of paper on each side of a dressed web or rayon or other fiber.

The material still is in limited supply, but Miss de Give said: "I expect to see the time when a woman can buy a fashionable dress for a mere nothing and throw it away after wearing. I doubt that K-2000 will show much in couturier lines... but it may revolutionize the low-priced field."
