

ISRAELI, JORDAN FORCES CLASH

51st Year

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Bitter Fighting On Frontier in Counter-Attack

50 Jordan Soldiers
Declared Casualties

Jerusalem — (U.P.) — New fighting was reported at dawn today at Husan where Israeli forces earlier claimed to have killed 50 Jordan soldiers and lost five of their own in a punitive raid.

Details of the new flareup were not available, but it was an apparent counter-attack by Jordan's Arab Legion against Israelis, who made a midnight foray into Jordanian territory not far from Jerusalem.

Still in Progress

Unofficial Arab reports said "bitter hand to hand fighting" between Jordan and Israeli troops still was in progress hours after the counter-attack started. There was no official confirmation of the reports.

Israel announced it had raided Arab Legion frontier posts in the Husan area in reprisal for a Jordanian attack on an archaeological party Sunday in which four Israelis were killed.

An announcement by Israeli Army Spokesman Maj. Dan Gov said at least 50 Jordanians were killed and a vast quantity of equipment destroyed or captured. Gov said the Israelis suffered five dead and nine wounded.

Conflicting Claims

An official Jordan military spokesman in Amman said there were 31 Jordanian casualties. He placed the Israeli losses at three times that number. He said "scores" of Israeli dead and wounded were observed being removed from the battlefield by ambulances.

An unofficial Jordan military source said Israel lost 150 and Jordan 21 men in the raid by Israel.

The official spokesman said a second fight took place on the outskirts of Jerusalem Tuesday night when an Israeli force exchanged shots with Jordanian home guards. He said there were no Jordanian casualties in this encounter.

The reported Arab Legion counter-attack apparently was the third Jordan-Israeli clash in this period.

Appeal for Truce

U.N. truce observers rushed to the scene at Husan, which is about four miles west of Bethlehem and six miles southeast of Jerusalem, in an attempt to obtain first hand details.

Maj. Gen. E. M. Burns, chief of staff of the U.N. truce supervisory organization, visited the battle area and appealed once more to both sides to observe the Holy Land cease fire agreed upon previously. Jordan's King Hussein followed reports of the fighting early this morning from Arab Legion headquarters in Amman, and later called an emergency cabinet meeting.

Preliminary reports were sent to U.N. headquarters in New York, where U.N. Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld summoned the ambassadors of Jordan, Israel, the United States, Britain and France to urgent consultations this morning.

Truman Charges Hall Reneging on Promise On Charity Donation

Kansas City, Mo. — (U.P.) — Former President Truman today accused Republican National Chairman Leonard W. Hall of reneging on a promise to donate \$1,000 to charity if it could be proved Vice President Richard M. Nixon ever called Mr. Truman a traitor.

The former President released a letter to Hall, under date of Sept. 25, in which he said Hall's action "settles the fact that Republicans find it very difficult to keep their promises."

Mr. Truman said Hall's insistence that the statement attributed to Nixon was "without foundation" was no surprise to him, but that he "had not anticipated your unwillingness to help the Koreans with a contribution."

Mr. Truman's letter to Hall enclosed a copy of a Washington Post editorial printed Sept. 19, in which the newspaper said: "It seems just as plain as the Washington Monument on a clear and cloudless day that Mr. Leonard W. Hall owes \$1,000 to the Korean Red Cross."

The newspaper quoted Nixon as saying at Texarkana, Ark., that Mr. Truman, Dean Acheson, and Adlai E. Stevenson "are traitors to the high principles in which many of the nation's Democrats believe." Nixon was quoted as saying "Real Democrats are outraged by the Truman-Acheson-Stevenson gang's toleration and defense of Communism in high places."

The editorial said it would be "weaseling for Mr. Hall to plead that Nixon never explicitly called Mr. Truman a traitor and it was on this unqualified term that the bet was based."

Seventh of 11 Children Gets Polio

Verona, N. D. — (U.P.) — Mrs. Albert Cox today kept an anxious eye on four of her 11 children, hoping they would not show the dread symptoms of polio which Tuesday struck her seventh child.

She reported the remaining four were "fine" with none suffering a sore throat or muscle fatigue which were the first signs of polio in the stricken children.

The Cox's eldest daughter, Eva, 17, was taken to St. Luke's Hospital in Fargo, N. D., 80 miles away, when she complained feeling ill.

Dr. Harry Orme said at the hospital all the cases were "rather mild," and that none was paralytic. The parents credited Salk antipolio vaccine shots with "saving" the hospitalized children from crippling effects of the disease.

Eisenhower Accuses Democrats of 'Politicking' With Farm Problems

Republican Policy Of Full Income Parity Outlined

Ike Makes Sharpest
Criticism of Foes

Peoria, Ill. — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower Tuesday night accused the Democrats of "politicking" with farm problems and outlined a Republican policy of "full income parity" which he said would bring the best agricultural economic situation "in years."

Mr. Eisenhower's talk before 10,000 persons at the Bradley university fieldhouse, his second in the Midwest grain belt in five days, bristled with the sharpest criticism of Democrats the President has made publicly since his 1952 campaign.

Illinois Republican leaders hailed the televised address as "straightforward." The President flew to Peoria from Washington and returned to the capital immediately after speaking.

"Full income parity is a full share of our country's good times," Mr. Eisenhower said. "Recalls Kassen Speech"

"In a free agriculture, farmers attain that kind of parity only in the market place. That's what I spoke for at Kassen four years ago — the attainment of that full share for the farmer — the preservation of a free agriculture."

"That's what I've been working for. I shall keep on working for it," he said.

His "Kassen" reference was to his 1952 campaign speech at Kasson, Minn., when, advocating a fair share of the national income for the farmer, he said "a fair share is not merely 90 per cent of parity — it is full parity."

Later, he and other Republicans said that, "in the market place," Republicans said reduction of surpluses by the government would improve the farmers' position at market.

The President accused the Democrats of forcing down farm prices during the Korean war, saying this took "rare talent." He also blamed them for building great surpluses by politicking at the farmers' expense.

Cheered frequently by the crowd, the President said rigid price supports at 90 per cent of fixed parity represented "mockery and deceit" for the farmer.

The President spelled out in detail features of his proposed farm program.

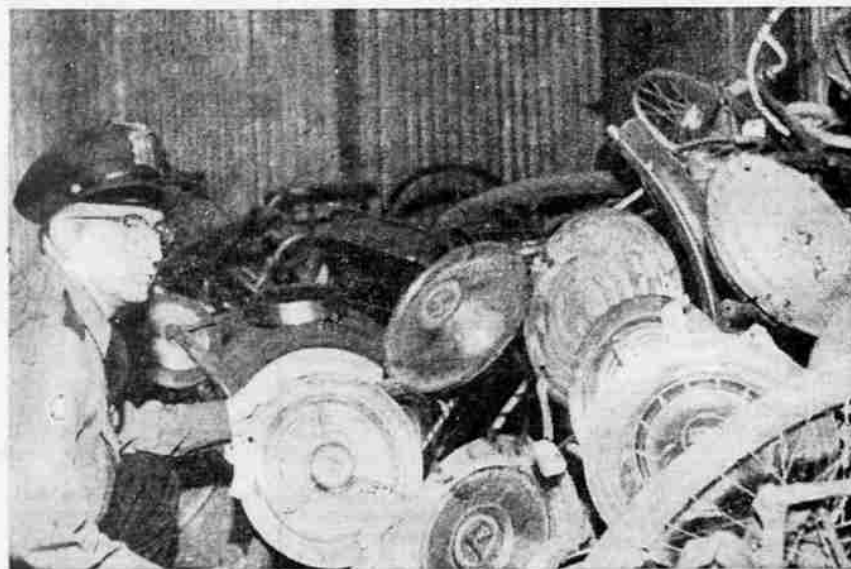
"We will use the new soil bank to its full potential to bolster farm prices, conserve our soil, and balance farm production," he said. "We will continue rapidly to use up our huge surpluses constructively at home and abroad."

He promised to "maintain price supports, carrying the essential principle of flexibility both to avoid the harmful effects of high rigid supports and to encourage the production of crops in short supply."

"We will use special programs to relieve periodic market congestion of perishable farm products."

"We will continue expanding the new rural development program, bringing long-denied opportunity to farm families on the lowest rungs of the economic ladder," the President said.

Israel Demands Voice In Security Council Discussion of Suez

United Nations, N. Y. — (U.P.) — Israel today demanded a voice in Security Council discussion of the Suez crisis on the ground that the Egyptian government has barred its shipping from the international waterway.

The Israeli foreign office issued a statement in Jerusalem directing its delegations to the United Nations to inform the chairman of the Security Council Israel is interested in taking part in the deliberations beginning this afternoon.

Non-Agricultural Employment Up

Salem — (U.P.) — Non-agricultural employment in Oregon reached a new high of 506,700 in mid-August, the State Unemployment Commission reported today.

However, the commission said that trends over the past few weeks indicated a lower total this month.

A generally advanced harvest brought many seasonal activities to a peak somewhat earlier than for several summers, while lack of demand slowed down lumbering operations, especially in western Oregon, the commission said.

The new job total is 7,700 higher than in July and 9,800 above last year. Employment in sawmills and logging increased slightly following vacation layoffs in July but the 71,200 reported were under summer figures for 1951, 1952, 1953 and 1955.

Trade, service, financial, utilities and governmental employment provided most of the August gain, the commission said, while slight improvement was shown in machinery manufacturing, paper mills and printing and publishing.

Dulles Believes Egypt Will Accept Suez Obligations

Patience Necessary
State Secretary Says

Washington — (U.P.) — Secretary of State John Foster Dulles said today he believes Egypt eventually will accept "the obligations of interdependence" if the East exercises patience in the Suez Canal controversy.

The secretary said at a news conference he thinks this will happen provided the Western powers refrain from drastic action, such as shooting their way through the canal.

If Egypt does not come to realize it must accept "obligations of interdependence," the upshot, Dulles said, will be that confidence in Egypt will be destroyed and its foreign sources of credit will dry up.

On another Middle Eastern crisis, Dulles said he deplores and regrets the renewed violence between Israel and Jordan.

He said attacks from both sides seem to indicate non-acceptance of principles worked out by UN Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld to preserve Arab-Israeli peace.

But Dulles said that, for the time being, at least, he does not think the Israel-Jordan outbreak has a direct bearing on the Suez Canal situation.

Suez Bypassing Plans Said Ready

Washington — (U.P.) — American officials said today that the United States is ready to put into effect within one week plans for by-passing the Suez canal if the waterway is closed down.

They said the plans are the result of a vast governmental study of what steps to take should Egypt suddenly close the canal to Western shipping.

The plans also could be used should the waterway be accidentally blocked through a shipping mishap caused by the shortage of canal pilots.

In either case, various government agencies would be ready to quickly take such steps as ordering reserve tankers out of the mothball fleet and reconditioning them for oil transport, stepping up U.S. oil production to meet a European deficit caused by difficulty in getting Middle Eastern petroleum and lending money to European allies to pay the dollar costs of buying American oil.

Seven Arraigned In Circuit Court On Indictments

Six men and one woman were arraigned today in circuit court on indictments returned by a Jackson county grand jury. They all will enter pleas in circuit court next Wednesday.
