Eisenhower Tells Plans To Expand Election Campaign

Stevenson's Leadership Criticism Shrugged Off

Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower said today that he has expanded his election campaign activities at the earnest request of Republican associates. But he said he still will not be a barnstormer or whistlestop.

Mr. Eisenhower told his news conference that when he originally spoke of making five or six major campaign speeches his plans for the campaign were not complete.

Since he blocked out his campaign plans in the early summer he said a lot of pressure has been brought to bear on him to expand his speaking program and he probably will make two or three additional major addresses.

Shrugs Off Charge
Other news highlights of the President's news conference:

1. He shrugged off criticism by Adlai E. Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee, that he is guilty of "consistent rejection of the positive responsibilities of leadership." Mr. Eisenhower said the United States is filled with people who have been associated with him and he preferred to call on them for an answer to Stevenson rather than discussing his own qualifications.

2. He said he believes there is some hope in the Suez Canal crisis. He said that if the 18 nations making up the tentative Users Association get together on a proper set of rules, he believes Egypt will see that her best interests lay in the same direction.

Never Member of NAACP

3. He said, in reply to a question, he has never been a member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. This point was raised because Vice President Richard M. Nixon said Wednesday that he was an honorary member of the NAACP.

4. Mr. Eisenhower has renewed his invitation to Indian Prime Minister Nehru to visit this country. Nehru was scheduled originally to visit Mr. Eisenhower in June, but the President's intestinal surgery forced a postponement. Mr. Eisenhower said he believes Nehru will visit this country some time this year, but not very soon.

5. He stood behind Nixon on the vice president's forecast of an eventual four-day work week. He said this could not be accomplished by fiat but that his administration will continue efforts to establish an economic climate in which the worker receives the maximum reward for his efforts.

Favors Public Accounting

6. He believes that some system ought to be worked out for making public an accounting of money spent by congressmen on trips abroad. He sees no reason why these records should be kept secret as they are at present.

7. He regards Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson as one of the finest and most dedicated public servants he has ever known. He believes Benson is thoroughly acquainted with every phase of agriculture and is putting his whole heart into working for the best interests of farmers.

SP Asks for Higher Shasta Daylight Fare

Salem — Southern Pacific company has asked for an increase of about 10 per cent in passenger fares on its Shasta Daylight streamliner. The rate increase would apply only on trips within the state. The train operates between Portland and Oakland, Calif.

The one-way fare between Portland and Klamath Falls would be increased from \$11.25 to \$12.40 while the round trip would cost \$20.55, an increase from \$18.65.

Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel said he would order a hearing on the matter.

Governor To Attend Highway Safety Meeting

Salem — (U.P.) — Gov. Elmo Smith will leave Portland tonight for Denver to attend a meeting of the governor's conference special committee on highway safety. He will be accompanied by James R. Banks, executive secretary of the newly formed Oregon Traffic safety commission.

CEASE FIRE IN EFFECT FOR ISRAEL, JORDAN

Allies Pledge To Back Jordan; Britain Accused

Fighting Must End, Hammarskjold Warns

Jerusalem (Israeli Sector) —

(U.P.) — Jordan's Arab allies pledged their support to King Hussein today in Jordan's dispute with Israel, and Egypt accused Britain of instigating the latest Israeli attacks.

A cease fire ordered by the UN truce supervision team was in effect along the border and no new shooting has been reported since the Wednesday morning clashes between the Israeli army and the Arab Legion of Jordan.

Situation Tense
The situation remained tense and it was understood the UN Security Council would take up the border dispute if there are further disturbances. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold warned both sides Wednesday they must end the border fighting that threatens war.

One message of assurance to Hussein came from Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser. He cabled the king a pledge that "Egypt will stand by her sister Jordan" and expressed condolences from "the Egyptian government and people" for its dead and wounded.

Syria Ready To Help

A second message came from Syrian President Shukri El-Kuwatly who telephoned Hussein and said Syria was ready to extend all necessary help to Jordan against "Israeli aggressions."

At the same time, a dispatch from Baghdad said Jordanian Foreign Minister Awni Abdel Hadi had flown there from Amman with a special message from Hussein for King Faisal concerning the Israeli attack.

Monroe Sweetland To Arrive Friday

Monroe Sweetland, Democratic candidate for secretary of state, will arrive in Medford at 10 a.m. Friday, Sept. 28 and will be at Democratic headquarters in the Esquire theater until noon.

He will go to Ashland for luncheon with Southern Oregon college faculty members. At 1 p.m. he will address a combined gathering of faculty and students at the college.

Sweetland will return to Medford and will be available for appointments at Democratic headquarters until evening. At 7 p.m. he will address a meeting of the Democratic Social club at the Medford hotel.

Frank DeSouza has made arrangements for installation of television so those attending the dinner can hear the address of Adlai Stevenson at 7:30 p.m.

Democrats Loaned Argentina Money, Eisenhower Claims

Full Report on Brother Ordered

Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower today stoutly defended his brother, Milton, against charges by Democratic presidential candidate Adlai E. Stevenson that he had figured in appeasement of ex-President Juan Peron of Argentina.

By way of counter-attack, Mr. Eisenhower declared that Democratic administrations, not his administration, had loaned \$130 million to the Peron government.

His eyes flashing, Mr. Eisenhower said he had ordered the State Department to prepare a full report on Dr. Milton Eisenhower's efforts, as the President put it, to promote better friendship in the Western Hemisphere.

He said the State Department report will be made public without comment when it is completed.

President Rankled

The President was clearly rankled by Stevenson's charge in a campaign speech at Miami that the Eisenhower administration had loaned Peron and that a member of the President's "personal family assumed a special, if informal, responsibility for our relationships with Argentina."

Stevenson said the Eisenhower administration had "made loans to Peron and Peron in turn piled up balances of more than \$100 million in Switzerland for the benefit of . . . Peron."

Records of the Export-Import Bank show that the Eisenhower administration offered to lend the government or businesses of Argentina \$62.5 million while Peron was in power but that none of the money actually was transmitted.

The Export-Import records show that the Truman administration agreed to loans totalling more than \$130 million for Peron's regime or Argentine business firms. Of this, about \$101,700,000 actually was drawn by the Argentine government.

Democrats Made Loans

The President said he understood the opposition was very disturbed that the U. S. government had given the Peron government more than \$100 million and that most of this sum had found its way into Swiss banks.

Mr. Eisenhower, in strong tones, said it is true the United States loaned the Peron government \$130 million. But he said it wasn't the Republican administration — it was the Democrats who made the loans before Mr. Eisenhower became president.

Mr. Eisenhower said his administration had not given Peron a single loan. He said the story of the loans is one he regrets, but one which should not be brought to him.

GOP Registrations Still Exceed Demos

Republican registrations in Jackson county still exceed Democratic registrations by 2,256, officials in the county clerk's office reported today.

Registered Republicans total 16,689, Democrats 14,433 and miscellaneous 634. Total voter registrations in the county now stand at 31,756.

On Tuesday and Wednesday of this week, Democratic registration gains exceeded Republican gains by more than two-to-one, officials said. A total of 192 Democrats registered in the two-day period as compared with 93 Republicans. Twelve miscellaneous registrations were reported for the same period.

Oct. 6 will be the final day for voters to register for the Nov. 6 general election. Registrations to date are 4,911 under the total in the 1952 general election. Registered voters then totaled 36,667.

Main Peach Varieties Harvested in Valley

Harvest of main peach varieties in the Rogue valley has been completed, C. B. Cordy, county horticulture agent, reported today.

A few late varieties are still being harvested, he said, but most of the commercial picking is finished.

Cordy said the crop this year has been "very good" and better than this area has had for several years. The problem of split pits, which has been evident in the past, has been barely noticeable this year. He explained this is because of the abundant, high quality crop. Split pits are generally associated with oversized fruit and a light crop.

Another Factor

Another factor in the good crop this year, he pointed out, has been good pollination. "This has generally been a good pollination season and growers are becoming aware of the necessity for cross-pollination," he said.

Experimental Plane Crash Kills Pilot

Edwards AFB, Calif. — (U.P.) — The world's fastest experimental airplane crashed today within two minutes after it was released from the belly of its B50 mother plane, the Air Force announced. The pilot was killed.

The pilot, Capt. Milburn G. Apt. 32, Buffalo, Kan., was on a routine indoctrination flight when the accident occurred at 8 a.m. (PST), the spokesman said.

The plane, dubbed the X-2, crashed at the northeast corner of the base reservation and the pilot's body was found in the cockpit of the aircraft. Cause of the crash was not immediately known.

Men Students Exceed 500 Mark at SOC

Ashland — Men students enrolling at Southern Oregon college have exceeded the 500 mark for the first time in the history of the school, according to Mrs. Mabel W. Winston, registrar, with 505 enrollees tallied on the second day of registration.

The figure represents a 16 per cent increase in men students over a year ago, Mrs. Winston said, adding that the total of women students was up approximately 8 per cent over the preceding year.

Total enrollment Tuesday had reached 810 with registrations slated to continue until Oct. 6. Last year's peak enrollment reached a total of 826 students.

No Andrea Doria Signal Heard, Officer Testifies

New York — (U.P.) — The navigating officer of the Swedish liner Stockholm testified today that if he had heard a whistle signal from the Andrea Doria, it would have helped him to avoid collision with the Italian luxury liner.

The officer, Ernest Carstens-Johannsen, said under cross-examination at a pretrial hearing that he did not hear any signal from the Andrea Doria until after she began to turn across his bow. The two ships collided and the Andrea Doria was sunk.

"Did you hear a whistle from the Andrea Doria to signal this turn?" asked Leonard J. Mattemson, who represents about 300 litigants seeking to recover losses from both the Italian and Swedish American Lines.

Open Economic Warfare Said Declared in Suez Wrangle

Nasser Marshals Forces To Meet U.S. Challenge

Cairo, Egypt — (U.P.) — Egypt considers that the United States has issued an open declaration of economic warfare in the Suez dispute, semi-official sources said today.

President Gamal Abdel Nasser immediately began marshaling his economic forces to meet the challenge, the sources said.

Dulles Gives First Hint
They said Secretary of State John Foster Dulles in a news conference Wednesday made the first direct hint that the United States is seriously considering applying severe economic sanctions against Egypt.

The Dulles statement as reported said there was no necessity to use force in the canal dispute because economic pressure sure would eventually force Egypt to agree to a Suez settlement. This, semi-official sources declared, was "an open declaration of economic warfare against the Nasser regime."

Egypt Said Prepared

Nasser met his ministers in a five-hour session late Wednesday. Sources said Egypt's economic policy dominated the discussions.

The sources said Egypt is quite prepared to meet any economic sanctions that the West may seek to impose. They said such sanctions, especially from the United States, would be painful but not disastrous. Sources bluntly called Dulles' reference to interdependence among nations as "just another word for domination by the big powers."

\$2,307,000 Provided For Klamath Airbase

Klamath Falls — (U.P.) — Rep. Sam Coon (R-Ore.) notified authorities here yesterday that \$2,307,000 had been provided in the military construction program for the Klamath Falls airbase during fiscal 1957.

Salem — (U.P.) — Sales of public land in Oregon by the federal government brought the state \$35,527 during the fiscal year ending June 30.

Gasoline-Laden Tank Car Smacks Train Near Bend

Bend — (U.P.) — A gasoline-laden railroad tank car broke away in the Bend yards early today, raced out of control for nine miles to the north and plunged down grade into the rear of a freight train on a siding at DeSchutes Junction.

No one was injured but Crewman John H. Patterson of The Dalles, was forced to leap for his life from the caboose of the freight train.

Twelve Men on Trial For Riots in Poland

Poznan, Poland — (U.P.) — Twelve men went on trial here today in two separate courtrooms for alleged crimes committed during the June 28 riots.

Three of the men, aged 20 or under and with no previous criminal records, are charged with kicking an unarmed police corporal to death. They face death by hanging if convicted.

Lesser Crimes
Nine other men accused of lesser crimes such as burglary and attacks on the police station are being tried in another courtroom of the squat grey concrete courthouse half a mile from the riot scene.

Another 142 persons will be tried later.

Today's trials opened with a minimum of fanfare. The concrete building was spruced up for the trials and extra police in peaked caps and grey-blue uniforms stood guard before the heavy wooden front doors of the court house beneath a white Polish eagle on a red shield.

Traffic was diverted from the court house square.

53 Said Killed
The government said 53 persons were killed in the disorders, including nine soldiers and public security officials. More than 500 were injured before Polish army tanks intervened. Some 300 persons were arrested but all save 154 were released. Trial of 38 persons begins Oct. 5.

Jacksonville People Hear Ringing Bell In Vacated Building

Jacksonville — A telephone ringing since early Monday morning in the vicinity of fourth and California sts. had Jacksonville residents wondering if they were hearing bells. One annoyed resident yesterday called the telephone company.

The ringing, a long and a short, was coming from a vacated building and could only have been caused by someone dialing a reverting call (that would ring their own number) and leaving the phone off the hook, according to Jack Creager, manager of Pacific Telephone and Telegraph.

A trouble shooter dispatched to the scene could not get in the building and was forced to disconnect the wires at the pole.
