Miss Larsen Tells Kiwanians of New Hospital Facilities

Miss B. J. Larsen, Rouge Valley Memorial Hospital administrator, and E. A. (Al) Littrell, state representative from Jackson county, were speakers yesterday at the Medford Kiwanis club luncheon at Rogue Valley Country club.

I. A. Mirick, Kiwanis club president, presented a \$500 check to Miss Larsen. The money is one half of the sum the club has pledged toward hospital construction at the corner of Barnett rd. and Murphy lane. Littrell, who is carrying on a one-man voter registration campaign among service clubs of the community, urged Kiwanians to be registered by the Oct. 6 deadline and to vote in the Nov. 6 general election.

Jack Rapke reported on a Kiwanis project to encourage a large voter turnout in November. The club is sponsoring a Kids night "get out the vote" contest. Youngsters of the community in the fifth through the ninth grades in Medford will receive blanks on which to secure the signatures of 10 or more adults who pledge to register and vote. Ten signatures will entitle the student free admission to the Crater-Medford High school football game Friday, Oct. 5.

The students will occupy a special bleacher section. A bicycle will be given away at the game.

Rapke is committee chairman for the project. Others on the committee are Ray Johnson, Paul Hornbeck and Bill Singler.

Kiwanians will also publish and sell the football program for the Medford-Klamath Falls game here Oct. 12. Proceeds will go to the United Medford Crusade. Dr. Bill Blackstone is committee chairman.

Ex-Medford Author Pens Book About Big Game Hunting Life

New York—(Special)—"I have lived two lives, a writing life, and a big game hunting life," Edison Marshall said recently, "and I feel they have integrated well."

Marshall's writing includes many novels, including "The Gentleman," "Yankee Pasha," "American Captain," "Caravan to Zanadu," "The Viking," and many others. But hunting has been his great passion since he was big enough to hold a gun. He has now written a personal autobiography telling how this passion taught him, how it shaped his mind and emotions. It is called "The Heart of the Hunter," and McGraw-Hill will publish it Oct. 12.

Started With Ducks

Beginning with ducks in Oregon, Edison was soon hunting moose and caribou in Canada, then grizzly bear in Alaska, rhinos, lions and leopards in Africa, the saladang in Indochina and Burma, and in India the golden fleece, the tiger, and elephant.

In India on the grassland plains, Marshall hunted the tigers that had lived for years, not on jungle wildlife, but on raids on the native's cattle. These were generally old tigers, very large and all with identifying names given them by the villagers—The Grandfather, The Two Brothers, and so on. Hunting them involved building a camouflaged "boma," staking out live bait in the form of a cow, and waiting for the tiger to appear. On his first hunt in the jungles of Southeast Asia, Marshall tells of waiting day after day in a "boma"—seeing only dragon-lizards and jungle fowl coming to feast on a dead cow. And then came the moment that he had been waiting for all his life. "The jungle beyond the bait had become a dark wall. As my gaze skirted it in passing, I saw in great astonishment that it had changed. An immense pale circle, suggesting yellow, had appeared in the middle of it." At first he thought it could not be the head of a tiger because it was too large. "Then," he said, "I knew it could be nothing else."

"A second later the tiger pushed boldly into the open. The illusion of distance still endured, and he seemed to loom out of all proportion to my expectations. But although the light was dim, he did not appear so."

Deadline for Entries In Exposition Listed

Portland—Deadline for beef, dairy cattle, sheep swine and goat entries for the 46th annual Pacific International Livestock Exposition in Portland is Oct. 1. The exposition will be held Oct. 20 to 27.

Requests for entry cards have already been received from livestock breeders in section of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, California, Nevada, Wyoming, Montana, Nebraska, South Dakota, Texas and the British Columbia and Alberta provinces of Canada, according to General Manager Walter A. Holt.

Due to closure of the grandstand in 1953, according to Holt, the exposition will not present the annual rodeo and horse show, but instead will present county exhibits and a twice nightly stage show with matinees on Saturdays and Sundays.

This year's premium money for the stock show totals \$48,000 including \$11,575 for 4-H and Future Farmers of America winners, Holt said.

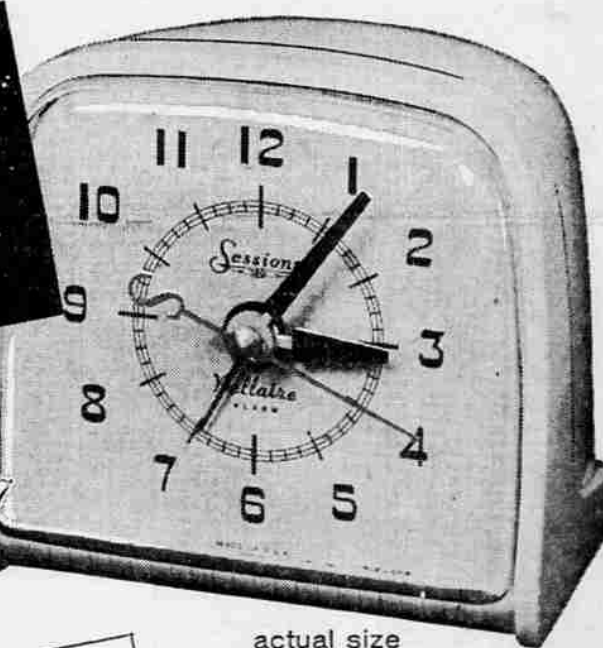
