

YMCA Is Community Enterprise Serving Young People of Area

(Editor's note: This is another in a series of articles concerning agencies which receive funds from contributions to the United Medford Crusade.)

The Medford Young Men's Christian association, which participates in contributions to the United Medford Crusade, is a community enterprise owned and operated by local citizens who are elected to the board by the membership.

The YMCA, which presently has 2,110 members, has been operating here since 1944, and has been located in its present building at 522 West Sixth st. since 1949.

Serves Young People

The community service seeks to serve boys and girls and young men and women without reference to race, religion or social position. Its worldwide enterprise is founded on the conviction that faith holds the answer for men's present needs and the hope for the future.

Activities change to meet the needs of members. A physical education program of swimming, basketball, badminton, handball, with wrestling and boxing was held last year with women and girls participating in volleyball and gym classes and trampoline work.

The Family Council

T.L.R.—Her work gets into my hair.
MRS. T.L.R.—I won't be an idle woman.

T.L.R.—Our recent marriage grew out of "love at first sight." It did not seem important to me until now that the girl I was so much in love with had her own ideas about the future and our future relationship.

She works in a fashion house and is very deeply interested in her work. I was quite proud of this until it began to get in my hair. Now I find that it may wreck our marriage and any chance of happiness.

I have a very prosaic job with a real estate and insurance firm, but I have thought in the past that I might work my way up to a good income and, perhaps, even economic independence and wealth. My wife, however, is so absorbed in her work that mine seems to be a secondary consideration.

If I am to make the most of my opportunities, I should be willing to do some after-hour hustling for sales, and occasionally entertain. My wife is a charming hostess, but she often takes work home with her, and I find myself limiting my efforts in order to fit into her time schedule. She has her business associates over occasionally, but I find myself unable to even suggest inviting mine, so overshadowed is our home with her interests.

I would like her to quit work and help me socially, because I feel that I could easily start on the way up in my business and give her the means for a fine home and a rich family life. She thinks I am "medieval" to have such a thought.

MRS. T.L.R.—It didn't come easy to me to get my chance in the fashion field, and I can't bear the thought of just throwing it over, when it really isn't necessary.

The real trouble is that my husband imagines a problem that doesn't exist. I do want to help him and will do anything he asks. He does not need to subordinate his work to mine, and I will gladly accommodate myself to his business needs, instead of having it the other way around. The one thing I will not do is to quit altogether. I do not

Other Agencies

The 'Y' works with churches, schools and other agencies serving youth. In the schools where Hi-Y and Tri-Y clubs operate, the 'Y' stands for clean speech, clean sports and clean scholarship. Its model legislature for youth held in Salem each spring, trains students in methods of state legislature.

Training leaders is one of the chief functions of the YMCA. Since each of the 85 groups meeting under its auspices needs leadership the leadership is located and trained in the community for service to others either in teaching skills or leading club groups. The 'Y' coordinates activities of laymen who desire to serve young people in the community. Two persons are employed as program directors to coordinate activities of members and interested persons.

The board of directors has set a policy that any youth who cannot afford YMCA membership and wishes to avail himself of the privileges will be given the same type of membership as paying members.

THE COUNCIL: T.L.R. is too dazzled by his wife's success and personality to assert his needs reasonably, so he demands that she give up her work totally. This is not reasonable, because her work in her chosen field fills a deep need in her and also because it would really be wise for her to keep abreast of this field against the possibility that she may some day need the means of earning a livelihood.

In the modern world, with its high taxes and high standards of living, women are finding it increasingly necessary to develop and maintain their own earning power so that they will not be helpless, and utterly dependent, should husband become an invalid or die. Savings, insurance, estates and Social Security often are not enough to provide adequately for a widow, and a job is becoming increasingly necessary to help maintain a normal and balanced life.

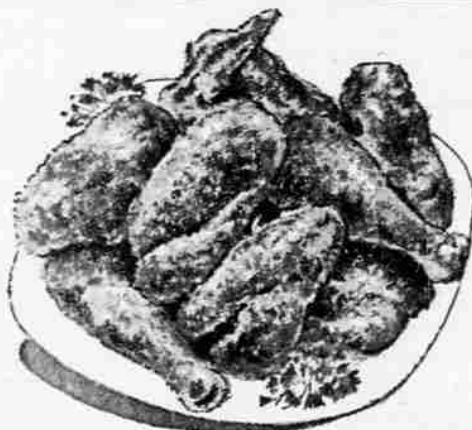
If T.L.R. were to speak plainly and moderately to his apparently very sane and reasonable wife, he will find it unnecessary to have any take-it-or-leave-it showdown. His difficulty is his failure to realize that his wife does not want to subordinate him and would like him to be the head of the family without, however, either defying her or destroying her interests. He needs to cultivate a little more self-esteem, and it will become possible for him to realize that he can take his wife's work interest in his stride.
