Giants Have About Same Club as 1955

New York — (U.P.) — The New York Giants will win the National Football League's Eastern Division title this year if they live up to the victory tradition of their new home.

After 31 campaigns at the Polo Grounds, the Giants have shifted across the Harlem river to play their home games in Yankee stadium where the baseball Yankees have won 20 pennants since 1923.

Basically, the Giants will field the same club which had a 6-5-1 record in 1955, when it was undefeated in its last five games. The champion Cleveland Browns rated the 1955 Giants the best team they faced.

The Giants figure they have a good chance to break Cleveland's unprecedented six-year grip on the Eastern title because they have added strength at offensive end and on their defensive platoon.

Role Back and End
Ken MacAfee, who was hampered by injuries last year, teams with Bob Schnelker as the offensive ends. Capt. Kyle Rote, one of the league's top receivers, again will be used as a back and end. Harold Burnine, the top collegiate receiver of 1955, rounds out the receiving corps.

New York has bolstered its defense with the addition of tackle Dick Modzelewski, end Andy Robustelli and halfback Ed Hughes. All three are experienced pros. Modzelewski, who was with the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1955, was obtained in a complicated, three-club deal while the other two men came from the Los Angeles Rams. Modzelewski and Robustelli are enthusiastic pass rushers.

Jim Katcavage, a 230-pound end from Dayton, is the only rookie on the first string defensive unit. The others on this unit are tackle Roosevelt Grier, middle guard Ray Beck, linebackers Bill Svoboda and Harold Svarre with Ed Hughes, Dick Noland, Emlen Tunnell and Herb Rich scheduled to handle the secondary chores.

The Giants have two of the league's most versatile offensive halfbacks in Frank Gifford and Alex Webster. Mel Triplett, a second-year pro, is the fullback but Bobby Epps will return from a service stint midway in the campaign to bolster this position.

Coach Jim Lee Howell plans to use the quarterback rotation he developed last year. Don Heinrich will start at the position in most games and Charley Conerly will replace him after watching the contest for a time with the coaches.

The rest of the offensive line consists of Roosevelt Brown and Dick Yelvington at the tackles. Bill Austin and Jack Stroud at the guards and Ray Wietecha at center.

Although Cleveland as lost Otto Graham, the Giants still believe the Browns will be the team to beat in the Eastern race. They aren't greeting Cleveland's poor exhibition record with shouts of glee.

"It's the worst record Cleveland has had since the last exhibition season," a New York official said with a wry grin.

Upsets Scored In Tennis Meet

All other seeded players scored victories but some of them did not come easy.

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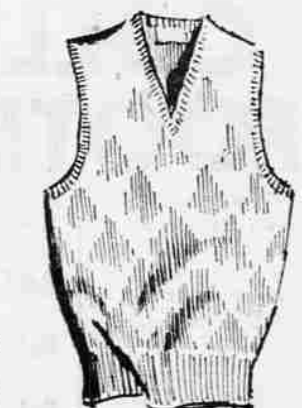
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
