Eggs Purchased In Efforts To Bolster Prices

Washington—U.P.—The Agriculture Department today bought 589,500 dozen medium-size shell eggs in the first round of an effort to bolster egg prices for farmers.

Officials said egg purchases will continue on a weekly basis until further notice. The next round of bids from suppliers will be due here Oct. 2.

Prices Vary Widely
Today's purchases, totaling 19,650 cases of 30 dozen each, were made at prices ranging from 33 to 42 cents a dozen and totaled about \$230,000, the department said.

Prices varied widely because of area differences in transportation costs, officials said. The egg buying program is one of three current federal moves to prop sagging poultry markets. The Agriculture Department is also buying surplus turkeys and offering to subsidize poultry exports to West Germany.

Eggs Going to Schools
The eggs purchased today will be donated to school lunchrooms and other non-profit institutions. Purchases were made from 17 out of 32 bidders who offered the government a total of 56,860 cases of eggs. Most of the successful bidders were located in Minnesota and Iowa, with others in Ohio, Utah, California, Oregon and Washington.
