Feeding the Family

Gismo Sandwich is San Pedro Favorite

Among the 20 best sandwiches of the year chosen by the National Restaurant Association in a prize contest is this family-size recipe from John C. Verner, chef at the Hacienda Hotel, San Pedro. The All-American favorite, the hamburger, dons formal attire. It's very becoming and wonderful eating.

- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
6 enriched hamburger buns
Butter or margarine
Lettuce leaves
12 tomato slices
12 avocado slices
6 slices American cheese
6 slices Canadian style bacon
Make six beef patties. Brown in skillet or broiler. Split buns and spread with butter or margarine. Toast on grill. On bottom half of each bun, place lettuce leaf, two tomato slices and two avocado slices. On top half of each bun, place cooked beef patty topped with one cheese slice. Place under broiler until cheese has melted. Grill bacon and place on top of cheese. Serve open-face. What a sandwich! No wonder it rated among country's best! A meal in itself.

Curried Cheese Prize Sandwich

Another of the sandwiches adjudged best in the country by restaurateurs is this curried cheese and olive broiler sandwich from Miss Bernice Goodrich, Cashier of the Totem Pole Restaurant, Vancouver, Washington. A good choice for a quick supper. Serve straight from the broiler.

- 1 cup chopped ripe olives
1/2 cup thinly sliced green onions
1 1/2 cups shredded American cheese
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon curry powder or 1/2 teaspoon chili powder
6 English muffins, halved
Mix olives, onions, cheese, mayonnaise, salt and curry powder. Toast muffins, then spread with cheese filling. Broil until filling is heated and cheese melts. Use two muffin halves per serving. Makes six sandwiches.

Ambrosia Jiffy Cakes Are Teen Toppers

Teen-agers and "un-teen-agers" will delight in this quick, easy-to-make (and easy-to-carry if you're going someplace) cake with its frosting that is broiled right on the cup cakes.

- 1 1/3 cups sifted cake flour
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon allspice
1/4 cup shortening
2 teaspoons grated orange peel
3/4 cup sugar
1 egg
1/4 cup evaporated milk
1/4 cup fresh orange juice
Sift flour and baking powder, salt and spices. Cream shortening with orange peel adding sugar gradually and creaming until fluffy. Add egg and beat until well blended. Combine milk and orange juice. Add flour mixture alternately with liquid, beginning and ending with flour. Put paper muffin cups into muffin pans and fill each cup two-thirds full. Makes 13 or 14 medium-size cup cakes. Bake in moderate oven, 375 degrees for about 20 minutes or until golden brown. Top with: Ambrosia Jiffy Frosting. Melt three tablespoons butter; add one-half cup firmly packed brown sugar, one cup coconut and one tablespoon grated orange peel. Blend in one-fourth cup finely chopped orange pulp (made by peeling the orange and then chopping it into small pieces). Spread the mixture over cakes that have already been baked; place under broiler as far from heat as possible. Broil a few seconds or until topping bubbles and coconut starts to brown.

Ocean Perch Fillets

Because ocean perch fillets are bland, many like to dress them up in ways like this. Line a well-oiled loaf pan with crumbs. Dredge eight ocean perch fillets with flour and season with salt and pepper. Place two or three fillets in pan; top with slices of onion, then with fresh dill or thinly sliced dill pickle and cover with sour cream. Repeat these layers until all the fillets are used, topping with sour cream. Bake at 375 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes or until cream is a golden color. Unmold and sprinkle with chopped parsley.

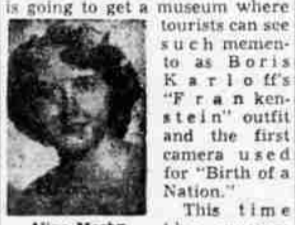
