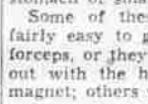
Things Small Children Get Into Lungs or Stomach

Anyone who will visit an expert bronchoscopist or gastroscopist (a physician who looks into the lungs or stomach) with a lighted tube into the lungs or gullet (or stomach) is likely to be shown a basket full of queer objects which have been removed from the air passages or stomach of small children.

Some of these objects were fairly easy to get hold of with forceps, or they could be pulled out with the help of a strong magnet; others which are round and smooth like a peanut may have been very hard to grip and remove. Many an open safety-pin had to be closed before it could be withdrawn. Experts have a special piece of apparatus on the end of a long wire with which they can close such an open safety-pin.

Occasionally, a small child will live for months with a peanut or other small object in the lung, and the parents will not suspect what is wrong. All they will know is that the child has a cough and is not well. Then an X-ray film of the chest may give a hint, showing, as it does, that part of the lung is shut off and not working.

One of the worst things a mother can do to her baby is to

give him her button basket with which to play. This is only asking for trouble. Some of the objects get stuck in a child's gullet and then must be removed by an expert. Many of those that get down into the stomach can be left alone, because they eventually will be passed by rectum. Iron-containing objects that do not leave the stomach can sometimes be drawn out with the help of one of the new powerful magnets. In some cases the stomach has to be opened and the foreign body removed.

It would be well if mothers would train themselves to think of the possible dangers to a child before an accident happens, rather than after it happens!

A Shaking Head or Hand

Many elderly persons are unhappy because their hand or their head shakes. Often a shaking hand is hereditary; it may run in the family, and there is little I know of to do for it. In some cases, when a shaking is due to a Parkinson's syndrome the trouble is either a little unrecognized stroke, which injured the brain, or an encephalitis (brain fever). In these cases the physician can try a number of drugs which tend to quiet the tremor. I don't know of anything to do for a shaking head.

The Family Council

Editor's note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual report. The Family Council does not give advice; it merely reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Mrs. K.M.—My husband loves our adopted daughter best.

K.M.—My wife's the one who is playing favorites with the children.

Mrs. K.M.—Five years ago my husband and I adopted a little girl. We believed we could have no children of our own, but last year I gave birth to a son. We should be supremely happy, but my husband is spoiling our family life by making our little girl his favorite and paying too little attention to our son.

He shows no interest at all in the baby and is constantly after me for what he calls my neglect of our daughter. Naturally a baby requires more attention, but of course I love Laura with all my heart and give her the affection and attention she requires.

K.M.—My wife once confessed that no matter how much she loves Laura, she can't feel quite the same toward her as she does toward our son. Now I feel girls require more attention and I think Laura particularly should get it because of any problems that may develop as a result of her being adopted. Besides, Laura is old enough to talk and play and there is little a man can do with a baby. It's really my wife who is playing favorites with the children.

The Council—This couple has gotten into deep water through too much analysis of their own feelings and their refusal to take simple facts at their face value.

Mrs. K.M. is 100 per cent right when she says babies require more attention and her husband is perfectly right when he points out "Laura is old enough to talk and play and there is little a man can do with a baby." His feeling that little girls might require more attention is also fairly reasonable.

Why all the complication then?

Apparently this couple was so overwhelmed with happiness and gratitude at the birth of their own son, the husband began to develop a fear that all this happiness was taking something away from the child he had a particular obligation to love. Under pressure of these feelings he apparently extracted a confession from his wife that she too, feels something quite special for her son.

While these two are analyzing motives and weighing and measuring amounts of love and attention, their normal expression of feeling for their children is being spoiled. They should accept the fact that it is natural to feel some special thrill about a child they believed could never be. This need not detract one iota from their love for the little
