Britain Completes Plans to Iron Out Suez Differences

'Anxious' to Clear Misunderstandings

London — (U.P.)—Britain completed plans last night to iron out differences with Washington over Suez Canal policies before the issue goes to the United Nations security council this week. Prime Minister Sir Anthony Eden's government was reported "very anxious" to clear up misunderstandings over the timing of the British-French approach to the security council. Appeal to UN Britain and France appealed to the UN body last Sunday, and Egypt followed with its own appeal Monday. The council decided to consider the Anglo-French request first, and the debate starts in New York Friday. As interpreted here, the United States attitude is that the Franco-British move was "precipitate." But London and Paris felt that, if they had delayed, Egypt would have been able to get its appeal in first. However, the British have felt uneasy over Secretary of State John Foster Dulles' reported misgivings about their move. Dulles is known to have wanted a delay in bringing the Suez issue before the security council. Declare Threat As conceived in London, the Western line will be to ask the security council to declare that Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser's nationalization of the Suez Canal last July 26 was a "threat" to or "breach" of the peace. The West then will ask recommendations for a settlement. The strategy will be to seek endorsement of the 18-nation plan worked out at the first Suez conference in August and rejected this month by Nasser. This plan calls for internationalization of the waterway, the keystone of British-French policy in the Suez situation.

Two Injured When Struck by Moving Vehicles in City

Two persons were injured when struck by vehicles in Medford Friday and Saturday. Mrs. Roberta Wolfe, 39, of 730 Queen's drive, Medford, was reported in "good" condition at Osteopathic hospital Saturday after being struck by a train Friday afternoon. City police said the accident occurred about 4:17 p.m. at 215 East Jackson st., Medford. According to the report, Mrs. Wolfe started to cross the tracks, then turned back. She was struck in the back and knocked down by a northbound Southern Pacific engine and two cars. Eugene Engineer Engineers were identified as Lee Hargrove, Eugene. Hargrove told officers he applied all emergency stop devices as soon as he saw the pedestrian. No further information concerning the accident was available. Mrs. Wolfe sustained contusions, bruises and a minor head injury. She was expected to remain in the hospital for another day or two, officials said. She was taken to the hospital by Medford Ambulance service. Alva Jean Clymer, 4, daughter of Mrs. Alva Clymer, Butte Falls, suffered bruises and abrasions to her head and limbs about 1:58 p.m. yesterday when she was struck by a car operated by Daren Lane Flickinger, 32, of 724 West Second st., Medford, on Oak at, between Haven and Jackson sts., according to Medford police. Not Serious She was taken to Sacred Heart hospital by Medford ambulance service. Hospital attendants said her condition was not serious. She stayed overnight at the hospital for observation. According to the driver, police said, the girl ran out into the street and Flickinger did not see her in time to stop. The accident happened across from her grandmother's residence, Mrs. Fanny Rozell, 620 Oak st., Medford, where she was visiting with her mother, police reported.

New Jersey Judge President's Choice For Supreme Court

William Brennan To Fill Minton's Post

Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower Saturday chose William Joseph Brennan Jr., 50-year-old New Jersey judge who is a Democrat and a Catholic to fill an impending vacancy on the U. S. Supreme Court. The White House announced that Brennan, now an associate justice of the New Jersey State Supreme Court, will be appointed to the nation's highest tribunal Oct. 15 to succeed Justice Sherman Minton who is retiring because of failing health. Surprises Capitol Brennan's appointment will leave the court with six Democrats and three Republicans. Brennan will be the first member of the Catholic faith on the high bench since the death in 1949 of the late Associate Justice Frank Murphy of Michigan. He will serve under a recess appointment until January when the President will submit a formal nomination to the Senate for approval. Legal Career Brennan has had a distinguished legal career although he was largely unknown to the nation at large. A graduate of Harvard Law school, he practiced law in Newark from 1931 to 1949 when he became a State Superior Court judge. He moved up to New Jersey's Appellate Court division in 1950 and to the State Supreme Court in 1952. Mr. Eisenhower's two previous appointees were Republicans — Chief Justice Earl Warren and Associate Justice John Marshall Harlan. Hunter Said Lost Near Lake of Woods Klamath Falls — (U.P.) — State police and the Klamath air force unit were alerted last night that a 20-year-old Klamath Falls hunter was missing and believed to have become lost in the densely wooded Lake-of-the-Woods area. State police officers identified the hunter as Donald Barron. They said he had set out on a hunting expedition early yesterday morning and was expected to return to his home by 11 a.m. By nightfall he had not been heard from. State police said that possibly a plane from the air rescue unit would be sent up last night to attempt to locate Barron should he have been able to light a fire. The rugged mountain area in which the youth was believed to have been hunting is about 30 miles west of here. County Gets Identical Bids on Paving Project The Jackson county court received identical bids from Rogue River Paving company and T. R. Florey, both of Medford, for work on the parking lot behind the courthouse. Both firms bid \$1,575 for grading and paving the lot, which consists of 700 square yards. Anastasio Somoza Shot by Assassin Early Last Weekend

Death Ascribed to General Fatigue

Balboa, Canal Zone — (U.P.) — President Anastasio Somoza of Nicaragua died at a U.S. Military hospital here Saturday of bullet wounds suffered at the hands of an assassin eight days ago. President Eisenhower, who had marshalled a top-light medical team to try to save the 60-year-old Nicaraguan strongman, expressed his regret in a formal statement and paid tribute to Somoza as a steadfast friend of the United States. Death came unexpectedly. Until Friday, Somoza has been on the recovery list at Gorgas hospital. Shortly after midnight, he began to decline. At 5:05 a.m. he succumbed while members of his family stood at his bedside. Col. Charles O. Bruce, health officer of the canal zone, ascribed death to general fatigue and Somoza's inability to recover from the debilitating effects of the four shots pumped into him by Rigoberto Lopez Perez, a disgruntled Nicaraguan who had proclaimed his hatred for Somoza. The 27-year-old assassin was slain on the spot by Somoza's bodyguards. Somoza died one day after his younger son, 34-year-old Luis, had been named acting president of the Congress in Managua, capital of Nicaragua. Luis, head of the Congress, was chosen to run the country pending his father's return or until May, 1957, when Somoza's current term was to have run out. In a communique directed to the Nicaraguan people, the younger Somoza announced that his father's body will be brought home to the country he had ruled since 1932 for burial with high honors. Ellsworth Sets Visit In County This Week Harris Ellsworth, Republican seeking reelection as congressman from Oregon's fourth district, will spend this week in Jackson county, it was announced Saturday. On Monday and Tuesday he will be in the Ashland area. He will deliver a major address at Southern Oregon college Wednesday morning. Ellsworth will visit Medford, Central Point, Gold Hill, Rogue River, Eagle Point and Shady Cove Wednesday afternoon, Thursday, Friday and Saturday. A series of neighborhood socials have been planned for Friday and Saturday by the Ellsworth for Congress committee. Co-chairman of Ellsworth's campaign committee in Medford are Curt Hopkins and Mrs. C. H. Buffington. Transient Found Dead Near Drive-In Saturday Joe Bailey, 58, transient, was found dead about 1:50 p.m. yesterday afternoon behind a pile of sand near Highway 62, behind the Rogue Drive-In theater near Bear Creek, according to state police. His body was found by Paul Buel Allen, transient, who is a fruit worker in the county, state police said. Cause of death was apparently natural, according to the county coroner, Carlos Morris.

Accidental Gunshots Fatal to Two in State

By UNITED PRESS Accidental gunshots Friday took the lives of two Oregon residents on the eve of the opening of deer hunting season. Dead were Jerald John Lorence, 17, of Hillsboro, and James F. Miller, 23, of St. Helens. Lorence was killed by a shotgun in the hands of a friend. Sheriff's deputies described the shooting as accidental. Information available at the sheriff's office indicated that Lorence was in the home of 18-year-old Dwayne Duling of Hillsboro, with several other companions. Sample Wine They said that the youths apparently wanted to sample some wine which Duling had fermented in the attic of the home and he objected. Larry Brentano, 18, Beaverton, took a 12-gauge shotgun, loaded it and apparently intended to bluff his way into the attic. Duling refused to believe the gun was loaded and, after pointing it toward the roof and pulling the trigger, aimed the gun at Lorence. The gun discharged, the bullet striking Lorence in the chest. Miller was killed while discussing a hunting expedition with several companions at the home of Fred Hora, St. Helens. Jack Rofinet, 19, of St. Helens, told police he fired the shot from a .22 caliber pistol which killed Rofinet. Rofinet was confined to a hospital, apparently suffering from shock. Hora said he had cleaned his .22 caliber pistol, reloaded it and placed it in a holster. Rofinet said he picked up the holster, strapped it on and then "quick drew" the pistol and pointed it at Miller. The pistol discharged, wounding Miller who died en route to a Portland hospital. Officers identified the tot as Carol Sue Bowman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Bowman of O'Brien. She was hospitalized with serious abdominal wounds. The child was staying at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Morgan during the absence of her parents. Mrs. Morgan said she could not explain the presence of the shell in the fireplace but that the child had been putting rubbish and papers from outside the home into the fireplace and possibly had picked up the live shell.

Quake Hits Japan; One Dead, 4 Hurt

Tokyo — (U.P.) — The strongest earthquake, in recent years struck the world's third largest city today, toppling chimneys, disrupting transportation and cracking concrete foundations of downtown buildings. One person was killed and four injured, one seriously, when the quake touched off landslides and shocked loose timbers and bricks. The person killed was a woman who was buried alive by a landslide which crashed down upon her house as she was preparing breakfast. The quake, coming at 8:21 a.m. started with a gentle roll but built up quickly into a savage jerking, twisting motion that sent residents rushing from their homes in terror. Tokyo residents said it was the strongest quake they could remember in at least five years. Early police reports said one home was totally destroyed and several damaged. At least five tall brick chimneys collapsed under the rock and roll motion. A brick factory in Yokohama was heavily damaged. Santa Cruz De Tenerife, Canary Islands — (U.P.) — A Spanish airliner carrying a football team caught fire in the air and crashed into a house here Saturday killing one person.

Confession Retracted By Polish Worker

Poznan, Poland — (U.P.) — A young Polish worker told a crowded court here Saturday he confessed to all charges against him for his part in the June 28 uprising because he feared he might be "badly beaten" if he maintained his innocence. Jan Suwart, 22, retracted his "confession" at the third session of a trial in which he and eight others are charged with stealing weapons and a tank and shooting up the Poznan Security Police Station in the riots. In a separate room of the two-story county court building, three others are being tried for murdering a corporal in the uprising. No other bids were received.

Unander, Vandenburg Get Labor Endorsing

Portland — (U.P.) — Organized labor's committee on political education Saturday issued its state wide recommendations on candidates and issues in the November election, endorsing Democratic candidates with but two exceptions. Republican State Treasurer Sig Unander was recommended to labor voters over his Democratic opponent and Carl Francis, Republican candidate for attorney general, was endorsed over Robert Y. Thornton, the Democratic incumbent. George Brown, executive director of COPE for the AFL-CIO Oregon State Labor Council, explained the endorsement of Unander over Democrat Wiley Smith of Portland, "Unander has conducted the affairs of the treasurer's office in a sound and fair manner." Not Upheld Regarding Thornton, Brown said "we didn't like Robert Y. Thornton's record in office." He said too many of Thornton's opinions had not been upheld by the courts. Rep. Edith Green was endorsed as congresswoman from the third district. Brown said her record the past term in Congress "outweighed the fine labor record in the state legislature of her Republican opponent, Phil Roth." Circuit Judge David R. Three Shots Prove Safe Against Polio

Washington — (U.P.) — The Public Health Service said Saturday that three Salk shots have proved 100 per cent effective against polio so far this year. Dr. David E. Price, assistant Surgeon General, also disclosed that the record among children who received only two shots has been "awfully good" although some did get polio. Price made the statements to newsmen amid indications that 1956 will be the lightest polio season since the unusually low year of 1947. Six Children Burn To Death in Home Milwaukee, Wis. — (U.P.) — Six children died without a chance to escape from a fire which officials said apparently smoldered for nearly an hour before breaking out Friday. Milwaukee police were holding the children's father, whom they said, had been in either a tavern or a neighborhood home drinking when the blaze destroyed his family in suburban Oak Creek. Peter Vallariel, 36, a glue factory employee, was to be questioned further Saturday by authorities. His wife, Romona, 26, and their 10-year-old son, Joseph, had gone to find Vallariel, leaving the children in care of Martha, 10. The victims were Martha, Stella, 8, Mary Ann, 7, Peter, 5, Jane, 3, and Frank, 11 months. Danville, Va. — (U.P.) — Air Force Secretary Donald A.
