

Medford, Marshfield Deadlock In Bruising Gridiron Encounter

Top Ranked Prep Crews Knot 20-20

Who boasts the best high school football team in Oregon? You can still take your choice and it might rest largely on sentiment. But the big question remained without a definite answer satisfactory to all when No. 1 ranked Marshfield and No. 2 ranked Medford, fought to a heart-palpitating stand-off Friday night on the Black Tornado gridiron.

Medford's stout-hearted Tornado and Marshfield's burly machine-like blue and gold Pirates each had their supporters after a tremendous fired-up bruising rock-em sock-em 20 to 20 thriller-filled struggle.

And most fans, no matter which club they favor, already are talking of a Black Tornado-Buccaneer rematch at the close of the season in the finals for the Oregon A-1 diadem. Both aggregations still have a long haul ahead but that does not diminish the keen anticipation of another blistering "Battle of the Giants."

String Extended

There's no doubt but what the two potent evils of southern and southwestern Oregon are on the spot, as the class of Oregon, Marshfield through the deadlock extended its string without a defeat to 27 games. Medford's star gained brilliance in the tie and the two schools are the powers with which the other A-1 must reckon through district and probably state play-off schedules.

Friday's ruckus, with prestige much at stake, had no conference or district significance.

It was a clash of blazing, keyed-up fighting spirit on both sides of the scrimmage line and up to the finish the outcome in the bruiser could have gone either way. Medford came from behind twice to go in front. The Pirates erased a one-touchdown Tornado lead to gain their tie.

Marshfield looked the class of the state in the opening minutes with its massive line and the two-pronged thrust of halfbacks Jack Shanley and Roger Johnson. The Pirates hanged to an early TD with Johnson scoring. The Tornado, sparked by the fighting defensive work of big tackle Neil Plumley, in its quick hitting line, then caught fire to throw back the Buc attack and got a touchdown of its own on a pass, quarterback Dick McLaughlin to halfback Eldon Francis. Johnson put the coast area club back in front with a pass interception run but Medford came back with a take field goal play and pass end Dick Cople to fullback Bobby Gee.

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yards. Hardy Spurgeon's kick for an extra point was wide. A 15-yard clipping infraction set the Pirates back on the drive but they made up for it on a 21-yard pass play quarterback Smith to Johnson.

The Coos Bay school came on with another first quarter threat when Medford was forced to punt from the Pirate 43 after moving the ball from its 40-yard line on its first scrimmage series. Shanley ran the ball back 38 yards to his 48 but the Bucs were charged with clipping and put back on their 32. Helped by a 36-yard scamper by Johnson and 17-yarder by Shanley Marshfield got down to the Medford four yard line.

Bucs Thrown Back

Then and there, under the leadership of game co-captain Plumley, the Black Tornado turned the tide and threw back the Pirates. Francis cracked through and Shanley lost three more. Smith trying to pass was caught by Plumley back on the 13 and Plumley and Cople dragged plopped Smith back on the 25 where the Tornado took over on downs.

Quarterback McLaughlin, halfback Francis and fullback Bob Gee combined to put the ball on the 38. From there McLaughlin threw to Francis who took the ball on the Marshfield 35 and raced to the goal. Cople booted the bonus and Medford headed 7 to 6.

Medford got a break when Pirate end Chuck Ambary, returning the kick-off, fumbled and Francis recovered on the Tornado 48 but the opportunity backfired almost as suddenly as it came. Halfback Riley's flat pass to the right was intercepted by fleet Roger Johnson. He gathered in the ball on the dead run with his left arm and romped 43 yards to the end zone. Spurgeon's conversion try was good, giving the Coos Bay club a 13 to 7 edge at the end of the first quarter.

Cople to Gee
The Tornado capitalized on a big chance in second quarter for touchdown No. 2. Spurgeon fumbled on a punt runback and Cople fell on the ball for Medford. In seven plays the Pirate Capital club got to the 6 1/2 yard line. Medford went into field goal formation with Cople in the booting spot. But instead of kicking Cople passed to Gee wide open in the end zone.

When the thumping Medford end added the extra point the Tornado was on top again 14 to 13. And that was the score at the half.

Getting the only TD of the third panel, the Tornado moved 73 yards in 16 plays to strike the pay area in the closing moments of the period. Longest gains of the push were eight yards by Gee and seven by Francis. Penalties of 15 yards for holding and five for delay against Marshfield eased the march and McLaughlin sneaked over the final stripe from the three. Cople's kick was wide.

Pirates Knot Game
The Medford kick-off was the last play of the third quarter. Shanley ran the ball back 30 yards to the midfield stripe. Marshfield required 10 scrimmage plays from that point for its touchdown. Nine of them gained to the 10 at which point the Tornado was flagged for holding. That put the pigskin on the one and Johnson crashed right guard to score. Spurgeon toed the tying extra point.

Closing moments saw two Medford field goal tries fail. First came with Medford on the Buc 34. Center snap was low and Francis couldn't get the ball set in place in time for a kick. The Tornado lost five yards and the ball.

Marshfield gained little ground and Medford took over on its 42 after the punt. McLaughlin completed a 38-yard pass to Francis and his heave to Riley gained to the nine. With 16 seconds left Cople tried the placement with Francis holding the ball on the 20. The boot was low and wide.

Grants Pass Defeats Crater Comets 26-13 In Conference Hassle

Central Point — The Grants Pass high Cavemen, who had the ball in their possession through most of the game, subdued a plucky Crater eleven 26 to 13 here Friday night in the opening 1936 Southern Oregon conference grid hassle for both schools.

The Comets of Central Point had trouble getting a sustained drive of their own going when they had the ball but the Crater defensive line came through with fine work which kept the Cavemen from turning more of their thrusts into touchdowns.

Grants Pass was on top 13 to 7 after one quarter of play. That was also the halftime score. The Cavemen touchdown in the third quarter for 20 to 7, and each club got over the goal in the final period.

18 First Downs
With the ball in their hands so much of the evening the GP crew rolled up 18 first downs and 424 yards from scrimmage while Crater had only four first downs and got 181 yards rushing and passing.

Driving 76 yards after the opening kick-off, GP had its first touchdown in 11 plays. Jim Smith passed to Mike Sparlin for 43 yards and the score. Dewayn Gurule booted the extra point. Crater marched from its own 42-yard line in eight plays for a touchdown after the Grants Pass kick-off. George Juveland went

the last yard after Don Goyette had scooted for 34 yards. Juveland also ran over the bonus to tie up the game.

The Cavemen wasted no time in heading for the goal again. They went 62 yards in five plays with Chuck Lasher going the last 18. The TD actually came after time for the quarter ran out. Timmer Bob Monsey's gun misfired. He ran out on the field to stop the game but official Jake Leicht waved him back and Lasher took the ball across the goal. Gurule's kick failed.

Lasher Goes 22
In the third stanza Grants Pass sailed 49 yards in 10 plays with Lasher going the final 22 and Gurule converting. A 54-yard push in the final panel took seven moves with Jack Dean booming the last 17. Gurule's kick failed and it was 26 to 7. Crater in the closing period got the ball on its 33. Three plays carried to the GP 48 and Allen pitched to Gerald Kline on a pass good for a touchdown. Juveland was short on his run for an extra.

Crater was almost in a good scoring spot in the second chukker. The Comets blocked a Caveman punt and would have had the ball on the GP 20-yard line but for a charge of roughing the kicker.

Guards Dick Rainey, Rodger Seaman and Don Hubbard sparked the Comet line in its efforts to halt the Cavemen.

Grants Pass got 294 of its yards on the ground and 130 in the air. Crater had 109 rushing and 72 on passing.

It was the inaugural in District 6 A-1 for Crater, which up to this year was an A-2 school.

SPARTANS HALT INDIANS
Palo Alto, Calif. — (UP) — A powerful line that smothered Stanford on both offense and defense gave the Michigan State Spartans a methodical 21-7 victory in an intercollegiate battle here Saturday before 53,000 fans.

Coach Duffy Daugherty's Rose Bowl champions had complete ball control and marched from one end of the field to the other while tossing only six passes all day.

With halfback Clarence Peaks and Denny Mendyk doing the ball packing Michigan State bit away small chunks of yardage as they scored one touchdown in the first quarter and two more in the third. The lone Stanford tally came in the second period—via the aerial route as expected.

7th Grade Grid Coaches Split Squads

The Medford seventh grade intramural football league will have its first game on Friday, Oct. 12. Championship for the four-grade season will be determined on a point basis with clubs getting two points for a victory and one for a tie.

Until last Friday seventh grade mentors at Hedrick and McLoughlin Junior High schools coached the gridgers as a single unit at each school. On Friday the two coaches at each school chose up teams making two at each school and four in the city.

The teams from now on will work as four separate units. The coaches are Tom Quinowski (Blacks) and Keith Garrett (Whites) at McLoughlin, and Bruce Nelson (Blues) and Loren Carter (Reds) at Hedrick.

Coin Flipped
Players at the two schools were divided into linemen and backs in the Friday selection and the coaches of each school flipped a coin for first choice.

National High School federation rules are being followed with some exceptions. Quarters will be eight minutes. Tennis shoes are required and no cleats will be permitted.

Seventh grade coaches are responsible to head coaches Mel Boldenow at McLoughlin and Barney Riggs at Hedrick for the system of play used. Basic plays, defenses and methods of executing fundamentals are to be determined by the two head mentors. The coaches of the four teams may add their variations after basic requirements have been met, according to Lee V. Ragsdale, supervisor of physical education for the Medford public schools.

Elementary school football season will begin on Thursday, Oct. 4 with all five schools competing. Jefferson, in its second year of operation as a school, will take part on a full time basis for the first time this year. Coaches are Cliff McLean at Roosevelt, Loren Soderlund at Lincoln, Morris Jimenez at Jackson, Donald Littman at Jackson and Bob Phillips at Jefferson.
