Air Force Pair Weds In Germany

Talent—Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph F. Sun, married April 2 at Ramstein Air Base in Germany, are living at Kaiserslautern in that country. Mrs. Sun is the former Erna Rose Ronse, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles J. Ronse, route 1, box 512, Talent, and the bridegroom's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Felipe B. Sun, Salinas, Calif.

The bride was a communications specialist in the 604th Communications squadron of the United States Air Force at the time of her marriage, and Mr. Sun is a member of the 544th Air Force band. They expect to remain in Germany until Mr. Sun's term of service expires in 1958.

The marriage ceremony took place in the chapel at the Ramstein base, with the Rev. David B. Schuck, Catholic chaplain, officiating. About 75 guests attended the ceremony, and 120 were present for the reception which followed at the non-commissioned officers' club.

The bride wore a floor-length gown of white satin with a princess bodice of velvet and a floor-length cape of white velvet with arabesque collar. Her short veil was held by a wreath of pink rosebuds and the rosebuds also trimmed the cape collar and the waist of the dress. She carried a white missal with two large roses.

Mrs. Regina Meyer was matron-of-honor. She wore a frock of pink paper taffeta, ballerina length, with a short cape of pink satin. Her flowers were pink roses.

Staff Sgt. James M. Evans escorted the bride to the altar, and ushers were Master Sgt. S. J. Cammarano and Airman Robert Sierman.

Johannes Nussa, the chapel organist, played wedding music which the bridegroom had composed for the ceremony.

In June the couple took a wedding trip which included Berchtesgaden, Vienna, Rome, Naples, Amsterdam, Lucerne, Paris and Ghent.

The bride resided in Talent for 10 years before enlisting in the Women's Air Force, and has been in Germany for two years. The bridegroom has resided in Salinas all his life and has been in Germany since September of 1955. He was a senior at College of the Pacific, Stockton, Calif., when he joined the USAF in 1954.

Licensed Practical Nurses To Hold State Session Here

The annual state convention of the Oregon Licensed Practical Nurses' association will open in Medford Tuesday, October 2. Sessions will be held in the Pioneer room of the Jackson hotel, with Mrs. Oma Pysher, Portland, state president, presiding.

Mrs. Pysher will arrive in the city tomorrow to consult with Mrs. Bessie Baldwin, convention chairman and president of the Jackson county association, hostess group. She will conduct a state board meeting Tuesday night.

Registration is set for 6 to 10 p.m. Tuesday, and 8 to 9 a.m. Wednesday, with the first business meeting to begin at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday in the Pioneer room. The Rev. George R. V. Bolster of St. Mark's Episcopal church will give the invocation and Girls Scouts of Troop 75 will salute the colors.

Mayor Earl Miller and Otto Ewaldsen, president of Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, will extend greetings and Mrs. Baldwin will welcome the group. Mrs. Pysher will deliver the president's message, and the Gideon society will extend greetings.

Dr. Alvin Roberts will be speaker for the Wednesday luncheon, his topic to be "Better Patient Care."

Other Medford and valley physicians and registered nurses are on the program for the remainder of the session, and a tour of the Bear Creek plant is planned for Wednesday afternoon. Reports and election are on the agenda for Thursday, with Mrs. William Ardry of Medford to serve as parliamentarian.

The convention will close with a banquet Thursday night with Dr. Elmo Stevenson, president of Southern Oregon college, Ashland, as the main speaker. Mrs. Lester Gilman, registered nurse, will be mistress of ceremonies and new officers for the group will be installed.

Licensed Practical Nurses' association is comparatively a new one in the state, and grew out of the acute shortage of registered nurses. It is pointed out that hospitals, public health associations, the American Nurse's association, the American Medical association and other agencies have encouraged the movement and are putting forth efforts to interest persons in entering the practical nurse's field. A study of the Oregon situation was made in 1948 by the Oregon State Nurses' association, and it was found that a great need existed for practical nurses.

Earlier, in 1944, representatives of interested organizations had met in Washington D. C., to discuss how the nursing shortage might be met, and a committee was appointed to examine the problem. This committee analyzed the duties of a practical nurse and made suggestions for organization of a training program, working for two years.

Through the initiative of Oregon State Nurses' association, various groups worked to secure permissive licensing laws, and to establish training courses in this state. As of July 15, 1952, a total of 1,022 practical nurses had been licensed under Oregon law. To be eligible an applicant must have a high school education or its equivalent, pass a health examination, be of good moral character, have a certificate from a practical nurse's school and pass an examination. At present the only two schools are in Portland and Klamath Falls.

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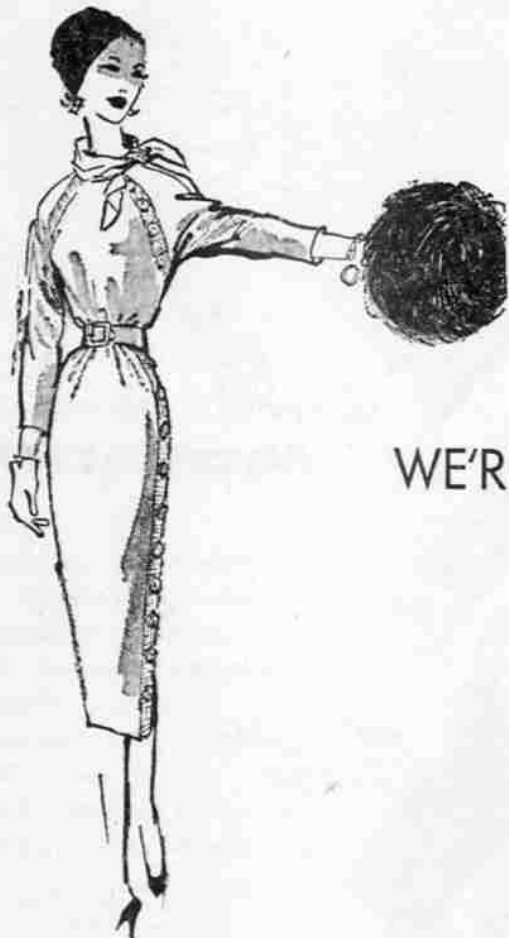
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
