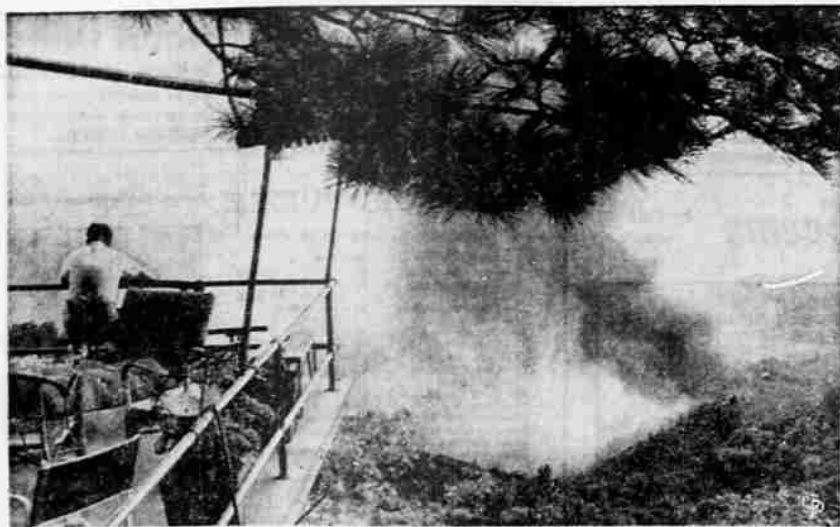

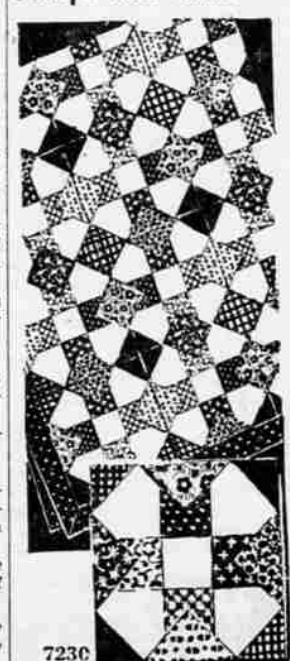

Sandwich Menus Can Be Varied; Recipes Given

Sandwich menus can be varied and as interesting as any menus you plan. There are many nutritious, appetizing combinations to choose from and a great number will include flavorful fresh western-grown vegetables.

The bright colors, variety of flavors and textures and high nutritious values of these fresh vegetables make them ideal for all types of sandwiches. The refreshing crispness of iceberg lettuce is always welcome in a sandwich and bright red slices of tomato are a delicious companion to many meats and other nutritious fillings.

The various salad sandwiches are improved with finely chopped celery, cucumber and onion and grated carrots are an important ingredient in lots of sandwich fillings.

Sandwich biscuits are an interesting variation. Ingredients are 1 cup grated sharp cheese, one-fourth cup chopped ripe olives, 1 tablespoon finely chopped onion, 3 tablespoons finely chopped celery, 2 tablespoons finely chopped green pepper, 1 teaspoon prepared mustard, dash Worcestershire sauce, salt and pepper and baking powder biscuit dough.

Mix all ingredients except biscuit dough well. Prepare biscuit dough, roll thin and cut into medium-size rounds. Place a bit of the cheese filling on each biscuit, top with a second and place on a baking sheet. Brush tops with melted butter and bake at 450 degree for 10 to 12 minutes. Makes 12 biscuits.

For a fresh vegetable spread use 1 3-ounce package of cream cheese, cream or rich milk, 2 tablespoons grated carrot, 2 tablespoons finely chopped green pepper, 1 teaspoon finely chopped onion.

Soften cream cheese to spreading consistency with cream. Add fresh vegetables and Worcestershire sauce; blend well. This is especially good on whole wheat bread.

Speaker Says College Women Self Motivated

The need for college women to identify themselves with things other than self was stressed by Dr. Lois Meek Stolz, professor of psychology at Stanford University, when she addressed delegates to the board meeting of the Oregon division, American Association of University Women held September 21-22 in Eugene.

Participating in the two-day conclave from Medford was Mrs. Frances A. Willett, branch president.

Mrs. R. Willard Duncan, state president from Klamath Falls, presided at the meeting, which was attended by some 50 state officers, chairmen and branch presidents.

In her keynote address at the Saturday luncheon, held at Erb Memorial on the University of Oregon campus, Dr. Stolz said: "Too many college women today are motivated by 'self' interests. The motivation should be for both self and others to make the individual greater within so that having more to give she may give more."

She traced the development of AAUW as an organization dedicated to promoting women in education and listed three trends experienced within the association: to improve women's collegiate education, to improve adult education and to improve education as a whole.

"If we put into practice what we stand for, we will have made

a generous contribution to democracy," the professor stated.

Dr. Stolz has been educational secretary for AAUW, director of the Child Development Institute at Teachers college, Columbia university, assistant to the governor of California as coordinator of child care services and director of wartime child service centers in the Kaiser shipyards at Portland.

During the business sessions, Mrs. Duncan reported that association leaders are trying to project AAUW in the next 25 years to determine a program to serve members, committee and the world.

She announced plans for the 1957 state convention to be held April 25-27 in Baker, and for the 1958 convention to be held in Grants Pass.

Delegates voted to endorse a statewide referendum which would permit the state to receive, hold and dispose of stock that is donated or bequeathed. The proposal will appear on the November ballot as Ballot No. 2.

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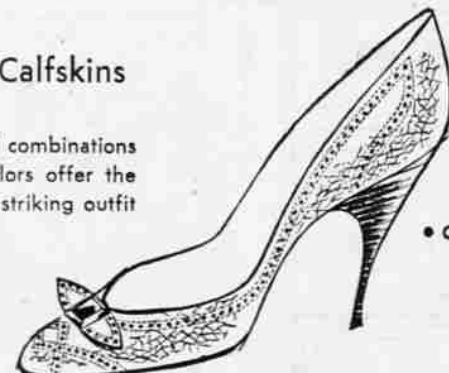
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
