## Strike Against Mill At Feather River Is Reported Near End

Feather Falls, Calif. — (U.P.) — The bitter strike against Feather River Pine Mills here was reported nearing an end Saturday after more than two years of bitter disagreement between union and management.

Representatives of the Brotherhood of Carpenters Union and the Georgia-Pacific Plywood Corp. were said to be drawing up a new contract which would satisfy both sides. The mill had been operating without a contract and with non-union workers throughout the strike.

Observers believed the contract was a clear-cut victory for the union.

Meanwhile, violence in this mountain lumber town continued in the absence of official agreement. Sheriff Larry Gillick said a union official was beaten by a mill worker with an ax handle.

According to an unconfirmed report, some company equipment was sabotaged back in the hills and the culprits were beaten by workers there.

**Union Official Struck**  
The sheriff said James Gonzales of Sutter Creek, an official of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union, was struck several times about the arms as he protected his head from the ax handle blows.

Welder of the ax handle was reported to be Jess Peden, a Feather Falls lumber worker. Peden claimed he blacked out and did not remember striking Gonzales.

The violence started five weeks ago with the burning of a railroad bridge over the south fork of Feather River canyon. The next day picket activity

## Mayor, Other City Officers Indicted In Detroit Suburb

Detroit — (U.P.) — The end of an era has been reached in suburban Ecorse with the indictment of the city's mayor and 29 other persons by a one-man grand jury probing graft and corruption.

Ecorse, a sprawling, rough-and-tumble type of town during the prohibition era, wore the placid face of respectability in recent years but underneath it remained the same old wild-and-wooly place.

The mask was lifted Friday when circuit judge Theodore R. Bohn, the grand juror, issued mass indictments against Mayor William W. Voisine, 13 other city officials and 16 other persons.

**Indictments Charge**  
The indictments charged conspiracy to violate the state gambling laws, extorting and accepting bribes from gamblers and such other operations as dope peddling and bookie operations

which allegedly netted the principals thousands of dollars a month.

Among the city officials indicted besides Voisine were the purchasing agent, city controller, personnel director, two councilmen, three police inspectors and all four members of the police and fire commission.

Other indictments were filed against a newspaper publisher, two businessmen and two gamblers.
