

Registration for Adult Evening Classes Scheduled Oct. 2, 3

Registration for the first semester adult evening classes sponsored by the Medford school system will be held Tuesday and Wednesday, Oct. 2 and 3, school officials have announced. Registration will be by telephone.

Adults interested in registering for classes may telephone 3-5341. Lindsay M. Vinsel, director of adult education, will register classes.

Purpose of advance registration is to determine whether sufficient adults are interested to hold the class. The classes are self-improvement courses and no school credit is given, Vinsel said.

Tailoring Classes

Four classes are tentatively scheduled for tailoring, Vinsel said. Tailoring classes are for women with considerable skill in sewing and experience in sewing techniques. A lined garment is made during the class.

Pattern measurement and alterations, material shrinkage, tailors corners and hems, outing and fitting techniques are among aspects considered by the instructor. Adults taking the course are asked not to purchase material or patterns until the instructor has had an opportunity to advise them, Vinsel said.

Class I is scheduled for 12 sessions during a six week period, and will meet Monday and Thursday afternoons starting Oct. 8 between 1:15 and 4:15 p.m. The class will meet in the cafeteria at Medford High school.

12 Class Sessions

Class II is scheduled for 12 class sessions in six weeks and

will meet Monday and Thursday evenings starting Oct. 8 between 7 and 10 p.m. The class will meet in room 13 at Medford High school. Mrs. Orma Farnham will be instructor for both Class I and II.

Tailoring class III is scheduled for 10 sessions during a 10 week period and will meet Tuesday evenings starting Oct. 9 between 7 and 10 p.m. The class will be held in room 8 of McLoughlin Junior High school.

Class IV will be held once a week for 10 weeks starting Wednesday afternoon Oct. 10 between 1:15 and 4:15 p.m. The class will be held in the cafeteria at Medford High school. Mrs. Hazel McKinstry will be instructor for both Class III and IV.

Registration fee for tailoring classes is \$7.20, Vinsel said.

Advanced Clothing

An advanced clothing course will be held during 10 sessions on Thursday evenings from 7 to 10 p.m. starting Oct. 11. The class will be held in room 8 of McLoughlin Junior High school with Mrs. McKinstry instructing. Registration fee is \$7.20.

The advanced clothing class will consist of construction of a tailored dress, selection of design and fabric, measuring patterns, and alteration of patterns for individual requirements. Construction of the garment will include basic techniques plus timesaving methods. The course is for women with considerable knowledge and experience of sewing and ability to do adequate construction.

Women who have done some sewing and wish to improve have been invited to enroll in the beginning clothing class which will be held Wednesday evenings starting Oct. 10 for 10 weeks. The class will be in room 15 of Medford High school between 7 and 9:30 p.m. Miss Jean Brooks will be instructor. Registration fee is \$5.

Project Listed

Beginning clothing class will have a project of a cotton street dress. Demonstrations include purchasing correct size pattern, choosing suitable fabrics, making pattern alterations, putting in zippers, and using other time-saving methods of clothing construction. Sewing machines are available for use at the school, Vinsel said.

A hat-making course will consist of fundamentals of millinery including materials, stitches, and styles. The hat-making class will be held weekly during a 10-week period starting Monday, Oct. 8, between 7 and 10 p.m. It will be held in room 9 of McLoughlin Junior High school. Mrs. Marguerite Brame will instruct. Registration fee is \$6.

The course will include preparation of an old felt hat to remodel, plus the designing, blocking and fabricating of a new hat.

Supplies necessary for the class include a head-block, hat frame, buckram, millinery wire and scissors. Vinsel urged prospective enrollees not to purchase necessary materials until the instructor has advised the adult and taken measurements.

First Class Needs

For the first class in hat-making, the student will need a notebook, pencil and pen, old felt hat, preferably a fur felt, and pictures cut from magazines or newspapers indicating what type hat the student prefers, Vinsel said.

A six-week class in driver training will include 30 hours of instruction in traffic laws, theory of safe driving, parking procedures, and behind-the-wheel driving.

The first week will consist of classroom instruction and is scheduled between 4 and 5 p.m. Starting Monday, Oct. 8, in the cafeteria at Medford High school. Succeeding weeks are behind-the-wheel training.

Divided to Groups

The class will be divided into two groups. One will meet between 3:45 and 4:45 p.m. and the other between 5 and 6 p.m. during the behind-the-wheel sessions. Hal Carver will be instructor. Registration fee is \$25.

A course in art appreciation will be held during six class sessions during a six week period and will meet Monday nights starting Oct. 8 between 7:30 and 9:30 p.m. The class will be held in room 14 at Medford High school. Warren Wolf will be instructor. Registration fee will be \$4.

The class will be a general survey of the great periods of painting. Backgrounds and purposes of each style and type of painting from the pre-renaissance period to modern times will be explained. Colored slides of the master works will be used
