Black Tornado Goes Into District Action

Medford High school, a potent gridiron force through four pre-league encounters, swings to Southern Oregon conference and District 6 A-1 competition this week in one of five counting battles for preps of this area.

The Black Tornado is host to the Crater Comets on Friday night and will be a big favorite as it begins defense of both the loop and district diadems. It will be the only fracas this week in the big school circuit.

Jackson County B leaguers and District 6 A-2 southern division contenders have two conflicts which count. In the A-2 rivalry Phoenix goes to Eagle Point on Friday and Illinois Valley to Henley on Saturday. The Eagles and Phoenix will fight for leadership also in the Rogue league. Each has a win over Rogue River which is contending on the Rogue slate as well as playing officially in the B loop.

B league contests are Jacksonville at Prospect and Talent at Rogue River. Both games are on Friday with the Prospect mix in the afternoon and the other in the evening.

The other three Southern Oregon conference members have non-league scrambles. Klamath Falls will be host to Boise, Idaho, while Grants Pass travels to Longview, Wash., and Ashland goes to Yreka, Calif.

Medford elementary and junior high school students who have done their part to get out the vote for the Nov. 6 general election will sit in a special section at the game. Medford Kiwanis club has distributed blanks to these students. They are to get the signatures of residents of the community who pledge to register by the Saturday, Oct. 6, deadline and to vote in the election. Each student getting 10 such signatures will be admitted free to the game.

Bruce Cudd Entered In OGA Tourney Here

Bruce Cudd, Portland, Oregon's Walker cup player, definitely will be an entry in the Oregon Golf association men's medal play championships this week end at Rogue Valley Country club, it was learned yesterday.

The tournament, a 54-hole event, is billed for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 5, 6 and 7, at Medford course. A big share of Oregon's leading amateurs and others from Washington and northern California have signed up or have declared their intention of entry.

Cudd's name was one of more than 40 on the registered list by yesterday. The amateur star last appeared in competition at Rogue Valley in March of 1955 when he won the Oregon Open, in action with ranking pros and amateurs of the northwest, for the second straight year. He has also won the OGA match play championship twice. He is a Columbia-Edgewater player.

Prall Defends
Among others whose names were on the dotted line yesterday were Bob Prall and Bob Norquist, University of Oregon, Jack Brande, Lebanon, Ed Kuddella, Royal Oaks, Vancouver, Wash., Dick Bailey and Jim Wells Jr., Redding, Sid Milligan, Eugene, Clifton Smith, Colwood, Dick Bourns, Coos Bay, and Frank Rafferty, Astoria.

Prall is the OGA medal defending champion and Dick Bailey is an ex-northern California amateur and open champ. Other "prominent probabilities" include Bob Bronson and Bob McKeown, Riverside, Portland, Don Kreiger, Dick Estey and Bob Atkinson, Columbia - Edgewater and Hap Heitkemper and Harold Weston, Portland Golf club.

Krieger won the OGA match championship last summer while Weston is the Oregon Coast champ. Atkinson, 1951 state match champ, won the Southern Oregon three times. Estey is a former state junior titlist and Bronson was an OGA match semi-finalist and Alderwood invitational medalist this year.

Senior Division, Too
Among the Rogue Valley entries will be George Harrington, Harry Millette, Alan Holmes, Clayton Lewis, Dr. Bruce Stanley, Dr. D. C. Boals, and Don Provost Jr. Harrington was OGA medal crown winner in 1953 and was runner-up to Prall last year.

There will be both the regular and senior championship action. Play is open to all regular members and senior members of clubs

of the Oregon Golf association and the Oregon Seniors Golf association and to invited entries. There is no handicap limitation.

Prizes will be offered to low gross scorers in the regular and senior division and also to low net players in each group.

Practice rounds may be played Wednesday and Thursday by all players whose entries have been approved.

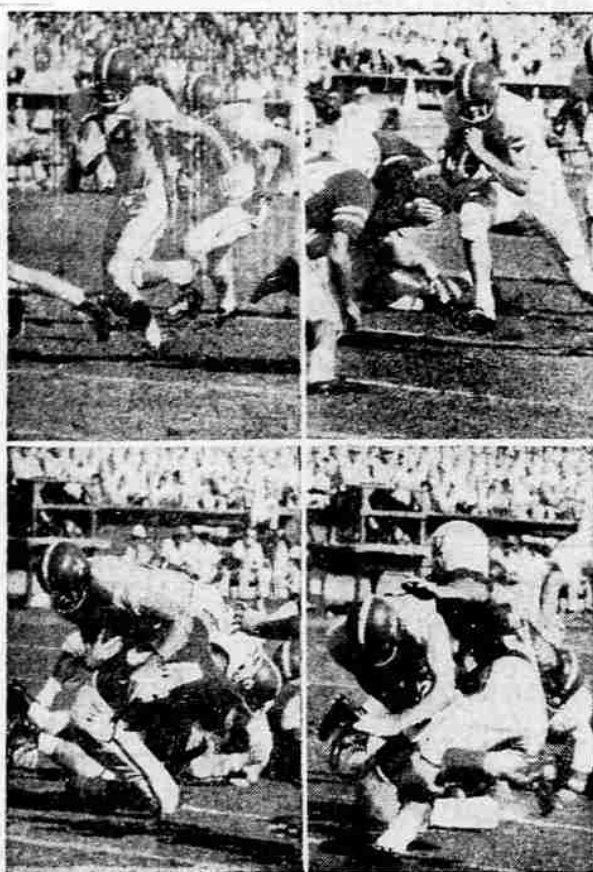
Ducks Rank 22nd In Poll

New York — (U.P.) — The University of Oregon ranks 22nd in the nation in this week's United Press Board of Coaches' football poll, behind only Southern California and Stanford in the Pacific Coast Conference.

The Ducks, narrow 21-14 winners over Idaho last Saturday, dropped a notch from last week when they were tied for 21st place with Washington. The Huskies were beaten by Minnesota and dropped out of the rankings.

Southern California was rated ninth and Stanford was in a 21st place tie with Duke. No other West Coast teams received votes.

Tony Anthony Favored To Beat Clarence Hinnant

New York — Young Tony Anthony of New York, seventh-ranking light-heavyweight contender, is favored at 12-5 to beat Clarence Hinnant of Washington D C Friday night at the New Capital arena in Washington.

Their 10-rounder will be televised and broadcast nationally over NBC networks.

Twenty-three year old Hinnant, unrated, registered three straight victories this year, as did Anthony. Their records: Hinnant, 29-8-0, including 16 kayoes; Anthony, 21-27-4, including 21 kayoes.

Wednesday night's 10-rounder at the Miami Beach auditorium brings together welterweights Hector Constance of Trinidad, B.W.I., and Jimmy Beecham of Miami in a return bout.

Beecham, who outpointed Constance on Dec. 2, last year, is favored at 7-5.

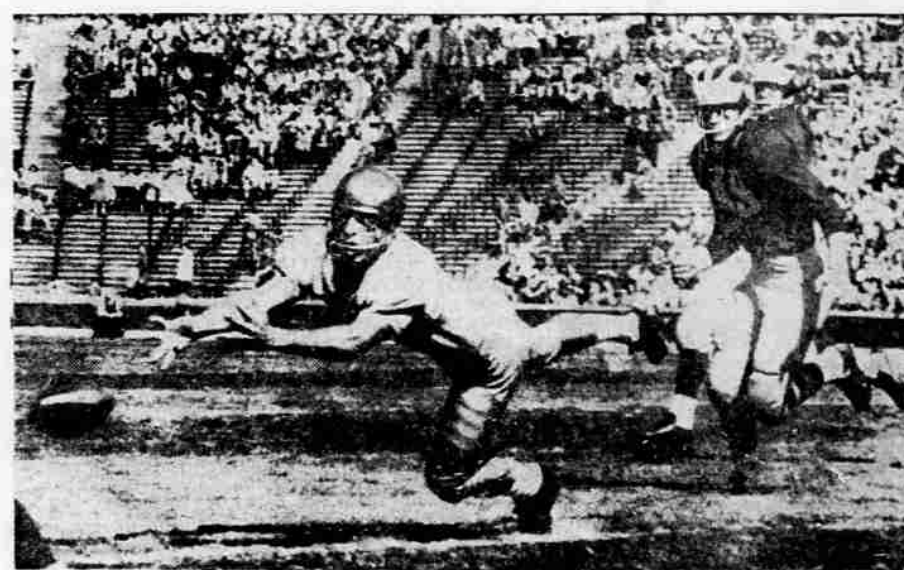
Their bout will be sent nationally over ABC TV-radio networks.

Boxer Out Of Action

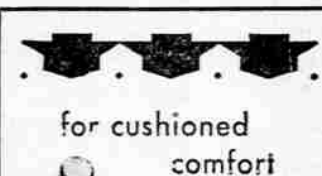

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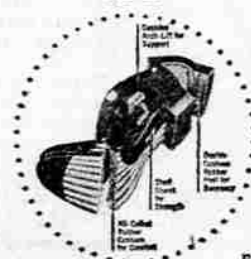
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
