A Nichol's Worth of . . . Comment On This and That

Washington—(UPI)—Sgt. IC Leo M. Kelsey has an interesting hobby, which could add up to considerable, but likely won't.

The instrument he learned to operate as a pro is a mine detector. His objective is to find a dead man's life savings.

For nearly two months now, according to Army informants here, Kelsey, who calls Rosebud, Tex., his home town, has been running around a 110-acre farm near his base in the land of the bayous. Louisiana, it ought to be added without delay, long has been known to be "filled with ghosts, gris-gris and pirates and treasure hoards and the like."

Buried Fortune

Well, it seems that word got around that on this little farm there once lived a farm hand who had little respect for banks. The farmer died a couple of decades ago, but before he went to his reward, he was supposed to have buried a half a dozen half-gallon fruit jars, jammed full of gold and silver coins. Worth an uncounted total of Confederate and Yankee dollars.

According to reports down Louisiana way, the farmer died without even telling his heirs where he had stashed the metal sweat from his hard labor.

Find Some Clues

That's what Leo and J. L. have been doing ever since. At first, the results were not encouraging. Finally they found some rusty old nails, rusted horseshoes, a couple of tomato cans, but no

corral site. Then, a short time later, the detector ran upon some iron staking, wires attached, plus the rotting remains of a log barrier. That may be it. The corral.

The detector, of course, will pick up any metal object buried within two and a half feet of the surface. Somebody said that it might the treasure, that is deeper than that.

Sgt. Kelsey said he doesn't think so. "The old man," he said, "used to add to his hoard whenever his pockets jingled. He wouldn't have time to dig much deeper. It would be a waste of time."
