Call Two Annexation Elections

Six Measures Will Appear on Medford Ballots November 6

Annexation, Major Improvements Listed

Six measures will appear on a special city election ballot Nov. 6. Last night's council meeting was the last at which additional measures could have been added. The election will be held at the same time and places as the general election, but voting will be by separate ballot.

They include four separate proposals which, taken together, form a \$2 million capital improvement program; one minor annexation proposal, and a measure which would authorize the addition of fluorides to the municipal water supply as a dental health measure.

Slightly simplified, the ballot titles are as follows:

51 To authorize city to provide motor vehicle off-street parking facilities; assess one-third of the cost thereof to property benefited; issue not to exceed \$300,000 in general obligation bonds and not to exceed \$200,000 in revenue bonds; to pledge certain revenues for bond payments and other purposes; and creating city parking commission.

52 To amend Medford city charter to authorize city to designate, establish, construct and maintain arterial public streets; to issue not to exceed \$220,000 in general obligation bonds and levy an annual tax of \$143.000 for 10 years to pay for them.

53 To amend Medford city charter to authorize the city to construct and maintain storm sewers and provide outlets, and to issue not to exceed \$95,000 in general obligation bonds and levy an annual tax of \$47,500 for six years to pay for them.

54 To amend the Medford city charter to authorize the city to levy an annual tax of \$19,000 for six years to provide funds to replace or supplement inadequate sewers and construct trunk sewers outside city serving areas within city.

55 To amend city charter by annexing to the city territory wholly surrounded thereby, being blocks 7 and 10, portions of blocks 8 and 9, and portions of streets adjacent thereto, all in the extension of Siskiyou Heights addition to the City of Medford.

56 To amend the Medford city charter to authorize the water commission to add fluorides conducive to dental health to the municipal water supply, and to use equipment and methods meeting the regulations of the Oregon State Board of Health.

POLICE BELIEVED CLOSING IN ON LINN JAIL ESCAPEE

Coos Bay—(U.P.)—An Oregon coastal resident has vanished from his remote home in the Seven Devils road area and state police speculated here today that he may be the second kidnapping victim of Ernest L. Gibson, fugitive from Linn county jail.

Officers said Orvie Lee Randleman, who lived alone at Merchants Beach, vanished about noon yesterday, along with his car.

Coos Bay—State police believed they were close to the trail of escaped Linn county prisoner Ernest L. Gibson today following discovery of the taxicab Gibson

is believed to have taken from Bend.

The cab in which driver Lloyal Van Dyke was abducted Tuesday was found last night about 9 miles south of Charleston where it had gone over a bluff to the Seven Devils road. The scene was barely a mile from a road intersection where police had set up a roadblock in an effort to apprehend the abductor believed to be Gibson.

Bloodhounds owned by Vern Gray of Coos Bay were taken to the scene and followed a trail for several miles through dense brush, finally emerging on the beaches near Cape Arago state park.

FBI Aiding in Hunt

Road blocks were maintained along all highways in the area today and state police said sheriff's officers, city police and the FBI was participating in the hunt with them.

Gibson faced a life sentence in Oregon state penitentiary and was being held in the Linn county jail at Albany awaiting outcome of an appeal at the time of his escape.

The fugitive had been convicted of robbing the Linn county treasurer's office in Albany of \$8,000 earlier this year and was arrested in North Bend at the time of his arrest only \$2,000 of the stolen money was recovered. Officers speculated that possibly he was returning to this area to pick up the rest of the cash which might have been cached here.

The quartet fled the Albany jail Sept. 7. A stolen car containing a revolver owned by the Albany jailer, L. W. Andrus, was recovered in Idaho Falls, Idaho, Sept. 13 but no other leads have been turned up.

The body of one of the four, Dan C. Ott, was found last month in the Willamette river about six miles north of Salem.

Residents in Areas Northeast of City To Vote November 6

Planning Commission Recommended Proposal

The Medford city council last night passed ordinances calling for elections in the Berrydale and Grandview-Kenwood districts on annexing the areas to Medford.

The council action followed a recommendation by the city planning commission last Monday for annexation of the two districts, located north and northeast of Medford. The proposal will be submitted to the voters in the two districts during the Nov. 6 general elections.

The council has decided that the annexation would be submitted to Medford voters at a later special election, if it is approved in the districts. Mayor Miller said Medford would have a year in which to call such an election.

The ordinance calling for the election in the Berrydale district was passed after William Doernbach, 143 Mace st., representing some property owners in the Berrydale district, told the council many residents in that area signed the petition requesting annexation believing the petition was for a new sewer system, not for annexation.

Doernbach stated that the woman who brought the petition to his home told him that in 250 homes in the Berrydale district, 211 residents had signed the petition. He said after checking in the county assessor's office he discovered there were more than 600 homes in the Berrydale district.

Appeal to Prejudices

He added that the petitioner "appealed to the prejudices" of many property owners in that district, implying that those who did not sign the petition were "in favor of the children in the district getting hepatitis."

Many residents in the Berrydale district believe they have been "swindled," according to Doernbach, as they were led to believe the city would pay for benefits arising from the annexation. He said that residents who obtain their water from Elk City or Midway water districts, but whose property is in the Berrydale district, did not know the annexation concerned them.

Council approval of the Berrydale election was because councilmen felt the property owners in the district could best decide whether or not they wanted annexation. About 337 signatures were on the Berrydale district petition.

Mayor Miller told Doernbach that the city will hold public meetings between now and the general election in which residents from Berrydale can be informed of the legal and financial implications of annexation.

The Kenwood-Grandview petition contained about 385 signatures and represented about 72 per cent of the residents, according to City Manager Robert Duff.

Duff pointed out that the city, after an annexation, assumes both the civic assets and liabilities of the area annexed. He said there is about \$153,000 in outstanding bonds in the Kenwood-Grandview district and about \$74,000 in the Berrydale district.

He added that Medford water rates probably would have to be increased \$1.63 annually, or about 14 cents per month, to cover the debts.

A request by State Representative E. H. Mann, 47 Rose ave., to exclude property he owns in the Berrydale district from the annexation boundaries, was denied.

Origin of the fire was not learned, but the possibility that it may have started at the back of the house and shed was mentioned.
