

Eisenhower Tosses In First Ball As World Series Opens Before 34,000 in Brooklyn

Brooklyn—(U.P.)—The favored New York Yankees sent Whitey Ford, their little southpaw ace, against the veteran Sal Maglie of the Brooklyn Dodgers today before President Eisenhower and some other 34,000 fans who jammed Ebbetts field for the first game of the World Series.

The President entered Ebbetts field through the center field gate in an open automobile. The band played "Hail to the Chief" as the automobile circled the outfield with the President attired in a brown suit standing up and waving to the crowd.

The car stopped behind home plate and the President left the car and shook hands with President Walter O'Malley of the Dodgers. Then he went to home plate where he met Dan Topping, coowner of the New York Yankees, Warren Giles, president of the National League, William Harridge, president of the American League, Commissioner Ford Frick, and Managers Casey Stengel of the Yankees and Walt Alton of the Dodgers.

Shake President's Hand
Then the Dodgers, led by Captain Pee Wee Reese filed out of their dugout and one by one, shook hands with the President. Then the Yankees shook hands with him.

The President then was escorted to a box to the right of

the Dodger dugout. With the players turning around to face the President, Mr. Eisenhower flanked by Alton on the right and Stengel on the left, threw out the first ball to catcher Roy Campanella of the Dodgers.

The President held the ball aloft several minutes before letting go with a chest-high throw to Campanella who returned the ball to Mr. Eisenhower.

The Dodgers, trying to make it two in a row over the American league champions, were underdogs but they were confident that the odds makers, who made the Yankees 6 to 5 favorites to win the first game and 8 to 5 to take the series, were mistaken.

Odds makers Give Edge To Spartans

New York—(U.P.)—Broadway oddsmakers took time out from the World Series today to pick Michigan State, the nation's second ranked team, by a close three-points over fourth-ranked Michigan in what shapes up as Saturday's top game in college football.

A crowd of about 100,000 is expected at Ann Arbor, Mich., for the Big Ten clash with oddsmakers almos; reluctant to name a favorite. Michigan clobbered UCLA, 42-13, in its season opener last week, while State downed Stanford, 21-7, in its first game.

In the nationally televised game from Fort Worth, Tex., sixth-ranked Texas Christian was the pick by 14 points over Arkansas, while Oklahoma, the nation's top team, was established such a prohibitive choice that odds were not listed for its meeting with Kansas State.

In the other games involving the ranked teams, fifth-ranked Ohio State was picked by 13 over Stanford; seventh-ranked Pittsburgh, winner of two straight, was the choice by six over California; eighth-ranked Mississippi 14 over Houston; ninth-ranked Southern California by one three over Wisconsin, and 10th-ranked Tennessee by six over Duke. Third-ranked Georgia Tech is idle Saturday.
