

Drivers Are Cited After Accident

Harry W. Hamilton, 51, of Camp White domiciliary, was cited by state police late yesterday for driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor after the car he was operating was involved in an accident at the Highway 62-Camp White intersection.

State police said Hamilton's car and one operated by Allen Craig Hagen, 28, of 1123 West Main st., Medford, collided at the intersection. Police said Hagen was traveling south on Highway 62, and Hamilton was going north and made a left turn into Camp White.

Hagen applied the car's brakes and swerved to the right, but was unable to avoid a collision, police said.

Hamilton and a passenger, James E. Tillotson, 62, also of Camp White, were admitted to the Domiciliary infirmary with cuts and bruises, police said.

Hagen was cited by state police for having no operator's license.

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Murray Street Paving Ordered by Council; Resolutions Passed

The Medford city council last night adopted an ordinance ordering the paving of Murray st. from the end of the existing pavement to Columbus ave. The council action followed a public hearing on the project.

Bids on the project will be accepted by the city until 11 a.m. Oct. 15. City Manager Robert Duff pointed out that 100 per cent of the property owners benefiting from the project signed the petition requesting the improvement. Property owners will be assessed on a basis of \$7 cost per front foot.

Salvage Driving Range

The council also passed a resolution authorizing city crews to salvage the Airport Golf Driving Range. The city will remove the buildings on the site and use the material there on city projects. According to City Manager Duff no bidders expressed interest in salvaging the buildings.

Another resolution was passed referring an amendment to the zoning ordinance to the council building committee. The resolution was passed with the stipulation that City Attorney E. R. Bashaw prepare sample ordinances to be submitted to the committee so it can study varying features of the amendment.

The amendment proposes that the present building ordinance provide for churches in Class 1-A and Class 1-B zones and require that before the issuance of a building permit the applicant first obtain approval of the site

Kefauver Resting; To Resume Drive In Los Angeles

Santa Fe, N. M. —(U.P.)—Sen. Estes Kefauver, the handshaking Democratic vice presidential candidate, took a "one-day" vacation from campaign chores today with nothing but time on his hands.

The rainy Tennessean rested at a ranch five miles from Santa Fe. He planned to watch the first game of the World Series on television and to get some sun and rest before resuming his energetic campaign in Los Angeles Thursday.

'Worried About Yankees'

Discussing his plans for what he termed the "one-day vacation" Kefauver told newsmen in his party that he has been a "Dodger fan" for years and expects to watch the telecast. He conceded he is "worried about the Yankees this year."

The senator's holiday host was Frank McKinney, publisher of the Santa Fe New Mexican who recently served as chairman of a citizen's panel which reported to Congress last spring on peacetime uses for atomic energy. One phase of the atomic energy program—nuclear power—was Kefauver's main campaign topic in New Mexico Tuesday.

U. S. Said Outstripped

Speaking at the government's giant research center at Los Alamos, Kefauver declared that other nations—including Russia—have outstripped the United States in nuclear power development because President Eisenhower let the atomic energy program get bogged down in partisan politics.

The United States, the senator said, has dropped to "third" behind Britain and Russia in the struggle for power while Chairman Lewis L. Strauss of the Atomic Energy Commission "busied himself injecting the AEC into politics through the notorious Dixon-Yates deal."

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Bids Asked for Lookout Tower

The forest service will receive bids for the erection of a lookout tower at Cinnabar Mountain about 35 miles southeast of Medford in the Rogue River national forest until 2 p.m., Oct. 11.

The project calls for the erection of a prefabricated treated timber lookout to replace the present lookout there. Bids are also being advertised by the forest service for gravel surfacing of a road. Bids for both projects will be received by the regional supply officer, Portland.

Plans and specifications for the projects may be obtained from the regional forester or from the forest supervisor at the Post Office building, Medford.

Request Granted

On the recommendation of City Manager Duff a request was granted to the bureau of land management for an additional 1,823 square feet of office space on third floor of the city hall. In order to utilize the space, partitioning and other improvements to an estimated amount of \$1,270 will be required, Duff said.

He added that the bureau is permitting the city to increase its rental charges at an additional 25 per cent. City budget requirements will be complied with by deferring certain city hall improvements until the next budget year, Duff said.

In other council action an ordinance was passed establishing a southeast Medford trunk sewer fund.

Oregon Will Divide Revenue From Liquor

Portland —(U.P.)—Oregon counties, cities and the state will receive portions of \$3,632,693 from Liquor Control Commission revenues for the past quarter.

The commission, meeting here yesterday, said it appeared likely that the commission will achieve the income expected by the last Legislature.

The Legislature set a figure at \$23,860,450 for the biennium as expected revenues. Spokesmen said that 65 per cent of that figure has now been turned in.

The state general fund will receive \$3,162,500 of the quarterly revenue and cities and counties \$470,193.

Butte Falls Grange

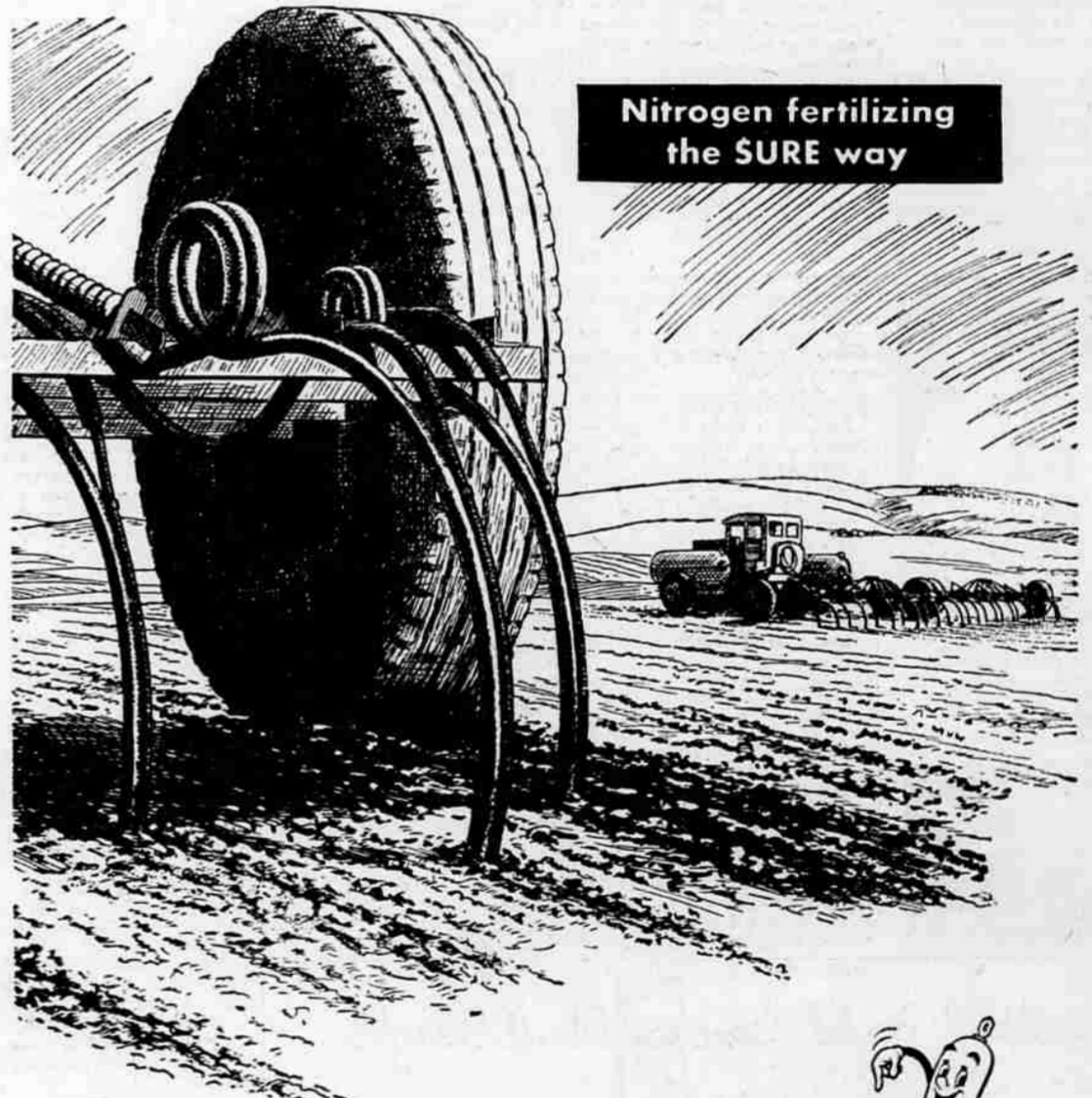
The Butte Falls Grange met in the high school auditorium Oct. 1 with Leslie Casey presiding. Only ten members were present due to the number of hunters out of town.
