Some alcoholics have complained to me, saying that in a recent column I should not have spoken of a "cured alcoholic." They maintained that an alcoholic is never cured to the extent that he will never again be tempted strongly to drink.

From my experience I would agree that any person who has used any drug, such as alcohol or tobacco is likely some day to slip back. This is true. But I have known many men and women who, once having drunk heavily, stopped, and for the rest of their days, or for the many years in which I knew them, remained "on the wagon."

Hence it is that I would not

be so pessimistic as some of my correspondents have been. I am particularly hopeful about the man who, perhaps in the Army, got to drinking a pint of whiskey every night. Finally, after a few years of this, he said to himself, "There is no sense to this, and I am fed up with it." He quit and never went back. The fellow who often remains in great danger after going on the wagon is the dipsomaniac or "lost weekend."

As so often happens when two people disagree, their difficulty is that they give different meanings to one word. In this case everything hinges on the meaning of the word "cured." To one of us, it means cured for the remainder of a lifetime, and to someone else it means remaining sober for 10 or 15 years.

Oregon's Hunting Toll Reaches Seven

John Day—(U.P.)—The death of a 59-year-old Scappoose man Tuesday brought the death toll in Oregon's still-young hunting season to seven.

James Callahan, a former Columbia county deputy sheriff, died at his hunting camp at Bully creek in the John Day area. Death was attributed to a heart attack, according to the Grant county coroner. He said that Callahan was stricken while chopping camp fire wood and died instantly.

Earlier Tuesday reports were received here of the death of Frank Gendron, 58, Beaverton, also in the John Day area.

Gendron died while at the wheel of his pickup truck while on a hunting trip to this area.

First of Frigates Joins Pacific Fleet

San Diego—(U.P.)—The frigate the first of its class of warships to join the Pacific Fleet.

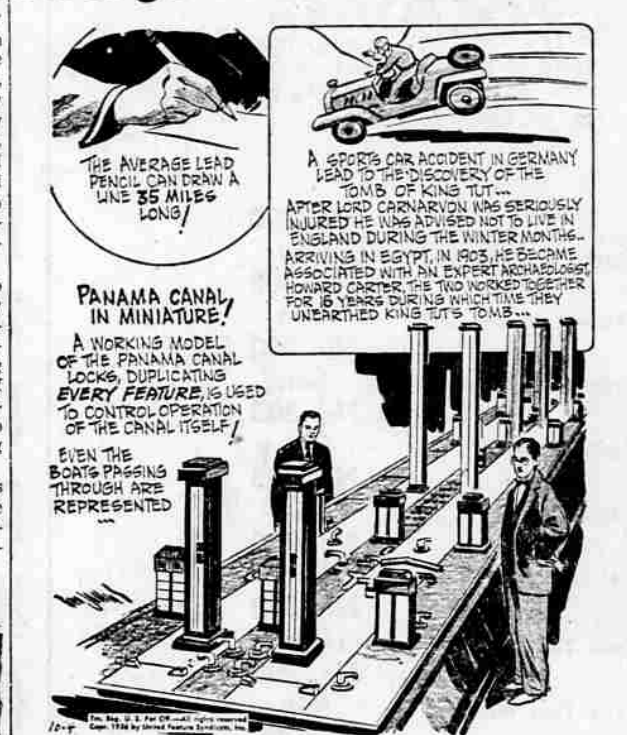

Somers, Medford, for 1.9 of a mile of embankment repair on the Table Rock rd., six miles northwest of Central Point in Jackson county. The project is near Bybee bridge over Rogue river. The embankment was damaged during last winter's floods.

Expenditures of \$5,049,608.94 were authorized by the commission recently when 20 highway construction and related projects were awarded to low bidders.
