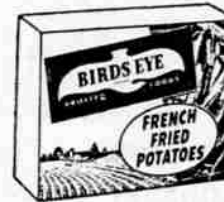

Oregon Reports More Farm Income, Not All Profit

Corvallis—Oregon had more cash farm income last year, but it was not all profit, Mrs. Elvera Horrell, extension agricultural economist at Oregon State college, said today.

Cash sales of Oregon's farm products last year totaled near \$400 million, she said. Adding to that what farmers got in the way of government payments, the value of home-grown products used on the farm, and an estimate of the rental value of farm dwellings gives a gross farm income in Oregon last year of \$445 million—\$13 million above 1954.

However, there was a race between income and outgo last year, Mrs. Horrell said. By the time close to \$300 million in production expenses were paid and an adjustment made for inventories, Oregon farmers had a net farm income left of \$144.4 million—\$700,000 less than in 1954 and the lowest net farm income in the state since records were started in 1949.

Bright Spot
Bright spot was that the total net income did not have to spread over so many farms. And,

according to a report from the agricultural marketing service, this brought the net farm income per farm in Oregon up to an average of \$2,532—\$26 above 1954. The amount was still \$771 below the peak in 1951, however.

Oregon farms averaged around \$200 above the national average net farm income in 1955, ranking 18th among the 48 states, Mrs. Horrell said. Range among the states was wide, with highest per-farm incomes in the West and lowest in the South.

Mrs. Horrell reported that Oregon's cash receipts from sales of farm products the first seven months of 1956 were running behind the same months last year. Nationally, prices on production items during the first quarter of the year were below first-quarter prices in 1955, but had caught up by mid-year.

Kefauver Pledges Himself, Adlai to Repeal Taft-Hartley

Enroute With Kefauver — (U.P.) — Sen. Estes Kefauver pledged himself and presidential candidate Adlai Stevenson to repeal of the Taft-Hartley labor act today.

Kefauver, in a speech prepared for delivery in Los Angeles' garment district, recalled that he had voted against it and voted to sustain former President Truman's veto.

His speech also stressed California water problems and included an attack on the administration's "partnership" program for water resources development.

First Foray to Veep
The garment district speech featured the senator's first foray into Vice President Richard M. Nixon's home territory. He told voters:

"I am willing to let you decide which of us, Nixon or Kefauver, you would choose."

Kefauver prepared for the arduous day by taking a day off Wednesday for sun and rest at a ranch near Santa Fe.

Kefauver also said the 1952 GOP "crusade" has "bogged down in a morass of deals and favoritism."

Senator Claims California
The senator predicted that California will return to the Democratic column in the November elections.

He declared that a "natural partnership between the people of the West and the Democratic party" was disrupted by the 1952 election. He said "much of the progress which imagination, initiative and daring had given life to this section has come to a halt under Dwight D. Eisenhower."

Benson Says Farm Incomes Higher 15 Per Cent Over 1949

Chicago — (U.P.) — Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson today listed peace, security and big government as the three great issues in the current political campaign.

Benson, in a speech prepared for delivery at a luncheon of the Illinois State Chamber of Commerce, skipped over the first two points to devote most of his attention to the role of government in agriculture.

He answered Democratic claims of a farm depression by saying net income per person on farms last year was 15 per cent above 1949 and 6 per cent over the 1950 figure. Benson added that farmers were bidding the price of farm land up to a record level.

The secretary said trouble spots marred the farm picture but both farm income and farm prices generally were higher.

No Gloom and Doom
"From what I've seen and what I know of our American agriculture, it certainly does not resemble the depression that our critics and the prophets of gloom and doom are determined to talk us into," he said.

Benson said farmers were not getting their fair share of the national income, but warned the government could not guarantee farmers their fair share of income.

"The only way government can guarantee farmers income is for us to turn government over to the socialists. Then they could ration out poverty, ration the right to produce and everyone could suffer equally," he said.

Two-Car Collision Kills Ten Persons

Muncie, Ind. — (U.P.) — Ten persons were killed, including a family of nine with four small children, Wednesday night in a head-on, two-car collision seven miles west of here.

Sheriff's police said Fred Beal, 32, his wife, Lillian, 30, their daughters, Claudia, 4, Vickie Lynn, 5, Christina, 6, and Inez, 8, Beal's mother, Mrs. Marie Clark, 60, his sister Loretta, and a friend, Jesse Price, 37, died in the accident.

The 10th victim, who drove the other car, was identified as Thomas Bryan Burns, 35, Keystone, Ind. All those riding in Beal's car were from Muncie, police said.

Policeman John Nicewander said skid marks at the point of impact indicated the car driven by Beal apparently swerved across the westbound lane over the center line and crashed into Burns' eastbound car.

All the victims except one were killed instantly, Nicewander said. Lillian Beal died shortly afterward on the operating table of the Ball Memorial hospital in Muncie.
