

# Crater, Medford High Scrap In 4th Annual Football Tiff

Central Point and Gold Hill residents will be quick to challenge any inference that their communities are part of Medford or even "Greater Medford" but all the elements of "cross-town" rivalry will still exist tonight when the footballers of their high school, the Crater Comets, engage the Medford Black Tornado on the senior high school here.

Kick-off time is set for 8:15 p.m. It will be a District 6 A-1 and Southern Conference skirmish. Crater and Medford will be foes for the fourth consecutive year on the gridiron but this evening's affair will mark the first "official" tiffin action between the schools. Crater previously has been an A-2 school.

Medford, with a tremendous record against more imposing adversaries, goes into the tiffin with the heavy favorite Tornado stock went even higher today with the report that Wayne Allen, the No. 1 Crater quarterback, is unlikely to see action.

The sophomore Comet, his club's top passer and best ball handler in making the runs of George Juveland and Don Goyette click in the T attack, suffered a bruised shoulder in Wednesday drill. Severity of the injury was not realized until yesterday.

Elton Has Job

Coach Leonard Warren said that the Comets plan to go with 130-pound senior Bobby Elden at the quarterback slot. George Juveland, left halfback, has played at quarter in past seasons and could move up into slot part time.

The Crater mentor reported that one of his tackles, Dick Davis, has been bothered by a cold but should see service. Davis was at practice three days this week but missed last night.

At Medford Coach Fred Spiegelberg reported his squad intact. The Tornado went through the usual Thursday routine of signal, punt return and kick-off return drills.

Medford will field the heftier aggregation this evening, outweighing the Comets on the average of around eight pounds per man in the line and of eight

to as high as 20 in the backfield. Crater so far this season has won 13 to 6 from Eagle Point and 34 to 19 from Yreka, Calif. It tied Redmond 13 to 13 and lost to Grants Pass 26 to 13. Medford's versatile T and single wing offense, generalised by quarterback Dick McLaughlin and with Gordon Owsley, Eldon Francis, Gary Riley, Bob Gee and Loren Christian packing the mail behind a rugged, charging line, has turned back Jefferson of Portland 34 to 12, Milwaukie 39 to 7 and Reyeberg 40 to 14 and has knotted Marshfield 20 to 20.

College football will offer a host of intersectional battles this week end as the rah-rah boys vie with the World Series for national interest.

The first of the major intersectionals will be played tonight at Miami's Orange bowl when the University of Miami hosts Boston college. In addition, Oregon travels to Los Angeles for a Pacific Coast Conference game with UCLA, while Utah will be at Brigham Young in a Skyline conference meeting.

Miami is a 14-point choice over Boston college, but the invading Eagles from New England could spring an upset. Mike Holovac's young men were greater underdogs against Miami last season when they dropped a close 14-7 verdict, and they've been looking ahead to this return meeting.

The "big" game on Saturday's schedule will find second-ranked Michigan State baiting the fourth-ranked Michigan Wolverines in their own lair. The Spar-

tans, led by their flashy left halfback, Clarence Hi Peaks, are three-point favorites.

Fifth-ranked Ohio State will entertain Stanford and seventh-ranked Pittsburgh visits California, while other major intersectionals include Mississippi-Houston, Southern California-Wisconsin, Southern Methodist-Missouri, Baylor-Maryland, Tulane-Northwestern, Iowa-Oregon State, Illinois-Washington, LSU-Rice and Texas-West Virginia.

Top-ranked Oklahoma opens its bid for another Big Seven championship against Kansas State. The Sooners are such a heavy choice to score their 32nd straight victory that no odds were quoted on the game.

In Saturday's nationally-televised game, sixth-ranked Texas Christian will meet Arkansas.

# Oregon's Ducks Clash With Bruins Tonight

San Francisco — (UP) — Oregon's Webfoots, drubbed six straight times by UCLA since Red Saunders launched his south land era, finally have a chance for revenge tonight when they meet the Bruins at Los Angeles coliseum.

The Uclans seem down at the moment from crippling penalties brought against them this summer for violating the athletic code. Michigan buried them last Saturday, 42-13, after they had squeaked by Utah, 13-7, the week before.

At the same time, Coach Len Casanova may have come up with the best Oregon team he has formed after six years of work. The Ducks had a bad time getting by Idaho, 21-14, last week but started off with a bang by thumping Colorado, 33-0.

**Scored Only Once**

Oregon not only has lost all six games to Sanders' teams but crossed the Bruin goal line only once in the last five outings. The Ducks could make up for lost time tonight if Tom Crabtree's passing and Jim Shanley's speed function as usual.

Cannon's start booming again Saturday when the Pacific Coast Conference finds itself involved with four more games against Big Ten opposition plus a key intersectional between Pittsburgh and California. The Big Ten leads so far in this year's series, 4-0.

The only bright spot for the coast appears to be the Southern California-Wisconsin game in which the Trojans have been tabbed as one-touchdown favorites. Otherwise Ohio State is 13 over Stanford, Iowa six over Oregon State, Illinois over Washington and Pitt six over California.

Ohio State number Nebraska, 34-7, last week while Stanford was falling before Michigan State, 21-7. As usual, the Indians' best chances seem to ride on the passing arm of quarterback John Brodie.

Oregon State lost its top runner and pass defender when little Sam Wesley was ruled ineligible, but the Beavers did give Southern Cal a tough battle without him before topping and could surprise Iowa.

Illinois rallied to stun California 32-20 last week and rallies over the revamped Huskies who took a 34-14 beating from Minnesota.

Pittsburgh and its rugged line is expected to cut Cal down the hard way, with drives, ground plays, while the twice-beaten Bears try the airwaves.

Washington State, sensing its greatest season in 25 campaigns, meets Idaho in a traditional at Moscow that always is hard to figure.

In another top game, Cincinnati plays College of the Pacific at Stockton Saturday night. San Jose is idle.
