The society, founded in 1876, is under the patronage of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth and the presidency of the Right Honourable Lord Percy of Newcastle. Ordinary members of the society may use the designation M.R.S.H. and receive a distinctive certificate of election bearing the royal society's coat of arms in full color as granted by the College of Heralds under letters patent.
