

## Medford Children In Play Cast

"Supers" is a term long used in the theatre to define character added to a production who do not actually say one line, yet whose presence add color and variety to the show.

This word takes on added meaning here for three children who will be added to the cast of the children's theater production of "Johnny Appleseed" for local performances being shown here Tuesday, October 9.

In the play a widowed pioneer mother, Liz Williams, with the help of her older son, Roy, brings her 14 year old son Ben, and her two daughters, Martha and Cora, across the Appalachian Mountains into the settlement where Johnny Appleseed and the Irish land agent, Dan McQuade, have already settled.

Ben will be portrayed by Tommy Rouhier, who is the son of Mrs. Margaret Rouhier, 515 South Grape street, and goes to St. Mary's school. The two daughters, Martha and Cora, will be played by Michele Niehaus, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clement Niehaus, 501 Modoc avenue, and Nicolee Ober, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Ober, Rt. 1 Box 360D. Michele is a student at Roosevelt and Nicolee attends school at Griffin Creek.

Arriving an hour and a half before the first performance, they will be met by Benita Camicia, young San Jose State college graduate who plays the role of Liz Williams. She will instruct the young people in what they are to do in the play. Then they will be taken to the dressing room and helped into their costumes. Mrs. Harold B. Cook, who is a member of AAUW, bringing the play to Medford will assist them and will also help with makeup.

Their costumes will be reproductions of clothing worn by pioneer children in the year 1797, in which the play is set.

Performances are set for 1:45 and 3:30. Tickets will be on sale Monday and Tuesday during the noon hour, and at the Craterian theater box office.
