Rogue Conservation Board Holds Meeting

Rogue Conservation district board of directors Thursday night named Mrs. Kathryn Heffernan of Medford chairman of a special committee on Rogue river flood control.

The committee will prepare a brief on need for flood control on the river and its tributaries. The brief will be presented to the Army corps of engineers at a public meeting on flood control Oct. 25 at Grants Pass.

Mr. Heffernan will select as many other committee members as are needed. Directors also approved plans for the new dam at Squaw lake. The lake is being drained at the present time preparatory to constructing the new dam.

The board also discussed plans for the annual convention of the state association of conservation districts to be held Nov. 29-30 in Eugene.

Everett Moore, Superintendent of the state fish hatchery here, reported that salmon are being marked this week. The fins are cut on the fish, thus marking them so that they can keep track of them when turned loose in the river.
